Notice To Cattle Owners of County

Petitions to the Honorable Commissioners Court are being circulated over the county, regarding a county wide clean-up of Bang's Disease in cattle. Recently a meeting of stockmen was held, but due to a conflict of dates, representatives of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, did not get here. Due to this fact, another meeting has been called at 10 A. M., Monday, July 27th at the District Courtroom in the Courthouse in Henrietta. At this meeting, stockmen will be able to hear officials from the State Livestock Sanitary Commission and the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry explain the nature of this disease; how it is spread; methods of control and the steps necessary to eradicate the disease. All interested cattle owners are urged to attend this meeting.

Producers to Apply For Cotton Subsidy Before August 15th

Producers who have not applied for their cotton subsidy should do so at once. We have been notified that the State office will not accept applications after August 15. Buyers Certificates should be secured only when cotton was sold on days that will pay the producer a difference between the average price and 12 cents. Practically all producers have made application but some few have not and these few are now urged to get applications in if the subsidy is desired.

The following recommendation of the State Soil Conservation Committee has been approved by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Eradication of noxious weeds and grasses including Johnson grass, Bermuda grass, Nut grass, Blue weed and Bind Weed if eradication practices are practiced only on badly infested crop land and according to the following specifications will qualify such acreage as soil conserving acreage:

1. The location of the acreage for this purpose must be filed with the County Committee before eradication is started.

2. (a) Provided eradication is carried out by breaking the infested land, followed by intensive cultivation during the months of July, August, and September with a knife cultivator or disc harrow, or provided:

(b) The infested land is bedded and rebedded with a sweep or middle-buster at intervals of not more than thirty days, followed each time by harrow, in order to expose the roots to the weather.

The County Committee shall determine whether or not the land is sufficiently infested with one or more of the above noxious weeds or grasses to justify payment for eradication; and The County Committee shall determine whether or not the

Just as we go to press we learned that Mr. Felix Webb well known citizen of Petrolia, passed away Thursday at noon very suddenly, however he had been bothered with heart trouble for several years.

Cambridge Social Draws Large Crowd

The ice cream and pioneer get-together meet at Cambridge Wednesday night, drew a large crowd of pioneers and other citizens from all over the county. Talks of pioneer days were made by some ten or more old timers.

Mr. J. W. Douthitt told of Cambridge being the first town in the county, and when he first came, they had one general merchandise store, one saloon and a corn and saw mill and were planning to put in a flour mill, which later developed to be what was considered the best mill in the state. It was owned and operated by Mill Johnson. Later he bought the stone building and built the rock home which is still standing.

A Mr. Eldridge built a hospital and hotel, combined, and the Curtis' lived there then. Jim Curtis had a bank exchange there where he cashed checks and paid for cattle. Kit and Charlie Wells were cattlemen here at that time. They drove some of their cattle to Gainesville and some to Kansas City to the railroad to ship. That was in the early 70's.

Mr. Douthitt stated further that when he came to this part of the state there was no city of Wichita Falls. He with his brothers, Dink and Ossie Scott and several others went to Big Wichita and camped, after they had supper they moved about three miles over in the valley for they were afraid of the Indians. They got in with Capt. Ikard and later killed some buffalo on Holiday creek, and had plenty of meat and hides to use.

Mr. Burrus told of his first appearance to Cambridge, he had come by way of Gainesville on a buffalo hunt. He stated that at the time he went there there was a drug store, a hotel and a saloon. He did not know just what the saloon was and some of the boys treated him and he thought he would have to treat them, and soon he found that he did not know anything about the size of the place or anything else. His friend Tom Whatley had just married and located on the old Stine ranch on the river. He remembered that they had a telegraph line from

We, the Farmers Union Local, No. 322, Shannon, Clay county, Texas, want to take this means of thanking each congressman for supporting and voting for the Frazier-Lemke refinance bill. We condemn the acts of William S. Green, president of the American Federation of labor for using the name of organized labor against the Frazier-Lemke bill in a letter signed by himself, as expressing the feeling of organized labor condemning the proposed bill.

We also condemn the un-American and un-Democratic methods which have recently been revealed in efforts to block the proposed National legislation, known as the "Frazier-Lemke Refinance Bill."

We request that a copy of this be sent to the press and one to Hon. W. D. McFarlane, U. S. Congressman, with a request that he present it for publication in the congressional Record.

SANDERFORD FOR GOVERNOR

To the People of Texas:

In announcing my candidacy for Governor, subject to the Democratic Primary, July, 1936, I wish to make the following statement:

I am a native of Bell County, Texas, and I am in my 41 year. I have had fair educational advantages in the common schools, Wedemewers Academy, from which I graduated in 1914, and was for two years a student in Baylor University of Waco. I taught a rural school for one year. In the fall of 1917, I



voluntarily enlisted for Air Corps in which capacity I served for 21 months.

