McFARLANE HERE MONDAY EVE AND MAKES ADDRESS

Congressman W. D. McFarlane addressed a large crowd of citizens of Henrietta and Clay county, as well as a number of visitors from adjoining counties Monday night on the courthouse lawn.

Mr. McFarlane was introduced by Judge R. E. Taylor, who was in turn introduced by Attorney Donley Suddath. Both speakers praised the fine work Congressman McFarlane is doing for the people of the entire district, and in his address the congressman gave a detailed account of his work during the past session just closed.

Mr. McFarlane stated that through the various organizations now functioning under the federal government, something over \$2,785,022 had been distributed to the people of Clay county. He gave a breakdown of these enormous funds, showing just what each division had received. It was quite interesting to everyone hearing him. Mr. McFarlane is the only Texas congressman listed in "Plain Talk", a nationally known magazine as having voted one hundred per cent for the people on every occasion during the entire time he has been in the congress. Others were mentioned as having at times strayed from the fold. His address was heard by many who had not heretofore had occasion to listen to him, and following his address he received the hearty greetings of many local citizens who pledged him their loyal support.

Mr. McFarlane is making a district wide campaign, and hopes to be able to return to Clay county later in the campaign.

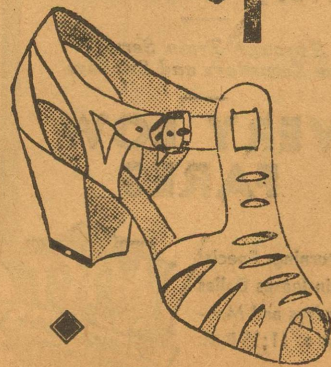

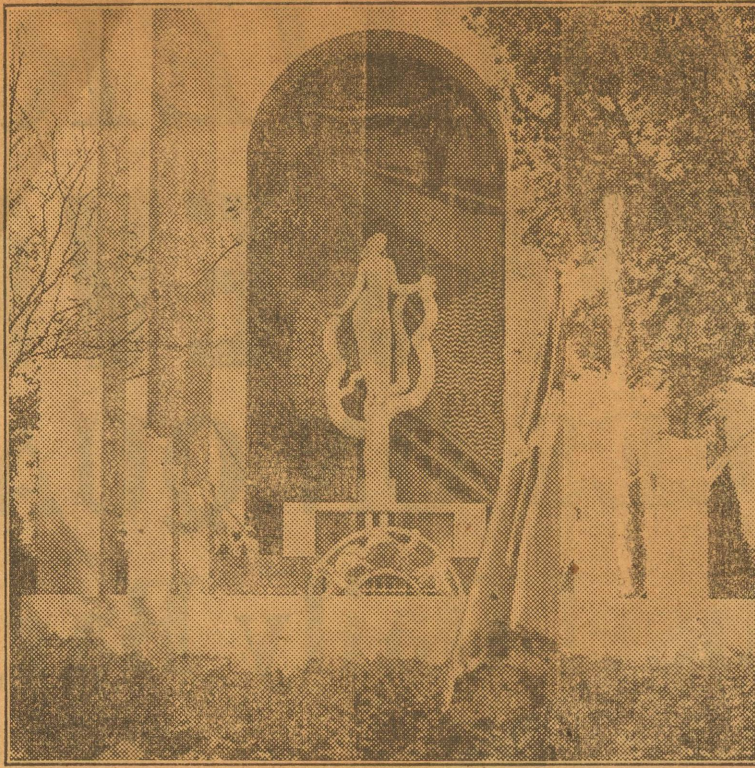
