Eight Arrests In Car Theft Gang

Officers of the county and State recovered more cars in Bowie this week in the State Wide search for Auto theft suspects and stolen cars from Clay and Montague counties.

Eight arrests have been made and some have already been indicted in Montague county. Officers are spreading their search for what is believed to be one of the greatest automobile theft rings uncovered in years.

Kelly Rush, Texas ranger in charge of state operations in the cleanup was still in Bowie Friday directing search for one Montague woman and one Clay county woman both believed to be implicated.

Against one of those arrested in connection with the \$20,000.00 in loot uncovered near Vashti before dawn last Thursday morning were filed six charges. A Vashti resident was charged with receiving and concealing stolen cars, hitherto regarded highly in the community.

Five of the automobiles recovered were positively identified Friday night. One truck and one car were said to have come from Bowie, one car each from Georgetown, San Marcus, and Cisco. The Cisco car was identified by its owner, who said that the car was stolen in April.

This gang is believed to have been in operation for two or three years.

Henrietta Calves Sold At Top Price

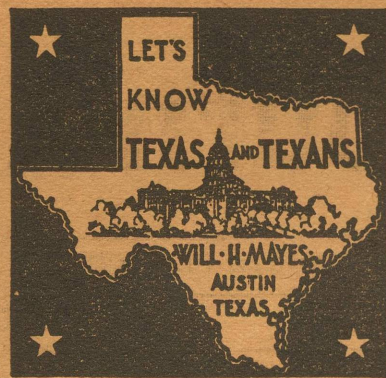

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. As evidence of good faith inquirers must give their names and addresses, but only their initials will be printed. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. When and where was there a "Hubbard College" in Texas? C. J. A. A college of that name was opened in 1881 at Overton by Prof. W. M. Crow, who afterward was superintendent of public schools at Galveston.

Q. I have seen a recent claim that artificial ice was first manufactured in Galveston in 1880. Is that correct? E. K.

A. According to a sworn statement of B. J. Benefield, of Jefferson, who sold and delivered it at 10 cents a pound, ice was manufactured in Jefferson by Boyle & Scott in 1874 or 1875. After about a year later Boyle went north to raise money to promote ice-making and was never heard of again. His partner went into bankruptcy and the plant was moved to Harrisburg, near Houston.

Q. When did Stephen F. Austin reach San Antonio to arrange with Mexican officials to carry forward his father's colonization plans, and when was he granted permission to explore the lands on the Colorado River? M. M., Navasota.

A. He arrived at San Antonio, Aug. 10, 1821, and at first was bluntly rebuffed, but through the intercession of Baron de Bastrop whom he chanced to meet, he was authorized to explore the Colorado on Aug. 14.

Q. For whom was Ochiltree county named? O. H.

A. Ochiltree county, created in 1876 was named for Gen. Wm. B. Ochiltree, a native of North Carolina, who came to Texas in 1839, was judge of the Fifth Judicial District of the Republic in 1842, secretary of the treasury in 1844, attorney general and member of the annexation convention in 1845 and of the secession convention of 1861. He died at Jefferson, Dec. 27, 1867. "Col Tom" Ochiltree, the noted and eccentric Texas wit, was his son.

**Gov. Allred Proclaims
Parent Teacher Week**

Governor Allred has declared the week of Oct. 19-25 Texas Parent-Teacher week in honor of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, which Monday will celebrate its twenty-seventh birthday. The Governor urges that attention be centered on child welfare work during the week.

Mrs. M. A. Taylor of Bonham, state president, also stated: "Nearly 2,000 congress units will observe the birthday of the Texas branch of the national congress and pay tribute to its founder, Mrs. Ella Caruthers Porter, and to these splendid women who rallied to her assistance."

The Governor's proclamation follows:

"To all to whom these presents shall come:

"On Oct. 19 the Parent-Teacher Associations will celebrate their twenty-seventh anniversary in Texas.

"The state of Texas is fortunate to have such an organization whose purpose it is to promote child welfare through co-operatives efforts of parents and teachers.

"Because of the necessity for proper co-ordination between the home and school in the life of our future citizenship, the continued advancement of the Parent-Teacher Associations is of great importance to the state as a whole.

