## SEVEN INJURED AS FOUR CARS CRASH EAST OF HENRIETTA

—The Clay County Leader.

Seven persons were injured Monday night about 7:30 in an accident twelve miles east of Henrietta. This accident involved three cars and a truck.

The injured persons were: Elmo Barnes of Bowie, A. E. Moore, companion of Barnes, a man known simply as Smith, his wife and child, all of Bluegrove; W. B. Gregg of Wichita Falls, and J. C. Seigler of Dundee.

Mr. Moore was the most severely injured of the group and was rushed to Wichita Falls in an ambulance. He is reported in a very critical condition there.

The accident occurred near Smith Creek on the Fort Worth Highway when the truck, driven by J. C. Seigler of Dundee stalled in the middle of the highway drowned out by the heavy rain. Officials investigating the accident reported that the Plymouth Coupe driven by Barnes from Bowie, a Plymouth sedan driven by Gregg of Wichita Falls, and the Buick coupe driven by Smith from Bluegrove, all piled upon the truck because of the heavy rains obliterating everything.

Smith, his wife and child were all given emergency treatment by Dr. T. K. Jones and then released. Barnes was taken to his home in Bowie here he was confined because of his inability to walk with his severely bruised knees. The others received minor injuries.

The truck was loaded with cattle. All the cars were going eastward when the accident occurred on the highway.

Highway patrolman O. H. Shands and E. K. Browning investigated the crash with the aid of Sheriff Bomar and Deputy Sheriff Henry Fields.

## Gas Company Testing For Line Leaks

Odorization of natural gas on a part of the Lone Star Gas System will begin Monday, July 26, Community Natural Gas Company officials announced. The project is in compliance with a recent law passed by the Texas Legislature as a safety measure.

The odorant will be introduced into the system's main lines to permit the detection of leaks, and will not effect the usefulness of the fuel, it was explained. When the gas is burned, no odor is noticeable and it will give off no nauseating fumes nor any gas injuries to clothing, rugs, drapes or furniture.

The odorant will be first introduced into main lines at Gordon, Trinidad, and a point east of Grosbeck, Texas; later at Hollis and Fox Oklahoma, and at a point south of Chillicothe, Texas, and at a number of intermediate points. The odorizing project, reaching most of the towns served by the system in Texas and Oklahoma, will be completed in about three weeks.

Introduction of the odor will not be noticeable for several days, it was pointed out, because of summer conditions and the low load on the system. Towns farther away from points of odorization will receive its effects later than those closer to those points.

To some persons the odorant will smell like fumes from a refinery, to others like burning rubber. It will be definitely noticeable if a leak in a line exists or if a cock or a burner is left open and unlighted. The company has advised its customers to call a plumber if repairs are necessary. It was pointed out that odorization will not create a hazard but will warn customers if a leak occurs in a line or connection.

The Lone Star System is proceeding with its odorization plans now in order to avoid the possibility of waiting until the fall and winter demand starts.

## Two Young Boys From Joy Die After Being Struck By Lightning Monday

Eddie Ford, 11 was instantly killed and his brother Billy Joe Ford, 6, was fatally injured Monday afternoon about 5:30 when they were struck by lightning. They were the sons of Mr. and Mrs. O. V. Ford.

The two boys, with two sisters and one brother were playing by a spring which their father was cleaning out about one-half mile from their home and about six miles southeast of Joy. They had just finished the work that was to be done and had started to the house when the two children were struck. The little boy, Billy Joe, crawled to his father a few feet away and said, "Daddy." The other boy was killed instantly. The parents immediately got into their automobile and drove about 400 yards before Billy Joe died.

A few seconds earlier and the entire group of five children would have been killed. They had all been standing in the spot struck by the bolt of lightning.

Eddie Ford was killed by the bolt of lightning which struck just behind his right ear in the back of his head and traveled the full length of his body. Billy Joe died as a result of the electrical shock he received while standing so near his brother. The two boys were about four feet apart at the time of this terrible catastrophe.

The bodies were taken in charge by the Moore undertaking home and funeral arrangements were all under the direction of that company.

Services for the two boys were held in Joy, Wednesday morning at 9:30 at the Joy Baptist church, with Rev. Tom Mayfield and Rev. R. L. Patterson officiating.

Survivors include the parents, two sisters, one brother, and four grandparents.

