FINAL RITES FOR CLEVE FAMBROUGH HELD THURSDAY

Funeral services for Clive Fambrough, were conducted at 4 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the First Baptist church with the Rev. Stewart O'Dell of the First Methodist church officiating. Death came after several months of illness at the home of his parents.

Clive Fambrough was born in Dallas county in 1908 and moved with his parents to Byers a few years later. He attended the local schools and graduated with the class of 1926. He was known to his teachers and classmates as an ideal pupil in conduct and intelligence. With these two marks of life he carried with him through his college career.

In 1934 Clive graduated from the North Texas State Teachers College at Denton with unusual high scholastic standing. He received a scholarship at Austin on graduation from the Teachers College.

While he was in school at Denton, he was assistant teacher in the natural science department. In the fall of 1934, he entered the University of Texas and was also made assistant teacher in the science department.

At the close of the spring semester his health broke and he was brought to his home.

Besides his mother and father, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Cling Gregory of Valley View, Texas and one brother Britton Fambrough of Wyoming.

Pallbearers included Guy Harding, Lewis Cocanower, Bonner Cummings, Hiram Vaughter, Ansel Yarbrough and Willis Smith.

The beautiful floral offerings showed the love and fellowship of his innumerable friends.

Interment was in the Byers Cemetery with L. Y. Herrin, local funeral director, in charge.

Pageant of Progress Presented Before Queen and King Of Festival.

In a spectacular setting, Frank Howth Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Johnson of Cambridge, and Miss Mary Jane Alcorn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Alcorn of Henrietta, were crowned King and Queen of the Fourth Annual Clay County Pioneers Reunion Thursday night on the lawn of the Walker High School Building. Mayor Frank Bunting of Henrietta crowned his majesty King Clay from the House of Johnson, and her royal highness Queen Henrietta from the House of Alcorn. David J. Percifield, Jr., was crown bearer and Barlow Weaver, Jr., and Alfred McMillan were train bearers to the Queen.

Maid in waiting to the Queen was the Duchess Marjorie of the House of Bevering. Sonny Christian was train bearer to the Duchess.

The Pageant of Progress in Honor of the Pioneers of Clay County was presented before the King and Queen, giving the history of this county since 1850. Ambrose Douthitt was speaker and the pageant was written by Dr. Ruth Hicks of Henrietta.

Denton, Texas, October 2.—Miss Gertrude Payne was elected vice-president of Pi Omega Pi at the organization's first meeting of the year held last week.

Pi Omega Pi is an honorary fraternity for teachers of Business Administration, and membership is given only to those students who have made honor roll grades.

Clay county and Northwest Texas paid tribute to one of their pioneer citizens when funeral rites were held for Carl M. Worsham. Services for the veteran rancher, banker and civic leader were held at the family home at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The services were conducted by the Rev. Paul J. Merrill, pastor of the First Christian church of Henrietta, assisted by the Rev. P. S. Warren, Methodist minister of Ringgold, and the Rev. Finis A. Crutchfield, Presiding Elder of the Denton district of the Methodist church. Mrs. Earl B. Nutter sang "The Plains of Peace" and "Now the Day is Over", with Mrs. Fred Oheim accompanying at the piano. Rev. Warren read the scripture and offered prayer, and in a talk Rev. Crutchfield gave tribute to Carl as a friend. Included in a talk by Rev. Merrill was the following sketch of Worsham's life: "Carl Madison Worsham, son of William Benjamin Worsham and Augusta Geneva Collins, was born at Cambridge, Clay county, Texas, on August 17, 1881, and passed away at his home in Henrietta, Texas on September 29, 1935, at 10:30 A. M. at the age of 54 years, 1 month and 12 days. His father, William Benjamin Worsham was born February 8, 1843 and died June 11, 1915. His mother, Augusta Geneva Worsham, was born January 16, 1854 and died March 26, 1920. Carl Madison Worsham was married to Miss May Easley on June 10, 1903 at Henrietta, Texas. One child was born to this union, a daughter, Miss Carla Worsham, on May 9, 1916." Rev. Merrill concluded with prayer.

