

Old Man Texas might have been a wee bit hungry in 1935, but at that he managed to eat more than the combined total of Utah, North and South Dakota, Delaware, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, Wyoming, Mississippi, Montana and Idaho Consus Burgan figures released Census Bureau figures released Saturday by the United States de-partment of Commerce revealed.

Texas food sales for the year ran \$287,131,000 while the total of the other eleven States amounted to only \$282,891,000. Only citizens of New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and California managed to eat more than Lone Star Staters who ranked ninth in national consumption of food.
