Mr. Benno Miller, age 70, died June 12, at his home in Alton, Illinois.

PRIZES WILL BE GIVEN COUNTY'S BEST STRING BAND

The Henrietta and Clay County Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a contest between different string bands throughout the county, to be held in Henrietta July 5th, on which day the celebration will be held this year instead of the 4th. This date will be on Monday. To be eligible a string band must be made up of Clay County citizens and each band must be composed of members living in the community from which the band came. There is no limit to the size of the band nor the different kinds of instruments as long as they are string instruments. Selection of numbers to be rendered is left entirely to the performers. Singing with instrumental accompaniment permissible. The Chamber of Commerce will award the following cash prizes. First prize is \$15.00, 2nd, prize is \$10.00 and \$5.00 to all other bands that play.

The judges will be selected from communities that have had no entry, and their names will be known only to the president and secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. Rev. Paul J. Merrill of Henrietta will be in charge of the arrangements and all bands desiring to enter should get in touch with him as soon as possible. It is hoped that all communities that can get a band together will enter. There is no charge or fee whatsoever for entering. Send in the name of your band and its leader at once to Rev. Paul J. JULY 19TH IS CLAY COUNTY DAY AT DALLAS EXPO.

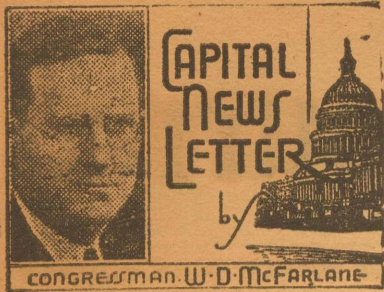
Clay county has been given July 19th as their day at the Dallas exposition. A program has been partly arranged to be broadcast from the exposition grounds. The Henrietta High School Band and a String band made up from the different communities of the county will be on the program with other numbers. Rev. Paul J. Merrill has been named by the Chamber of Commerce as chairman of the committee to make arrangements. On this committee with him are C. B. McDonald and A. L. Mallick. They are asking all citizens of the county who are intending to visit the exposition at some time during July to do so on 19th if at all possible. To do this will solve the transportation problem. There will be between 50 and 60 on the program and if a large caravan of cars can be formed and a considerable number of them giving seats for one or more of those who are on the program there will be no difficulty in getting them to Dallas and back. It is suggested that this caravan leave Henrietta about 6 in the morning and travel together. The Chamber of Commerce will provide a "trouble shooter" car and mechanics to make the entire trip to be on hand in the event they are needed for any car trouble that may happen. Those who can make the trip at this time are requested to get in touch with one of the above named committee as soon as possible so all arrangements can be completed and everybody ready to go at the appointed time. THE FARM TENANCY BILL

Last week the House Agriculture Committee reported favorably a modified farm tenancy bill which authorizes a \$10,000,000 appropriation for this year, \$25,000,000 for the second and a \$50,000,000 for the third year, for the purpose of assisting worthy farm tenants to purchase farms on 30-year terms at 3 per cent interest.

The administration raised these questions as to the basis for such a program:

1. Should the program be so planned as to give aid only to the farmers who have been exploiting their soil, or should it recognize the farmers who have been treating their soil right, and encourage them to go on doing so?
2. Should the program as a whole, either in its planning or its operation be judged on the basis of attitude toward it of a few gentlemen farmers, whose principal occupation is not farming?
3. Should the Democratic System of local control and administration of the program by the farmers be continued, or should it be handled from Washington on a completely centralized basis?

OLD AGE SECURITY

According to recent information from the Social Security Board, 27,704,396 Social Security Act Members have been signed under the old age benefit program; 45 states have enacted unemployment compensation laws; 1,747,500 needy persons in 43 states will receive national, state, and local aid under the public assistance plan during June. Of this number 1,347,000 are needy aged, 34,800 needy blind; 365,000 dependent children. Texas is one of the few states that has yet failed to provide necessary legislation or funds to receive Federal Assistance to aid the needy blind, and dependent children.

THE TOWNSEND PLAN

Representative McGroarty, the author of the Townsend legislation of the last Congress, spoke June 14 and apprised the Congress of the present status of the Townsend plan. He said:

"Mr. Speaker, my purpose in addressing the House this afternoon is to endeavor to clear up some confusion and misunderstanding which I am aware exists in the minds of Members of Congress regarding the so-called and once popularly styled old-age pension movement known as the 'Townsend plan.'"

It is well known in Congress and throughout the Country that I was the first sponsor in Congress of this Townsend plan which, for a time, justly boasted of a vast following among the people, but which is now a complete total wreck due, I believe, wholly to the erratic and dubious methods employed by the man whose name the movement bore. The thing that happened was the sudden decision of Dr. Townsend himself to throw a monkey wrench into the Clements machinery. Able and efficient as Clement was, he made one fatal mistake, he overplayed Dr. Townsend.

The news writers sensed that the fine Italian hand of Clements was back of it all. So, the news began to take note of Clements. His picture also began to appear in the newspapers and magazines. He also was regarded as news. The good doctor could not stand for a rival. He had come to believe he really was what Clements had built him up to be in the minds of the crusaders. And when his state of affairs had come to pass, Clements had to go. There was no room for two idols.