"In recognition of the splendid work of this organization throughout its existence in Texas; now, therefore,

"I, James V. Allred, Governor of the State of Texas, do hereby set aside and proclaim the week of Oct. 19 to 26 of this year as Parent Teacher week in Texas, and I call upon our citizens to aid and encourage the Parent-Teacher Associations in the splendid work they are doing for the welfare of our school children, who will soon be called upon to assume the responsibilities of citizenship.

"In testimony whereof, I have hereunto signed my name officially and caused the seal of state to be impressed hereon at Austin, this the eleventh day of September, A. D. 1936. JAMES V. ALLRED, Governor of Texas."

Vote For Amendment No. 2

Listen, voters, when you go into that ballot-room on Nov. 3 to cast your vote, let us urge that you vote for Amendment No. 2,—known as the Amendment Establishing a Teacher Retirement System for Texas. As you know, the voters of Texas must O. K. the Amendment before legislation can be passed on it. It is one of the most important of all the constitutional amendments to be voted on at this time.

Its insurance-like nature in savings should commend it to your most careful consideration. It is not a new drain upon the tax-payer,—but instead, just a new savings plan of the funds already in existence. Do not get the impression it is a "pension" which will call for more taxes.

Pensions may be the only way to relieve some classes of the people who find themselves in financial destitution, but twenty-three states have shown us that there is a better way of providing for the aged and disabled teachers of our own state—a better way for the state as well as a better way for the individual.

The generally accepted plan permits the teacher to pay a certain small percent of his salary to the state. This amount is matched by the state, and the fund so accumulated draws compound interest to such time as the teacher, by reason of age or disability, must retire. Such a retirement system, when once established, becomes an economic means of taking care of aged and disabled teachers.

For the teacher who has through a series of years contributed to the upbuilding of the fund, the retirement allowance comes, not as charity, but as dividends on a personal investment, the amount received being governed by the length of service given and the amount of salary received while teaching. The per cent of salary contributed will be uniform for all teachers in a given state. Teachers moving from the state may withdraw all the money paid in with interest accrued.

A United States judge may be thirty years old when entering upon his duties. He may retire at the age of seventy on full pay the rest of his life, provided he has served ten years. He may serve as long as he lives. Texas retires members of her army between the ages of sixty and sixty-four, giving to each after thirty years or more of service a pension of two-thirds of their respective salaries at the time of retirement.

Making a long story short,—Voters, let's give the teachers a break.—Vote for Amendment Number Two,—thus aiding or showing our appreciation of that vast army of underpaid, overworked men and women, who from day to day shape the destinies of your children and mine, training them to carry on our industries, after we have "gently drawn the drapery of our couch about us to lie down to peaceful slumber," to sink into "that dreamless sleep that kisses our eyelids still."

BOB BURDETT TO HIS BOY

"My son, remember you have to work. Whether you handle a pick or shovel or set of books, digging ditches or editing a newspaper, ringing an auction bell or writing funny things, you must work. Don't be afraid of killing yourself by over-working on the sunny side of thirty. Men die sometimes but it is because they quit at 9 a. m. and don't go to bed until 2 a. m. It is the interval that kills, my son. The work gives you an appetite for your meals; it lends serenity for your slumber; it gives you a

perfect appreciation of a holiday. There are young men who do not work, but the country does not even know their names; it only speaks of them as So-and-So's boys. Nobody likes them; the great, busy world does not know they are here, so find out what you want to do and do it. Take off your coat and make dust in the world. The busier you are the less jam you are liable to get into, the sweeter will be your sleep, the brighter your holidays and the better satisfied the world will be with you."

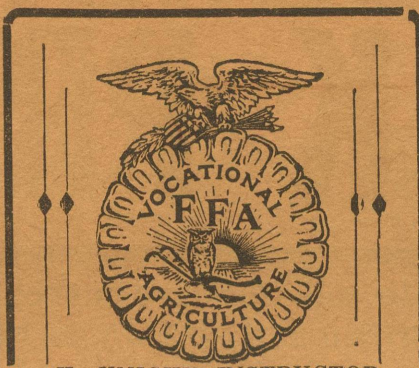