## PROPERTY OWNERS' TAXES REDUCED

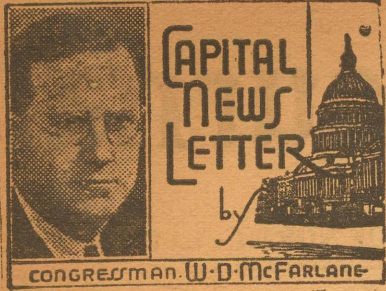

CAPITAL NEWS LETTER

CONGRESSMAN W.D. McFARLANE

FARM TENANCY

The Conference Committee agreed on the farm tenancy bill on Thursday. There was little change made in the agreement between the two Houses. The bill as finally passed appropriates \$10,000,000 for the first year; \$25,000,000 for the second; and \$50,000,000 the third and succeeding years, and permits the tenant purchaser to secure a deed to his farm when paid for, however if paid for before the expiration of five years he must wait until five years has elapsed to secure the deed. This provision is considered reasonable because the Government furnishing the money for purchasing the farms and for rehabilitation loans, is entitled to know that the tenant will be amply protected and properly supervised during the rehabilitation period.

While this measure did not go as far as many advocates desired, it is to a step in the right direction and will assist many worthy tenant farmers to re-purchase farms.

CRIME

Mr. Edgar Hoover, Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, says that 17 per cent of our crimes are being committed by persons of less than voting age; that only a small part of these crimes, the more vicious, the more cowardly, the more desperate totalled 1,333,526 last year. This means that every 24 seconds last year some one was robbed or assaulted or plundered, or attacked or murdered; that we have an army of 200,000 persons in our Nation, who are free, but who have murder in their hearts and who will take a human life before they die; and that there are 300,000 other persons going about their lives believing themselves secure, planning for the future, who one by one at the rate of 36 every day must die at the hands of a murderer. The Department of Justice has 7,200,000 finger prints of criminals throughout the world. The Government has the best law enforcing agency today and is accomplishing better results than at any time in the history of this country. While a special investigator was showing the boy scouts from our district through the FDI Department, in pointing to the scroll of "G" men killed, he stated that each one had been killed by an ex-convict, which should give us food for thought regarding our loosely-drawn parole laws.

FARM LOAN INTEREST

Last Tuesday, the House by a vote of 260 to 98, overrode the President's veto of one year extension of 3 1-2 per cent interest on farm Federal Land Bank loans and two year 4 per cent interest extension on Commissioner's farm loans. This measure now goes to the Senate and should it receive the necessary 2-3 majority, this measure would become a law. The above vote indicates the sentiment of the House and the feeling that the farmer is entitled to a reasonable interest rate, especially when it is known that most industrial and manufacturing concerns for many years have received their current loans at less than 1 per cent interest. Friends of the farmer, believe he is entitled to the same fair consideration upon interest, tariffs and all other matters, as he has been given for years to the brokers, speculators, industrialists, manufacturers and all for years to the brokeas, doobleds others dealing in other peoples' money.

SENATOR ROBINSON'S DEATH

The Congress was shocked to learn last Wednesday of the untimely passing of Senator Robinson, upon whose leadership the President largely depended in passing the remainder of his program this session of Congress. His passing caused a week's delay in the legislative program and gives the reactionaries an opportunity to test their strength as to whether or not they can force adjournment before the Senate can select a new leader to direct the fight for the remainder of this session. It is believed Senator Barkley will be selected majority leader and the President has strongly urged the passage of the Court bill and the rest of his program before the adjournment of this Congress. The writer believes the President's program should be enacted at this session, and thus give the country a breathing spell and an opportunity to see how the program works before another campaign is upon us.

DENTON COUNTY, County State fish hatchery improvements at Lake Dallas; federal funds, \$19,780; sponsor's funds, \$20,294; workers, 104.

HARDEMAN COUNTY, County Farm-to-market road bridge repair; Federal funds, \$2,855; sponsor's funds, \$1,393; 49 workers.

The special interests are using all possible pressure to force adjournment, in order to block the court reform, the departmental reorganization, wage and hour, and social security legislation. The country will know by the time you read this letter, whether or not these forces have been successful in their efforts to block this program and force adjournment of Congress. The writer feels that it is the duty of Congress to stay here and vote their convictions on all these matters before adjournment. The House is well up with its work; the Senate filibuster on the Court program has placed them behind the House on the legislative calendar.

