FARMERS UNION HELD MEET AT WINDSHORST

McFarlane Explains Frazier-Lempke Bill; Meet Next In Jack County.

The following resolution by the "Good of the Order" committee of the Clay-Archer County Farmers Union was read and adopted at the meeting held at Windthorst on last Friday night.

Congressman W. D. McFarlane explained the Frazier-Lempke Bill and gave a good account of his stewardship as Congressman from this 13th District. He was soundly concluded applauded.

President J. L. McConkey of the union presided at this meeting, at which W. C. Poplin was elected county secretary. They reported a most enthusiastic meeting with ap-proximtely three hundred farmers attending.



RESETTLEME EXHIBIT DRAW MUCH ATTENTIO

Eigty-Three Families Are Under Supervision of H. S. Dorman And Miss Marrs.

The Rural Resettlement Administration exhibit, which was visited by many during the Pioneers' Re-union, was under the direction of H. S. Dorman, rural supervisor, Miss Margaret Marrs, rural home supervisor, and Mrs. Rose Lowry, emergency teacher. This exhibit included a display of different types of hand-craft clothes canned fruit --Vi of hand-craft, clothes, canned fruit and vegetables and all varieties of farm products.

Eighty-three families in Clay County are under the supervision of Mr. Dorman and Miss Marrs.

To the Assessor-Collector. Dear Sir:



You should keep a record of all those who make tenders, and advise them that you will issue the receipt less the discount, if paid immediate-ly after the court's decision.


