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## FARMERS UNION HELD MEET AT WINDSHORST

McFarlane Explains Frazier-Lempke Bill; Meet Next In Jack County.

The following resolution by the "Good of the Order" committee of the Clay-Archer County Farmers Union was read and adopted at the meeting held at Windthorst on last Friday night.

Congressman W. D. McFarlane explained the Frazier-Lempke Bill and gave a good account of his stewardship as Congressman from this 13th District. He was soundly applauded.

President J. L. McConkey of the union presided at this meeting, at which W. C. Poplin was elected county secretary. They reported a most enthusiastic meeting with approximately three hundred farmers attending.

The next County Union meeting will be held at Union Point in Jack County on Friday, November 1st.

Since their last county meeting at Dean Dale the organization has perfected another local at Thornberry with 42 members, with E. D. Owen president and I. A. Hansard, secretary.

The election of officers was held at the noon luncheon of the final day of the program, which saw the biggest crowd of the reunion. Approximately 5,000 persons were in the city for the celebration.

Ambrose Douthitt was master of ceremonies in the luncheon Saturday and presided at the business meeting. Speakers for the occasion were Judge Marvin Brown of Fort Worth and Attorney Houston McMurry of Henrietta.

Douthitt, second president, and George Cunningham, third and fourth president. They were preceded by Mayor Frank Bunting and Sheriff E. P. Bomar, who all rode horse-back and were dressed in early costumes. The parade ended with the firing of a seven-gun salute to the pioneers by Battery "D" of the First Field Artillery from Ft. Sill.

### Cotton Producers to Get Emergency Certificates Soon

Instructions have come to County Agent M. S. Duncan from Washington that they will not be able to issue certificates due producers from the 1934 pool at present.

However, arrangements are being perfected for allowing the county office to issue producers certificates due them from the 1934 pool. To get the certificate the producer must deliver to the assistant the yellow form No. CR-BA-201B. This is an emergency arrangement and it is believed that producers who are in urgent need of these certificates may be able to get them by Monday, October 14.

Producers who do not need these certificates to get their cotton tagged are requested not to ask for them at present.

 tion are deeply indebted to the Farmers Union for what it has already done; but the past will be nothing if farmers really want to promote this self-help movement and have a voice in its conduct of their own affairs.

**Newt Gresham the Founder.**

"Newt Gresham lived upon a rented farm near Point in Rains County, Texas; bitter experience had taught him the difficulty of attempting to succeed financially and ultimately to become a home-owner under a marketing system controlled by speculation. Brooding over the condition of himself and his neighbors; weighted down by the credit and mortgage system, a curse to any country there came as an inspiration the thought that he might help farmers to perfect a better system of marketing. The schooling he had received as an organizer for the alliance well-fitted him for the task of launching another farmers organization. Experience had, however, taught Gresham that increased production would not solve the farmers' problems, but that an effort must be made to have farmers cooperate in marketing their crops intelligently and that to accomplish this an educational campaign must be conducted to educate them.

"For twenty years the Farmers' Union has been trying to stem the tide of energy that has been thrown into production, and turn it into the really great problem of marketing, farm products.

"Our Federal and State departments of agriculture; the extension forces; better farming bureaus or boards of trade, and other agencies have constantly whipped up production, and naturally they are interested in continuous and liberal supply of foods and clothing; but where does the farmer benefit by his excess field? And the only one concerned and the fact that he is not organized is proof of his weakness and the place the farmers should occupy in the great scheme of modern business can be attained

only by unity of action, and not by hugging to his bosom some foolish notions of individualism.

Take the cities of our country. There never lived a race of men with industry enough to earn as much as these people spent and therefore in order to gratify their extravagant desires they must either cheat or gamble for it and some of them do both. We draw the water and we cut the wood while they eat our substance.

"We wish for you a most satisfactory and harmonious meeting, and pray the great God of Heaven that He may prompt your every effort, sanction your every motive, and approve your final adjustment of every question that shall come before this meeting and in the future so guard your every effort that absolute success will crown this order."
