FARM TENANCY

The Conference Committee agreed on the farm tenancy bill on Thursday. There was little change made in the agreement between the two Houses. The bill as finally passed appropriates \$10,000,000 for the first year; \$25,000,000 for the second; and \$50,000,000 the third and succeeding years, and permits the tenant pur-chaser to secure a deed to his farm when paid for, however if paid for before the expiration of five years he must wait until five years has elapsed to seem the deed. This provision is considered reasonable because the Government furnishing the money for purchasing the farms and for rehabilitation loans, is entitled to know that the tenant will be amply protected and properly supervised during the rehabilita-
