She was typical of the old school of the early west and in 1930 she was chosen as "the loveliest mother" in the western group in a national contest conducted by the National Photographers association of the United States and Canada.

On Wednesday the President transmitted to the Speaker of the House the Bureau of Budget's recommendation for an appropriation of \$2,-237,000,000 with which to pay the bonus baby bond issue. 