There is now on the clerk's desk of the House a petition to discharge the Ways and Means Committee from a House resolution which represents this wreck. It is called "the general welfare act" by its author, the latest of the adventurers to enter the once lush green Townsend pastures which are now a waste of withered grass. It is a strange doc-

ument. I am embarrassed beyond words to learn that members of the House think it is my bill and have signed the discharge petition in that understanding. It is not my bill. I have nothing to do with it. I trust that Members of the House who have signed the petition will remove their names from it. If they do not so I fear they will live to regret it. They are in danger of losing the respect and confidence of the people.

Their names on the petition places them in unenviable position of aiding and abetting an effort to raise \$5,000,000 in nickles and dimes from the old folks on the promise of Dr. Townsend that he be given that huge sum to enable him to pass his \$200 a month "general welfare" bill in the present Congress. That is what your name means on the petition. Your names have appeared in the Townsend weekly 6 consecutive weeks as backers of the campaign to get the old folks to raise \$5,000,000 hand it over to Dr. Townsend without any strings on it, and on the understanding that they will get \$200 a month pensions at this session of Congress, not away off in the future, but "now". That is the word, "now" published in the Townsend weekly. My dear colleagues, can you afford to lend your names to this palpable fraud? You cannot. You must take your names off the petition".

There are other bills pending before Congress that will more adequately provide for the aged and those needing Social relief than existing laws, and it is to be hoped that this legislation will be enacted at this session.

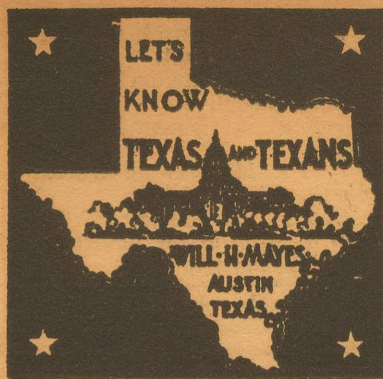

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. As evidence of good faith inquirers must give their names and addresses, but only their initials will be printed. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. ...Did Jean Lafitte ever claim to be governor of Texas?

A. In October 1819, Lafitte assumed the office of governor of Texas under the pending revolutionary government of Mexico and required all persons on the Island of Galveston and all owners and captains of vessels then in the Galveston harbor to swear allegiance to the Republic of Mexico. The formation of this so-called government took place on the schooner Carmelita Gray, at anchor in the harbor.

Q. What became of the women and children of the "Dolores" colony, who were captured by Indians in 36, while the colonists were trying to escape from the country?

A. The fate of the two children was never known. The two women Mrs. Horn and Mrs. Harris, were taken by the Indians to their lands on the Upper Arkansas, where they were finally ransomed through the influence of William Donoho, then Santa Fe merchant, and sent up to Missouri where they soon died. Mr. Donoho, who afterward became a prominent citizen of Clarksville Texas, was also instrumental in ransoming Mrs. Rachel Plummer captured by Indians at Fort Parker, May 19, 1836.

Q. What was the Greer County dispute and how did it originate?

A. In the 1819 treaty between the United States and Spain, Red River was given as the boundary line. On existing maps the upper river stream was shown as a waving line in a northerly course, but when explored was found to have two forks. Texas claimed to the north fork, and in 1860 organized Greer County from the strip between the forks. The United States claimed the southern, or "Prairie-Dog Town Fork" fork as the line, this resulting in doubts as to titles and retarding development of the 2,227,200 acres in the disputed territory.