I am married and have three children, all within the scholastic age. I have been a member of the Baptist Church for over twenty years. I served for two terms as tax collector of Bell County and have been in the automobile and associate business continuously since 1923. I am not a lawyer. I was elected to the State Senate from the 21st District over two worthy opponents in the first primary in July 1932.

When I am elected I shall respect the constitutional rights of the people to have a governor who will stay on the job, cooperate with the Legislature and will neither squander the people's time nor abuse the opportunity for service by continually engaging in social political and pleasurable affairs. I will not use the powers of the office to place my relatives on government payrolls.

I favor:

First. A substantial reduction of Government expenses and where conditions will justify I shall, if necessary, use the veto power to reduce appropriations twenty five per cent.

Second. A three per cent retail sales tax for the purpose of paying the Old Age Pension and to take the place of the present real estate taxes for general revenue, schools and Confederate Pensions.

Third. I am opposed to any state income tax, as the Federal Government has already preempted the income tax field. It would be actment of such a tax by constituting a wise state policy to prohibit constitutional amendment. This would invite new capital to our state, result in the development of industry and the employment of more labor than perhaps any other one thing that could be done.

Fourth. I favor a graduated land tax for county purposes beginning with small valuations. This will increase opportunities for home ownership and tend to discourage the holding of large tracts

of land for speculative purposes. The Federal Government while loaning millions to banks, railroads insurance companies, towns, cities and counties, could render no greater service than to loan up to \$3,000.00 at 1 1-2 per cent interest on 21 years' time, without down payment to families with which to buy farm homes.

Fifth. I favor a reasonable chain store tax provided it treats everybody alike and does not exempt any special classes of business.

Sixth. To promote employment I favor a constitutional amendment exempting from taxation all textile, leather, paper and woolen mills, and other similar factories for a period of twenty years that have

Seventh. I favor the right of suffrage being extended to any 50 or more employees.

citizen on the payment of a small registration fee in lieu of our present poll tax.

Eighth. I subscribe wholly to the principles of local self-government with the enforcement of all laws administered honestly by local authorities and with the backing of the state government.

Ninth. I believe that labor has the inherent right to organize and

bargain collectively through representatives of its own choosing.

Tenth. Since the people of Texas have voted repeal, I favor the passage of such laws as will insure strict regulation of the liquor traffic and reduce the evils of this trade to a minimum.

