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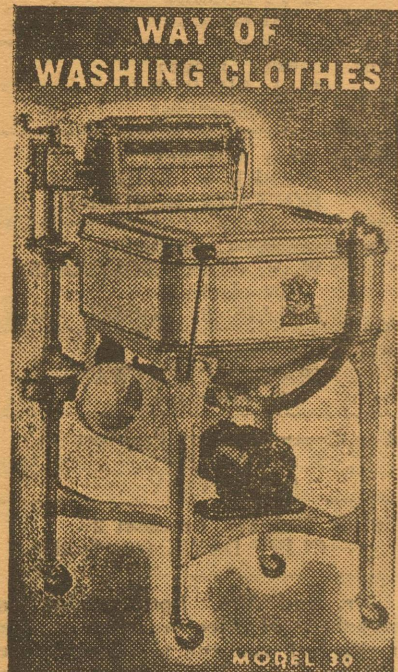

Purelined Sorghums Show Increase In Uniform Production

The purelining of grain sorghums by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has increased the yields, has helped evade damage from sorghum midge by causing a more uniform maturity, and has facilitated the harvesting of heads by machinery by securing uniform height. This work has removed grain sorghums from the category of doubtful and erratic yields and has enabled uniformly high production under practically all soil and climatic conditions prevailing in the Southwest, according to a press bulletin issued by the Experiment Station.

Practically 95 per cent of the grain sorghum acreage of Texas traces its origin to pure line selections or new hybrid varieties distributed by the Experiment Station. In the present sorghum breeding program, kafir, hegari, and feterita are being converted from white-seeded to yellow-seeded types. A factor for resistance to leaf spot is also being introduced into these three varieties, as well as into milo and Sumac sorgo. This factor for leaf spot resistance is linked with a factor which produces a chocolate colored glume, so that the new leaf spot resistant varieties may be "trad marked" by a distinctive glume color.

Sudan grass, which was first introduced by the Station and has since become the most valuable annual pasture crop in the Southwest, is being converted into a juicy, sweet-stemmed type with resistance to leaf spot and distinctive glume color which will identify it from the present day Sudan.

By the proper combination of varieties in hybridization, marked increases in both grain and forage yields, as much as 300 per cent in some instances, can be obtained in first generation crosses. Frequently a large increase in production, due to hybrid vigor, carries over into the second generation. Experiments are in progress to forward mass production of crossed seed so that this hybrid vigor effect in sorghums may be utilized.

Of 16 different treatments in fertilizer work with cotton carried on by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, the application of 12 tons of manure and 400 pounds of superphosphate per acre produced the largest yield, 596 pounds of lint per acre, in 1935, according to a recent Experiment Station release.

This is an increase of 379 pounds, or 170 per cent, over the yield of 217 pounds from the unfertilized soil. During the nine years 1927-35, this treatment of manure and superphosphate also made the highest average yield, 372 pounds per acre which is 155 pounds, or 71 per

The other brother, a totally different, unscrupulous character, wants to kill the herd of wild horses and use the range for cattle.

Stormy builds a secret corral for the colt, whose father was a wild horse, and trains it but permits it to run with the wild herd. The colt always comes to him at his whistle or call, although no other man can get near him. The part this colt plays in the life of the oddly assorted group of persons and their primitive struggle for the survival of the fittest, makes a most engrossing and fascinating story, it is said.
