Roy Miller, Director Texas Campaign Thanks Workers

Within the next few days when the results of our glorious victory here in Texas can be set up in definite figures, I hope to have the pleasure of writing each of you personally, giving you information which I am sure will make you proud and happy of the part you played in the campaign. Meantime, accept this as a personal to yourself.

Apparently we have achieved our objectives, both in votes and money.

While the compilation of returns has necessarily been slow, those received indicate the probability of the largest vote ever cast in a national election in Texas. Our original estimate, based on reports from County Chairmen, of a ratio of 5 to 1 has been greatly exceeded. If the present ratio continues to hold, the final result should draw a majority of not less than 8 to 1 for our great President and the Vice President our own John N. Garner.

Contributions continue to roll in from District and County Chairmen. We have passed our quota, and I am quite hopeful that final returns will show an excess of several thousand dollars over our goal. We hope to make a final report, showing receipts by Congressional Districts and continue, within the next few days.

New York headquarters advises there will probably be a deficit of several hundred thousand dollars, and I have assured Jim Farley that Texas would consider it a privilege to participate in an effort to liquidate it. If we are called upon, I am taking it for granted that the members of our splendid organization will deem it a real pleasure to render this further service.

Let me, in conclusion, assure you all of my heartfelt appreciation of your fine cooperation. In no campaign in the history of our State was there ever more loyal and unselfish service rendered by Texas Democrats. I am sure we all find ample compensation for whatever of time or effort we have given to the job in the glorious sweeping victory which, for another four years at least, insures an administration of our national government in the interest of all of the people.

Farley Says Party To Add 3 Governors At Next Elections

A prediction that the Democratic party would capture the governorships of three more States at the next elections was made today at a press conference by Democratic Chairman James Farley.

Noting that Democratic Governors will hold office in 39 states as a result of Tuesday's election, Farley asserted that the Republicans would "lose next time in New Jersey, Maryland and California," as well.

"Outside of South Dakota and California, they haven't got a Governor west of the Mississippi," he said. "The Republicans have virtually no local organizations in the Western States. In fact, they are worse off now than in 1932 and 1934."

He attributed the unprecedented Democratic success Tuesday largely to the superiority of local Democratic organizations.

Farley said the Democrats had spent about \$3,000,000 during the presidential campaign running up a deficit of approximately \$500,000.

The Post Office Department has agreed to cooperate with the Social Security Board to the extent of assisting in obtaining certain information from employers and the assigning of social security numbers to employees covered by Title II of the Social Security Act will be put into actual practice and use throughout the entire nation with the coming of January 1, 1937.

The local Post will distribute to all known employers on Nov. 16th and as rapidly thereafter as possible, a card FORM SS-4, supplied by the Social Security Board, and those employers having one or more employees in their service as of this date will be required to properly fill-out this FORM SS-4, which bears seven questions as follows:

1. City County State. 2. Business name of establishment 3. Address 4. Approximate number of persons now employed 5. Describe fully the exact nature of your business 6 (a) if a manufacturing concern, state principal products (b) If a manufacturing concern, state principal goods or services sold 7. If this establishment is a branch or a subsidiary company, give name and address of headquarters.....

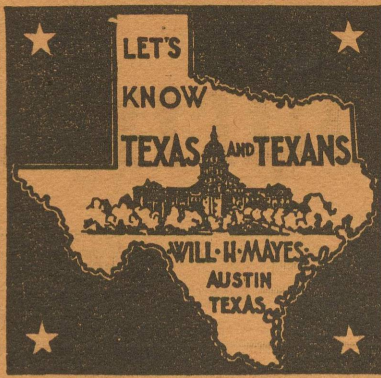

This Form SS-4 carries full instructions as to what is desired in the matter and is to be read and noted before filing out. Under Treasury regulations, it is to be filled out and returned to your local postmaster not later than Nov. 21, 1936. It may be handed to the local office carriers, delivered to the post office in person or by messenger, or it may be mailed in a sealed envelope, addressed as follows: Postmaster, Local. In no case is it necessary to prepay postage.

The prompt completion and return of the form is particularly important because it will be used in connection with the work of assigning account numbers to your employees, which will follow shortly. You will be officially notified, in due course, of the identification number assigned to you.

One of these Forms SS-4 must be delivered by the postmaster to every individual, firm, trust of estate, partnership, corporation, association, joint-stock company, and insurance company within the delivery of his office who has ONE or MORE persons less than 65 years of age actually in its employ on November 16, 1936, in any employment outside the following classifications or groups:

- Self-employment.
- Employees of the railroad industry who are subject to the Carriers Taxing Act approved August 29, 1935 (49 Stat. 974).
- Agricultural labor.
- Domestic service in a private home.
- Casual labor not in the course of the employers trade or business.
- Service performed as an officer



In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. As evidence of good faith inquirers must give their names and addresses, but only their initials will be printed. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. Where was Burnham's Crossing? B. M.

On the Colorado River near La Grange, where Houston's Army crossed in the "Runaway Scrape" of 1836, preceding the battle of San Jacinto.

Q. What effect, if any, is the Centennial having on attendance at county and community fairs in Texas this year? T. G.

A. Attendance at the local fairs and expositions this fall appears to be at least 50 per cent larger than heretofore, but whether the increase is due to the "Texas spirit" created by the Centennial can only be guessed. Perhaps a large part of it is.