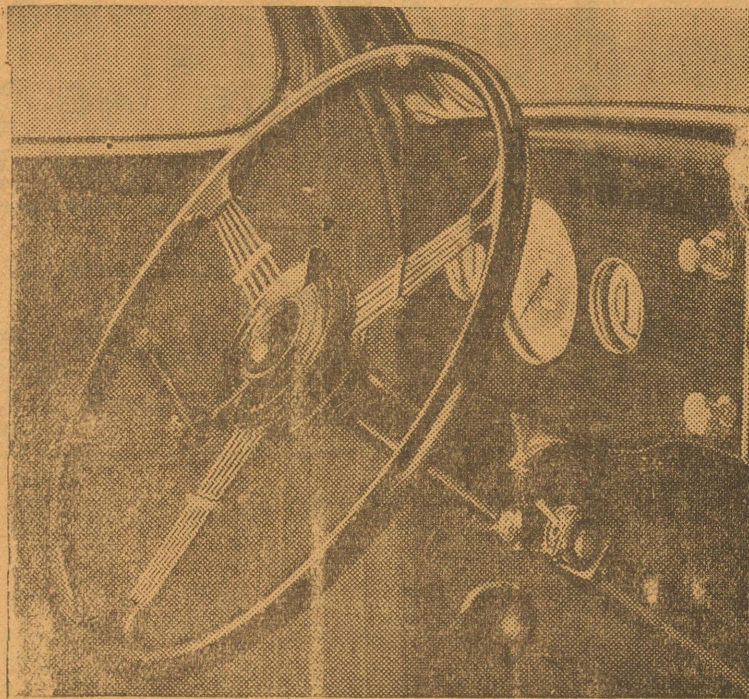

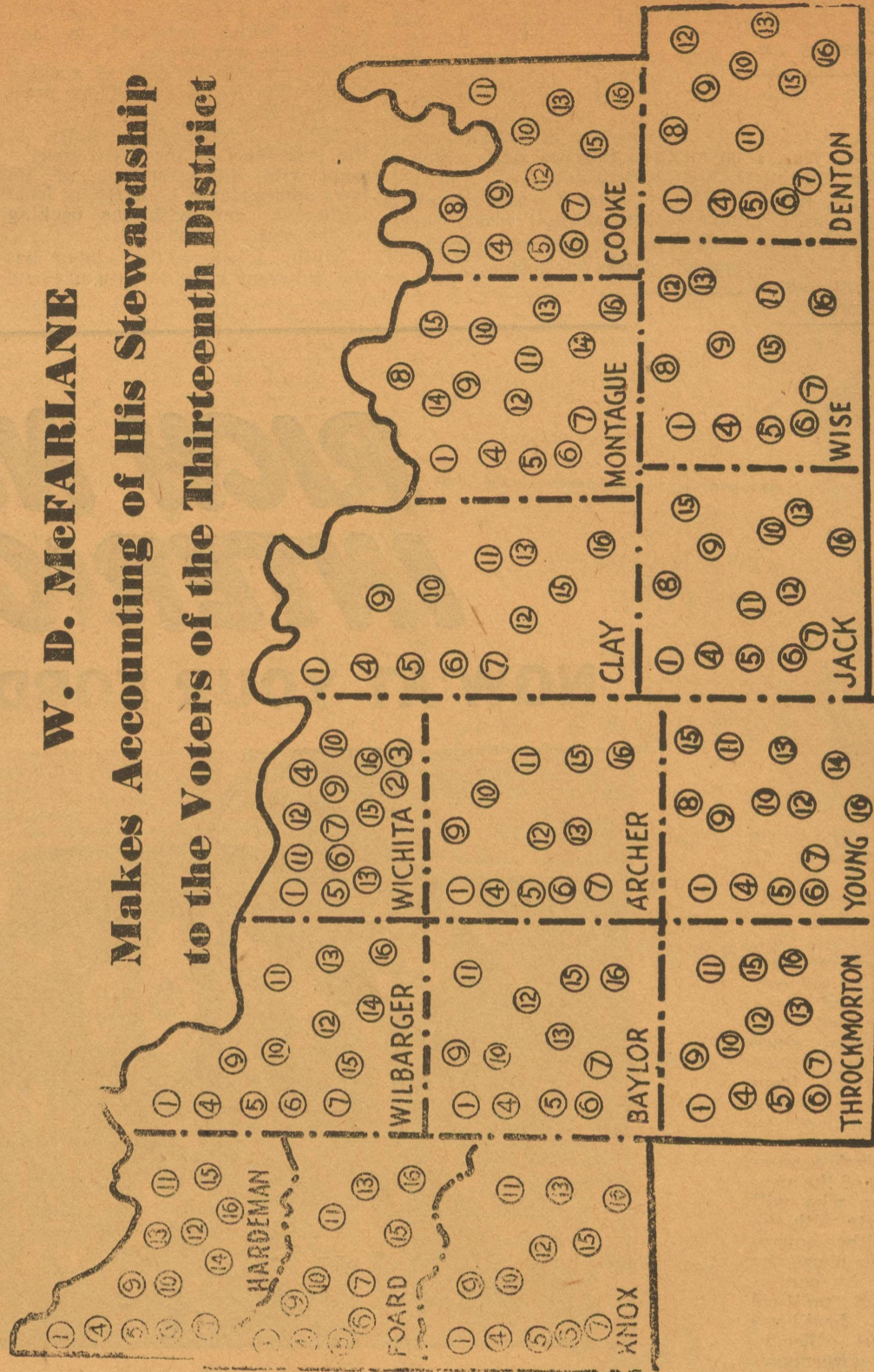

Isn't it just grand that we have an establishment in our town that is giving as many local men employment? I wonder if our citizens realize how much business they are bringing to our city, and how many families they are supporting? Of course, these families do their trading with the local merchants, and should, since they are making their money here.

It seems to me that this plant has meant much to our city, and we are proud of the fact that some of the very best hand made boots in the world are made right here in Henrietta.

Do you ever ride? If so, why not get you a saddle and a pair of their riding boots. I know that you will like them, and at the same time will advertise them out there.

Cambridge to Fort Sill, but he didn't see how in the world they could talk. There were no fences, and they had to kill the only buffalo they had and it was a poor one.

Most of the houses were dugouts, and Mr. Bob Grogan built the first box house that he remembered in this part of the country.

Mr. Chas. Dawson was the next speaker and stated that he came to this country in '79, and there were several buildings at Cambridge then, including a saw mill, a corn and wheat mill and a hotel. He did not live in Cambridge as his father had bought some land north of where Henrietta is now located, but later he helped to move Cambridge to Henrietta. He at that time drove oxen that belonged to Mr. John Schwend. Some of the buildings were torn down and others moved as they were. Those houses had to have as many as sixteen steers to bring them over.

Cambridge had some of the richest soil to be found anywhere at that time. Mr. Dawson further stated that he had been asked where Wichita Falls got its name. He said there were falls in the river near

where the city is now located.