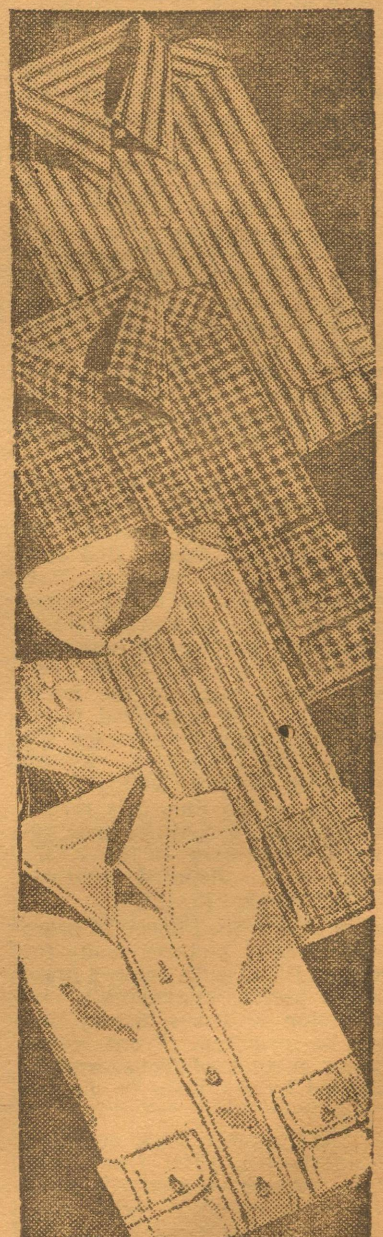

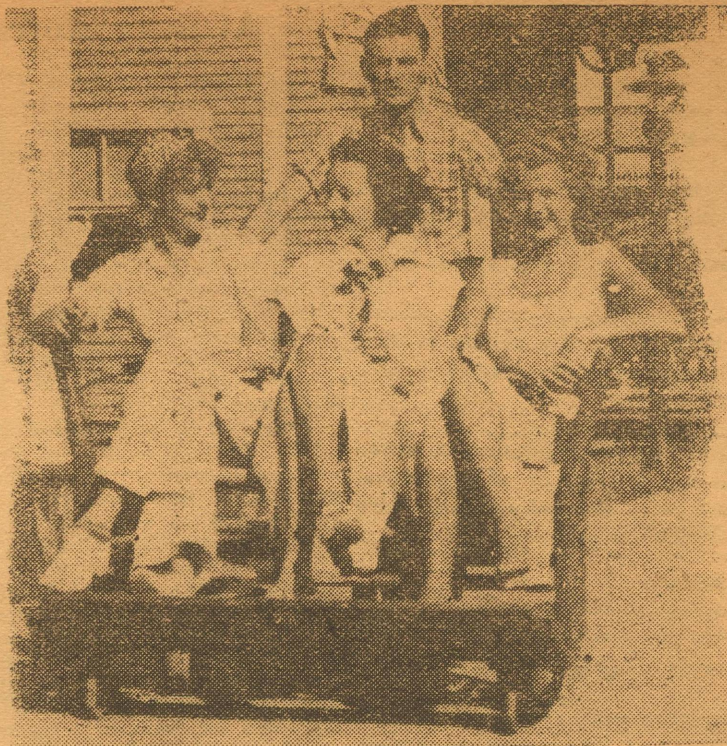

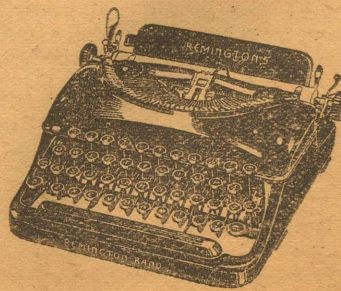

City Saves \$1500 In Its Deal With Local Mechanic

Built and Assembled Here In John Cunningham Garage

—The Clay County Leader.

The Henrietta City Council met some time ago, and after a hearing decided the city of Henrietta needed some new and modern fire equipment.

Mayor Frank Bunting appointed a committee of three Aldermen consisting of Mr. A. B. Staggs, Chairman Mr. A. J. Oheim and Mr. B. P. Schwend to start negotiations toward this proposition. The committee instructed the Secretary, Mr. E. M. Hilgenfeld, and C. G. McKinney to secure prices on all types of pumps, front and amidships, of 500 gallons a minute capacity and to ask for bids on long wheel base truck with a cab. The city wished to trade in a practically new Dodge truck on the new fire truck. The bids were all received, and very promptly rejected. Following instructions of the committee, Claude G. McKinney secured the services of Johnny Cunningham, an expert welder, and local garage owner, to build fire equipment onto the Dodge chassis owned by the city. After considerable study and a thorough examination of figures, the committee found that they could save the city about \$1,500.00 by assembling the equipment and building the fire truck.

Several new ideas were incorporated in the construction of this fire truck. A 300 gallon booster tank, built the entire length of the truck frame, comes up behind the cab in an L shape, with the top of the tank acting as a large funnel when filling the tank with buckets, is one of the new features. The purpose of this booster tank is to apply water quickly at a high pressure of 250 pounds on the fire right off the truck. You can drive this truck in second gear, operating your pumps while in motion. This pump is equipped for hydrant connection also, and is guaranteed to pump 500 gallons of water per minute through two, two and 1-2 inch hose at 150

pound nozzle pressure. The truck is also equipped with hose body built above and around the booster tank to carry 1500 feet of two and one-half inch hose. Baskets are on the running board on each side to carry 300 feet of one inch hose. The truck is equipped with the latest types of siren, fog lamp, spot light, axes and hand extinguishers.

The truck was tested three times after its completion and was found to fulfill all expectations and requirements of a fire truck. The council was well pleased with this arrangement and since the truck has been completed have invited anyone interested to call and inspect it.

Mr. George Spivey, prominent citizen of the Joy community was looking after business at the County Agents office Monday. He reported quite a lot of threshing going on down that way.

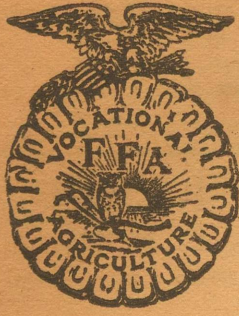

With work of this sort these boys will have these pastures carrying two to three times as many stock in a few years as they would carry under natural conditions. The Henrietta School and outlying districts having boys in this work are very proud of them and boys coming to Henrietta for their first time next year are urged to take vocational Agriculture and train for that greatest of all occupations which is the foundation of all civilization.