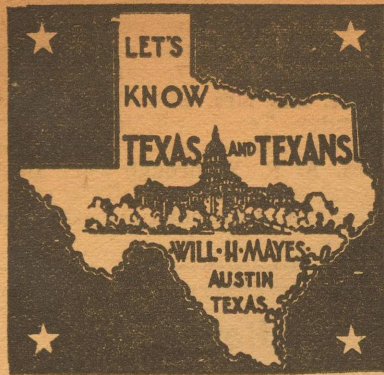

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. As evidence of good faith inquirers must give their names and addresses, but only their initials will be printed. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. What radio broadcasting station has call letters that spell the name of its home city?

A. W-A-C-O is the only radio station in the world with call letters to spell the name of its home city in full.

Q. For whom was McLennan County named?

A. For Neil McLennan, a native of Scotland, a member of Major George B. E. Math's staff that surveyed the Bosque and Brazos section in 1837. McLennan exchanged land in Robertson's colony for land certificates, which he located in the Bosque valley in 1839, and became the first settler of the county that was named for him when organized in 1850.

Q. What is the length and general route of the "Old Spanish Trail?"

A. It is 2,767 miles long (about one-third of it in Texas), and extends from St. Augustine, Fla. to San Diego, Calif., through Pensacola, Mobile, Beloxi, New Orleans, New Iberia, San Antonio and El Paso. The entire route is through former Spanish territory filled with Spanish historic interest and much of it still remindful of days of Spanish occupation.

Q. Where and what was Bird's Fort.

A. It was a settlement in what is now Tarrant County, established in 1840 by Jonathan Bird, one year before John Neely Bryan located some 22 miles down the Trinity and laid the foundation for his trading post that was later to become Dallas.

Q. When did the courts first sustain oil proration orders and on what basis?

A. The first judgment sustaining oil production orders of the Texas Railroad Commission was rendered April 16, 1933. It was based on the "Potential Ability of individual wells to Produce." §