Mrs. Flanagan stated that her husband had the first blacksmith shop in Cambridge and later moved it to Henrietta.

Mr. J. M. Garrett stated that he had never lived at Cambridge but lived at Shannon and when he first came there it took them three days to come to Henrietta, one day to come, one to shop and one to go back, and now he could make the trip in half a day.

Mrs. Nellie Bates Green stated that when her father came to this country that the nearest post office was Montague and the nearest railroad was Sherman, 110 miles. He and Billy Smith bought some land south of where Henrietta now stands and engaged in farming. They made the first furrow in Clay County. They raised the first corn and cotton in the county and had to haul the cotton to Gainesville and sold the corn to the local mill.

Miss Lula Johnson stated that her first recollection of Cambridge was going to school, her teacher being Mrs. Eva Jacobs who now resides in West Texas with her son Charles. She and Tex Rickard went to their first school together, and that he lived across the street from her. She told of visiting the mill at one time where her brother Frank worked.

B. P. Schwend stated that one thing that had not been mentioned was the first preacher at Cambridge, and his name was Bro. Stevent.

Other talks were made by Frank Bevering and Virgil Johnson. Many old timers as well as a number of others attended the meeting and all had a great time. Among the old timers present were: Mr. and Mrs. Joe Douthitt, Mr. Jno. Burrus, Mr. Joe Graner, Mr. Chas Dawson, Mrs. Rachel Flanagan, Mrs. Nellie Bates Green, Miss Lula Johnson, Mr. F. E. Hedrick, Mr. Luther Thaxton, Grover Thaxton, Cary Chadwick, E. P. Worsham, Frank Bevering, Jim Alcorn, Mrs. A. G. Berry, Mrs. W. B. Caldwell, Mr. B. P. Schwend and E. P. Bomar.

**To the Voters
Of Clay County**

It seems that the paramount issue in the race of W. D. McFarlane is the old age pension law. The Federal Government passed a law effective January 1, 1936, whereby it would pay one-half as much as the state paid and provided that the states would be paid as of January 1, 1936, if the states passed a state law effective at that time.

The Legislature of Texas passed a law effective July 1, 1936, and thus did not take advantage of the Federal Law. Had the State Legislature made the law effective January 1, instead of July 1, then the pensioners would have already received six months pensions up to July 1st.

Page 51 of the Senate Journal shows that Senator Sanderford made an amendment providing for a 3% tax instead of a 2% tax in order to raise more to pay the old age pension with, and that the State Senators voted against this amendment. Had they been in favor of the pensions, they would certainly have been in favor of more taxes with which to pay them.

Two Senate Journals show that both of these gentlemen voted to suspend all rules so that the law might be passed more quickly and it was passed on November 19, 1935. The question in my mind is that since it was passed in November 1935, they could certainly have made it effective January 1, 1936 and thus given the pensioners the additional six months pensions. Mr. Woodruff stated that he voted against the bill on the third reading because it was not effective before July 1st, but

Mr. Oneal gave no explanation for his vote. See page 267 of the Senate Journal.

Plain Talk Magazine, in its July 1936 issue has rated all of its members of Congress according to their public good and Mr. McFarlane has received a rating of 1000, which is the highest rating that could be given. Only three other members of Congress received this rating and none of them were from Texas. The lowest rating that a Texas member received was 71 and the rating varied from that figure to 929. We should be proud of the fact that Mr. McFarlane, our Representative, made such a record at this. This record should be enough recommendation for his re-election.

Our Representative, Mr. McFarlane has made a remarkable record on other questions and even his opponents are not criticizing his record or showing where they could equal it or even to do as well as he has. I have not yet seen where we could improve our position by electing any person to Congress other than Mr. McFarlane, nor is it seriously contended that this record would be equaled.

Through the efforts of Mr. McFarlane, about 2,250,000 has been spent in Clay County for public works, making home loans, and doing things for the public good. This record during the exceedingly hard times of our depression should be appreciated by the farmers, home owners and other people in the county, all of whom receive a direct or indirect benefit from it. Without this benefit, many of us are wondering what would have become of our country.

Representative McFarlane has had very little time to present his record to the people because Congress stayed in session for such a long time, but the public can remember that he sponsored and supported the Frazar-Lemke Bill providing for 1 1/2% money for farmers, the bonus bill and the payment of the bonus by which 145 veterans in Clay county received their bonus, the anti-holding Company law which

should result in decreased prices to the public from utilities and other Corporations, and the Security Bill regulating gambling on the stock market and the fleecing of innocent investors, and there are many other matters that space will not permit me to mention but the fact remains that his rating is that he voted for the public on all these questions.

Mr. McFarlane is a democrat and has always been a democrat. He did not vote for Hoover and did not support Hoover and this record cannot be claimed by at least one of his opponents, while the record is silent as to some of the others.