Q. When did James Bowie first come to Texas? J. S.

A. It is thought that his first trip was made in 1817 to visit Jean La Fitte on Galveston Island, probably to interest him in Long's proposed expedition, which Bowie joined in 1819. For a short time he and his brothers, Rezin and John, were engaged in contraband slave trade with La Fitte.

Q. What is the inscription on the Centennial marker at the site of the old Confederate arms factory at Bastrop? D. R.

A. "Site of Confederate Arms Factory. Established by N. B. Tanner in 1862 for the manufacture of guns and bayonets. In operation until 1865."

Q. Where was Senator Charles A. Culberson born and reared and in what public office did he serve Texas? R. K.

A. He was born and reared at Jefferson, a son of David B. Culberson, who was in Congress from Texas for 22 years; was county attorney of Marion county, later becoming attorney general of Texas; was governor from 1895 to 1899, when he was elected to the United States Senate, in which he served until his death in 1923.

Eight Burn To Death In Texas Fires

Eight persons were burned to death in week-end fires in Texas as a raw, cold norther swept across the state, bringing freezing weather in the Panhandle and light rains.

At least five of the eight deaths could be attributed at least indirectly to the bitter weather.

At Brady, Carl Self, 32 and his 4-year-old daughter, Wanda Nadine were burned to death in a fire originating in the explosion of an oil cook stove. Mrs. Self was badly burned. Another daughter, Cleoma, 7, was playing in the yard and was not injured. Self died while trying vainly to rescue his child, whose charred body was recovered from the home by volunteer firemen.

Seek to Identify Victim

Police at Kilgore sought to identify the badly burned body of a man found early Sunday in the ashes of a two room house which burned to the ground. Police were investigating possible foul play after indications were found that the mans skull had been fractured.

Cold Snap Slowly Moves In; Wintry Weather Expected

Wintry weather that is scheduled to take complete control of the Henrietta area Sunday was gradually moving in late Saturday night with the mercury in the forties and a brisk wind blowing from the north. After shifting around during the day, the wind settled in the north about 10 p. m.

Temperatures at points north of Dallas at midnight already were showing the effects of the cold weather. Wichita, Kan., had 22 degrees, Kansas City 27, Tulsa 35, Oklahoma City 33.

Much colder weather is forecast for this area Sunday. Near seasonal temperatures are expected to prevail later in the week.

Saturdays maximum was 62 degrees, at 4 p. m.

Mrs. Borah said the Senator probably will be back at his law office for a short time Monday.

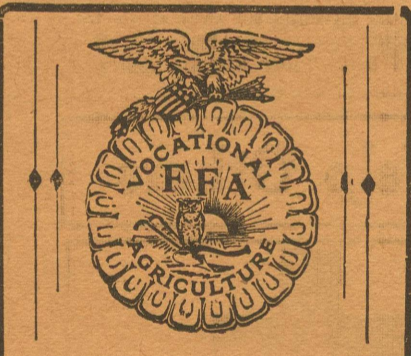
Texans Did Nice Job At 1935 Dinner Table, Census Figures Show

Old Man Texas might have been a wee bit hungry in 1935, but at that he managed to eat more than the combined total of Utah, North and South Dakota, Delaware, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, Wyoming, Mississippi, Montana and Idaho. Census Bureau figures released Saturday by the United States department of Commerce revealed.

Texas food sales for the year ran \$287,131,000 while the total of the other eleven States amounted to only \$282,891,000. Only citizens of New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and California managed to eat more than Lone Star Staters who ranked ninth in national consumption of food.

**JUDGE EARL HALL IS
COMMENDED BY STATE
APPELLATE COURT**

As Judge Earl Hall was county attorney when the complaint in the C. Privett case was filed for "selling whiskey in dry territory, Clay County, and fine of \$100 being assessed," was affirmed by the Court of Criminal Appeals November 4th, the appellate court stating "We commend the good work of the county attorney of Clay County in that his complaint was so written that we sustain conviction. The information, in this particular case was supplied by G. S. Low, inspector for the liquor control board who testified he bought a pint of whiskey from Privett."

Previous convictions under Texas local option law have been reversed on appeal because of defective

informations filed against those charged.

At the same session of the appellate court, it reversed and remanded several other convictions, in which the information charged the defendant with "possession" of liquor. Possession is not a crime, the court said, even in dry territory."

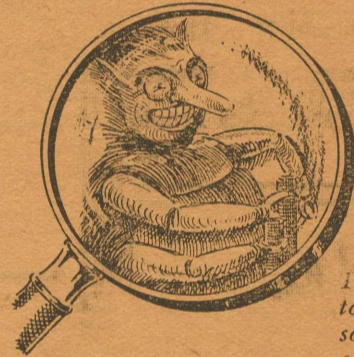

Delay Announced In Mailing Pension Checks

Orville S. Carpenter, acting director of old age assistance, said today \$7,000 checks, totaling \$1,360,000 would not be mailed until about Nov. 20, pending approval of the new Texas pension statute.

Carpenter had returned from Washington where he conferred with officials of the social security board, which was expected to approve the recently enacted law Nov. 13.

"If approval is given on that date," Carpenter said, "the federal grant of approximately \$800,000 will reach us a few days later as it has to pass the U. S. comptroller before the treasury can forward it. I am confident that both the new law and administrative plan will be approved."

The "deliberation" amendment to the omnibus tax bill, passed by the legislature in special session, is expected to reduce the pension rolls from a potential 160,000 to a stable 85,000.