Burial was in Hope cemetery under the direction of the Moore funeral home.

Pallbearers were Jesse Cunningham, Mug Koethe, Earl B. Nutter, Fred Oheim, Donley Suddath, Tom J. Green, Jim Mays and T. E. Slagle.

The pioneer Clay county banker and cattleman died Sunday following a stroke of paralysis at 1 o'clock in the morning. Mr. Worsham was a son of the late W. B. Worsham, Clay county pioneer and cattleman. The elder Worsham established the W. B. Worsham and company bank at Henrietta. The son carried on the banking firm together with operation of extensive ranch holdings in Clay and Foard counties until the bank moratorium in 1933. The bank was liquidated during that year. Mr. Worsham carried on his father's interest in breeding and raising fine cattle and the Worsham brand and herds were known to cattlemen throughout North Texas. The ranch holdings at one time included 25,000 acres.

Mr. Worsham was actively interested in civic affairs in Henrietta. (Continued on Page Eight)

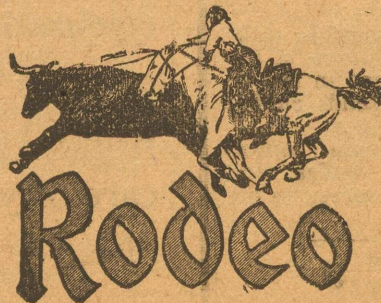

THE CORRECT PHILOSOPHY OF LIFE

The old trite prayer of the man who prayed "O LORD prosper me and my wife, my son John and his wife, us four and no more" is embedded in some human natures. It is a correct prayer except the last clause "and no more". This difference from correct life is seen somewhat in the basic ideas of our two great parties. The republican idea is to care for the "captains of industry" and they will care for the "common herd"; the democratic idea is "equal rights and opportunities for all special privileges to none". The republican idea has controlled the policies in government the last fifty years and has produced the condition that 4 per cent of the people own over 90 per cent of the property of the nation and the condition produced the depression of 1932 when wheat was worth 30 cents per bushel, corn 20 cents, cotton 4 cents and live stock and other products in proportion. With these facts in mind we hope our people will read the President's speech to the Nebraska farmers on last Saturday. It is going to "pester" the Republicans to answer it, the facts are too recent to try to ignore or explain them. If President Roosevelt and the congress violated the constitution in bringing this about, then I'll let a profane man end the discussion. We prefer to believe, with the President, knowing the character of men who framed the constitution, that they intended for those in authority, in "providing for the general welfare" of the people that they do what would bring that about, as the President and the congress has done. We look for a majority of about ten million to agree with us next year.

CLAY COUNTY AND ITS PIONEERS

Henrietta this week will render a reverent salute to the early settlers of Clay county. There will be a three-day reunion of pioneers, with parades, rodeos, exhibits, speeches and other features, and plans are under way for a program in which the honor done to the early settlers will be mingled with festivities appropriate to the holiday spirit.

There ought to be more of such affairs. That is true everywhere in Texas. It is particularly true in Northwest Texas, which is still young enough, as a white man's county, to number among the living many of those who blazed the trails, built the first houses, established the first schools and churches and laid the foundations for the development that was to follow.

Clay county was a going concern when Wichita Falls came into being 53 years ago. It was to the commissioners court at Henrietta that the first Wichitans journeyed with the petition calling for organization of Wichita county. The earliest settlements in Clay county were made about the time the civil war began. The later permanent settlements antedate the start of Wichita county by about a decade. A few of those who brought Clay county into being, as political entity, are still alive. It is Henrietta's high privilege to honor them. It honors itself by doing so.

