young Ed Gossett of Vernon, who was runner up in a field of seven candidates, Congressman W. D. McFarlane enters the run-off with a lead of 10,147 votes over his opponent.

In a statement of appreciation to friends and supporter., Carried elsewhere in this issue of the Leader McFarlane gives the final vote of the entire district as furnished by the Texas election Bureau, which shows he carried 11 of the fifteen counties, and carried every voting box in his home county (Young county) by a majority of 471 votes over all his opponents and leads his opponent in the run-off campaign by 10,147 votes.

McFarlane urges his friends and supporters to continue their good work through the run-off in order that the program of President Roosevelt may be continued and which has for its ultimate purpose the betterment of the conditions of all our citizens.

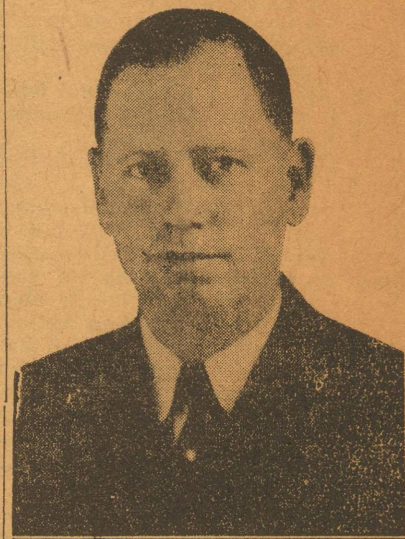

His many friends have been extending congratulations to Mr. Hall on his victory.

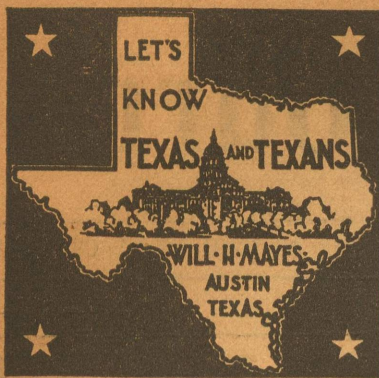
PIERRE M. STINE TO SUCCEED HALL AS CO. ATTORNEY

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the state and its people. As evidence of good faith inquirers must give their names and addresses, but only their initials will be printed. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. When the people of Texas voted on the amendment, did they know what they were voting for? M. K., Gonzales.

A. It is a legal presumption (somewhat strained, it is true) that all wisdom vests in the people, but it is difficult for the electorate to foresee what construction will be placed upon its actions.

Q. Are any of the original buildings at old Camp Verde still standing? E. B., Chapel Hill.

A. The camel corral was destroyed not long after the War Between the States, and the stone headquarters house burned in 1910, but an exact replica of the latter has been built on the old site, the old walls being used. The location is about northwest of San Antonio, 12 miles north of the town of Bandera, and three miles from the historic Bandera pass.

Q. Why did Stephen F. Austin threaten to imprison protestant ministers who preached in his colonies? F. G. Marfa.

A. One of the conditions of his grant was that his colonists should be Catholics. His imprisonment threat was regarded only as an effort to show that he was trying to observe that condition.

Q. Where is oil of cedar produced in quantity in Texas? V. C., Jasper.

A. A plant about 60 miles northwest of Uvalde employs some 50 workers. It is located on the Edwards Plateau in what is said to be the largest cedar area in this country, and perhaps in the world.

Agriculture Exhibit To Be Feature at Coming Reunion

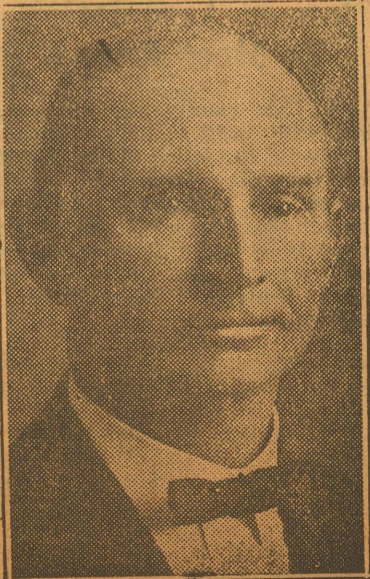

Graham Congressman Was Outstanding Man In First Primary

The following statement was made today by W. D. McFarlane on election figures.

There is an article in the Star Telegram of July 28th on page 4, first column 4, entitled "Just a Country Boy aim for Congress."

This article quotes Mr. Gossett: "With two other candidates from Vernon and without campaigning there by me I received a much greater percentage of my home county vote than any of the other seven candidates did of their home county votes."

A comparison of the vote for Young and Wilbarger Counties between McFarlane and Gossett is as follows:

Total vote for Young County, 3903; McFarlane vote, 2187; Gossett vote, 358. McFarlane percentage, 56 per cent.

Wilbarger County vote, 4841; McFarlane vote, 1219; Gossett vote, 2245; Gossett percentage 46 per cent.

Further comparing the votes of the two run-off candidates in their home counties shows.

Total vote, McFarlane's Home Box, 1054; McFarlane vote, 744 Gossett vote, 48; McFarlane percentage 71 per cent, Gossett' percentage 4 1-2 per cent .

Gossett's Home box, 369; McFarlane vote, 77; Gossett vote 155. McFarlane, 20 and 8-tenths per cent Gossett's percentage 41 and nine-tenths per cent.

Further comparison of the vote between the two candidates was that Congressman McFarlane carried each and every voting box in his home county by a stronger vote than ever given him before, and carried six voting boxes in his run-

off opponents home county by a strong vote and further, as answering Star-Telegram article: "without any campaigning there by me," it is well known an active campaign was waged by Mr. Gossett and his friends to secure his vote in Wilbarger County.

It will be noted from the front page article of the Star Telegram of July 28th that the tabulated vote of all other candidates was given except for the 13th district. Therefore the statement regarding Mr. Gossett's home county as shown above is shown incorrect.
