Group 2. Crimson clover, bur Austrian winter peas, vetch and other locally adapted winter legumes. \$1.50 per acre, when turned between January 1, 1936 and October 31, 1936.

Lobbying Disclosures

The Black Committee has just disclosed the large contributions of the wealthy to the American Liberty League and the Crusaders. The Crusaders is a lobbying organization, that since its drive to repeal the 18th amendment, has continued its work to further protect wealth from paying its proportionate share of taxes. The Crusaders and Mr. Pitcarin's lobbying organization known as the Sentinels of the Republic, have been active lobbying against the tax bill and to oppose all payments made under AAA for the benefit of the farmers. It will be remembered these organizations lobbied through a bill last session, to repeal the pink slip law which would have given some little publicity for large income tax payers. So it seems these lobbying organizations favor great publicity on relief expenditures but are opposed to any publicity, showing the enormous salaries and benefits received by the 4% who control over 9% of the wealth of the Nation.

Robinson-Hastings Debate

Senator Hastings of Delaware, the recognized spokesman for the du Ponts and Liberty Leaguers in general, became very bitter in debate last week because of recent disclosures showing the large contributions made by the du Ponts, and other members of the Liberty League and the Crusaders. The Liberty League was shown to have been organized for the purpose of opposing the Administration and its legislative program in every way possible and to try to defeat same and elect a President and Congress friendly to their wishes. The Crusaders were shown by the Lobbying

Committee to be organized by the wealthy for the purpose of defeating the 18th Amendment, and since then has carried on, through contributions of the wealthy, to oppose legislation detrimental to them and favoring legislation that would shift the tax burden on to the poor.

Senator Robinson fully and completely answered the remarks of Senator Hastings and pointed out the legislative program enacted by this Administration, and what it has done toward recovery.

Registrations in Pittsburgh and Pennsylvania

Recent registrations in the "rock ribbed" Republican State of Pennsylvania, clearly shows the political trend. Registrations in Pittsburgh for 1932 were Democrats 19,702, Republicans 208,161; registrations for 1936 for Pittsburgh are Democrats 130,285, Republicans 126,112; for Allegheny County, in 1932, Democrats 49,654, Republicans 425,121; in 1936 Democrats 275,058, Republicans 325,964.

Thus we see that for the first time since the Civil War, that the Democratic Party is now the majority party in Pittsburgh, the recognized stronghold of the Republicans in Pennsylvania, and registrations throughout the State have shifted from Republican to Democrat in a similar way. So it seems that the "rock ribbed" Quaker State will be found in the Democrat column this Fall.

Deportation of Alien Criminals

The Senate debated this measure most of the time since Thursday and Friday last week, and it is pending business this week. No other Nation in the world has and would countenance caring for the alien criminals such as is being done by the United States. It is to be hoped that the harboring of these criminals within our borders will soon cease and they will be allowed to return to their native land.

Tax and Relief Bills

The House began general debate on the tax bill of 1936 on last Thursday. This measure is expected to occupy the entire consideration of the House on Friday. While our rugged individualistic friends bitterly oppose this measure the only tax plan they offer in its place is an excise or sales tax which must be paid principally by the poor.

The first deficiency bill is still

pending before the Committee, and hearings are due to be completed on Tuesday or Wednesday. Then immediately thereafter the whole relief program for this session will be considered by the full Appropriations Committee and should be reported back to the House, by the last of next week for its consideration.

Lines are being drawn in both Houses of Congress to decide the future course to be approved for relief projects. Last year the President allocated certain sums for PWA, WPA, Resettlement etc., having a well rounded program. The Administration's thought now seems to be to concentrate only on WPA for all future relief work; any amount to be allocated to other projects is uncertain. According to the many PWA projects completed in my District and the large number approved and awaiting funds for construction, it seems that the people in these communities highly favor continuing this PWA program, as well as continuing work on the WPA projects. It seems that there is no serious conflict in WPA and PWA work and consideration should be given to both kinds and character of work.

Last week 140 Members of the House had signed petitions to earmark funds for continuation of the PWA program.

Green's Drug Store Says Ad In Leader Brought In The Eggs

In the last issue of The Clay County Leader, Green's Drug Store carried a six-inch advertisement on page 2 in which the Drug Store offered a cream cone free to everyone bringing them a fresh egg. The ad was the only mention made of the offer in the paper, and when the day was over, Mr. Carl Green, proprietor of the drug store informed us, they had received over two cases of fresh eggs. Both young and old brought in a fresh egg and received their cream cone, but why not? Everybody likes ice cream, especially this season of the year. The fact that the drug store received some two dozen over two cases of eggs, or about 748 eggs to be exact, shows that The Leader is read each week and that it pays to advertise in its columns.

County Agt. Duncan Explains the New Farm Program

Just as the old Triple A programs added such words as "adjusted acreage," "base acres," "contracted acres," "compliance" and a score of others to the farmer's language, so the new AAA soil conservation program is bringing new words to the farm. The meaning of some of them is explained by M. S. Duncan, County Agricultural Agent.

Most important from a financial standpoint, he says, are "soil conserving payment" and "soil building payment." The first is the grant a farmer may get for shifting acres from "soil depleting" to "soil conserving and building crops." The second is the payment, never in excess of \$1 per acre, which a farmer may be entitled to receive to help finance new grass and legume and similar seedings. Farmers are beginning to talk readily about "soil depleting base." Soil depleating crops for Texas are corn, cotton, grain sorghums, sweet sorghums, millett, potatoes, rice, sugarcane, commercial truck and canning crops, small grains harvested for grain or hay, and peanuts. These crops take much out of the soil, return little. Grown exclusively, in the long run they will ruin the farm and the farmer. Then there are "soil conserving" crops. These help the soil hold its own, but only slightly increase fertility. These crops include all main kinds of old seedings of legumes such as alfalfa, and grasses such as sudan pasture if only grazed or clipped green; and winter cover crops if plowed under, or, if harvested, followed by summer legumes. Forest trees planted since 1933 also class as soil conserving.

"Soil building crops" are legumes plowed under as green manuring crops; biennial and perennial legumes seeded in 1936; summer legumes with forage left on land; and winter cover crops plowed under and followed by summer legumes. Trees planted in 1936 count as soil builders this year.