There is one thing that we of a younger generation must keep in mind on such occasions. That is, that there is urgent need today of the faith and the courage, the fortitude and the self-reliance, that served the pioneers so well. We have need of a larger measure of their spirits. Affairs such as Henrietta is staging serve to call attention to that need.—Wichita Daily Times.

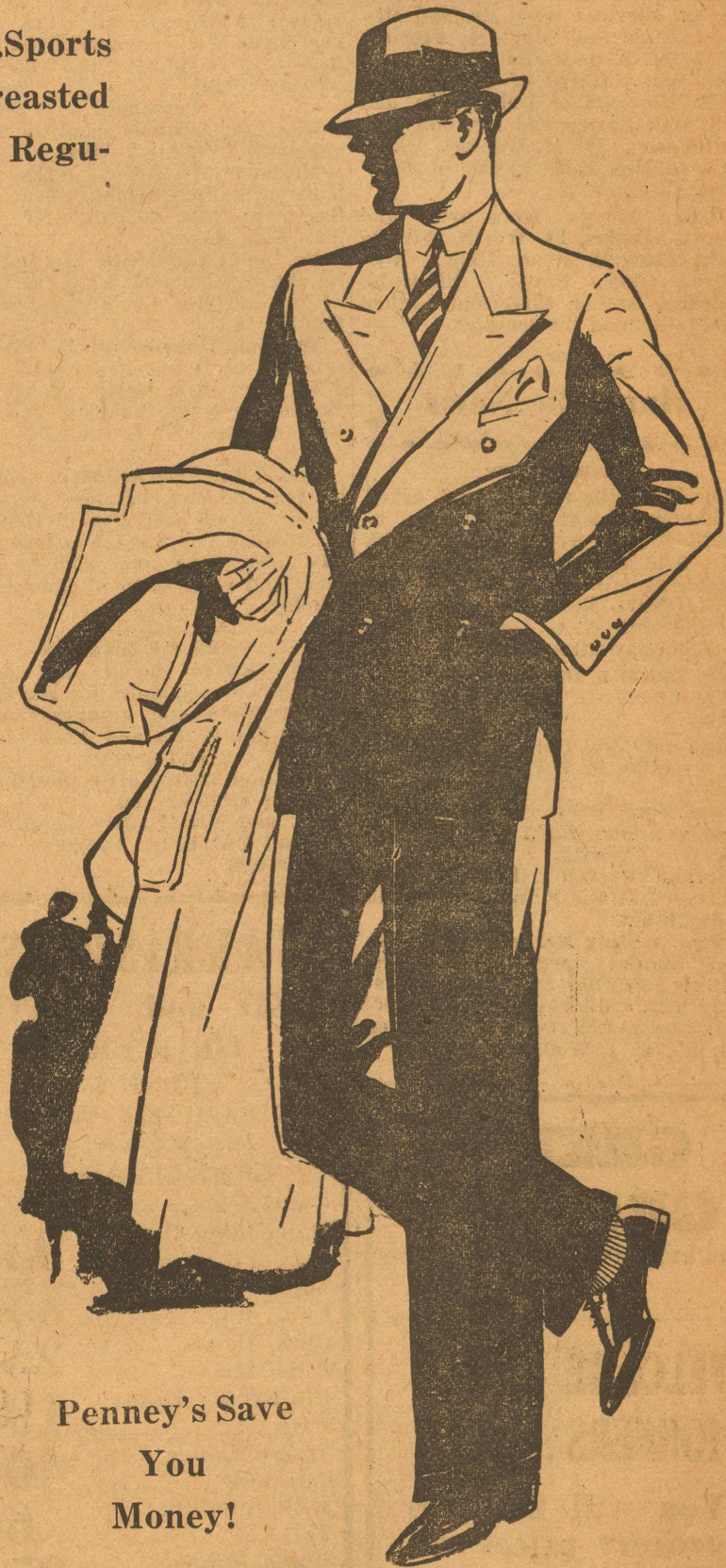