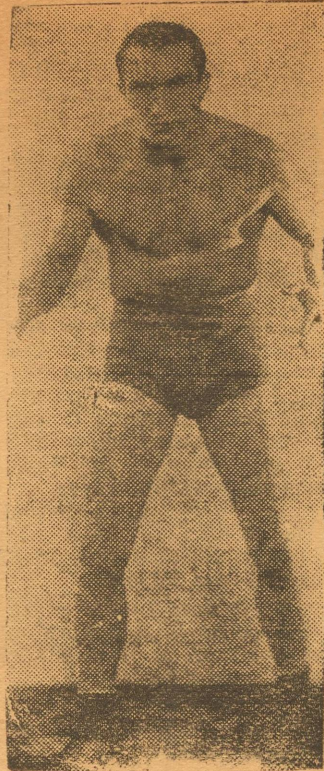

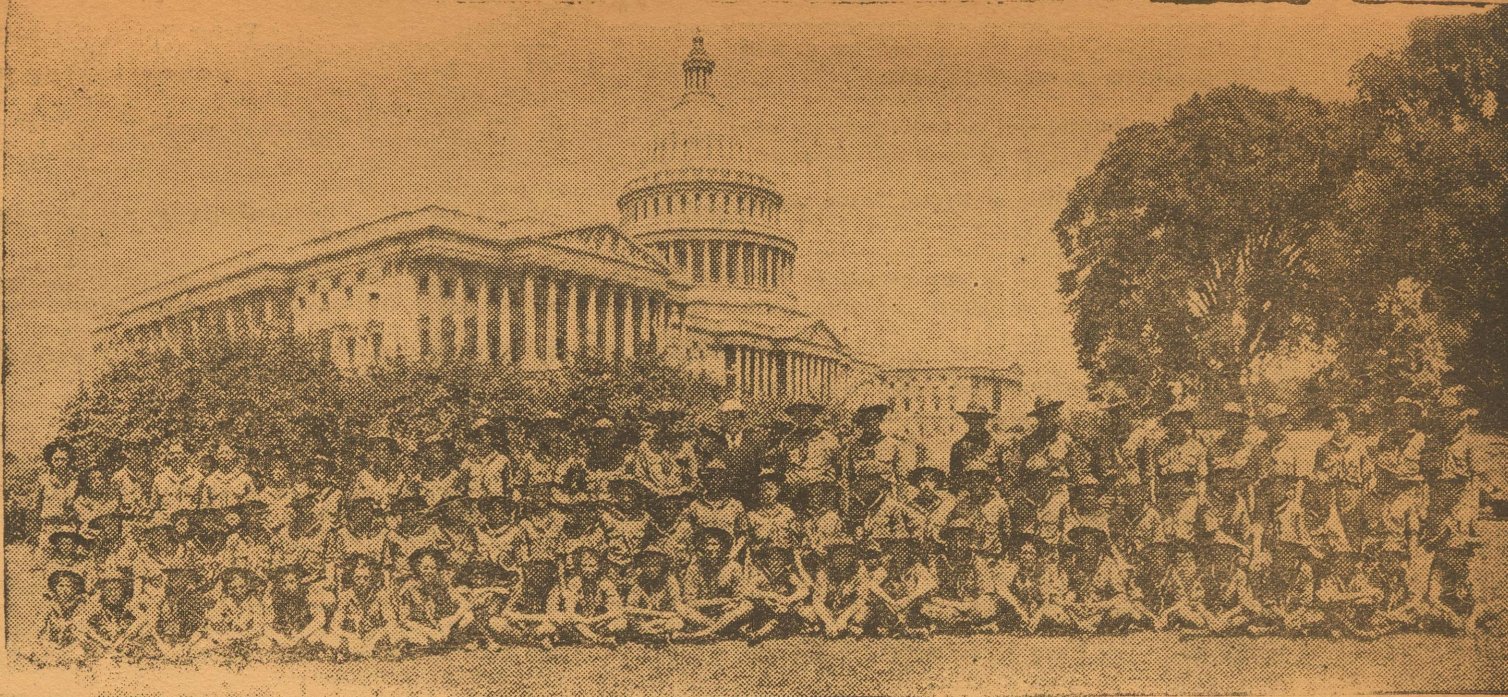

## Trench Silo Used For Storage of Feed

—The Clay County Leader.  
A shortage of feed in time of drouth can be largely overcome by the proper storage of feed during favorable years. A trench silo is not a new thing by any manner of means. It far past the experimental stage. It is a thing that has been proven and tried over a period of time. Feed can be stored in good years and kept until needed. Storage stored for eleven years when opened was good as new. Feed put down this way gives more value per acre, for it does not shrink. It eliminates shocking, as it can be cut and hauled directly to the trench. It saves burned feed that is otherwise worthless and makes a good grade of silage. It is safe from damage by fire, wind, weevils and other insects. Trenches are not expensive to build and no extra labor is required in filling. Those who have tried this method of saving feed, like it and are following it. Dissatisfaction comes from a lack of understanding. Mistakes are made that could easily have been avoided. A correct method of handling ensilage is much easier than the many incorrect methods and eliminates all the objectionable features of the trench silo. Talk to the County Agent or Vocational Agriculture Teacher; read and study the Experiment Station Bulletin; dig a trench silo and save this feed that is burning up, because of the drouth.

### July Poultry Pointers To Poultry Men

(By John H. Wood.)

—The Clay County Leader. July is the month that most poor producing hens stop laying for that reason you should have your flock serviced. In this servicing it should cover treating the shanks for scaly leg mite blood test for Pullorum and Typhoid, vaccinated for chicken pox, and treated for lice or other vermin internally and externally.

### CENTRAL TEXAS HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB WOMEN IMPROVE KITCHENS

—The Clay County Leader. In order to make the kitchens of their homes, where they spend a great amount of time, more attractive and more comfortable, Central Texas home demonstration club women are stressing kitchen improvement, according to reports from county home demonstration agents in that region.

"Running water in my kitchen is one of the most convenient things I have ever had," says Mrs. E. H. Tucker of Johnson county who has just installed a water system in her home. Before the new electric automatic pressure pump was installed at the well about 800 feet from the house, the Thacker's had a hand force pump which they used. The installation of the tank and motor, piping the water, and running the electric wires about 800 feet, cost about \$130 and now the family has water piped into the kitchen, yard, wash house, cow lot and pasture.

From an apple box, Mrs. Joe Smith of Parker County has made a table that aids her in canning. She put legs on the box and made it just the height of her stove. Double ball bearing rollers were used so that the table could be moved easily. Mrs. Smith already had the paint for the table, and the rest of the material cost her only 38 cents.

"I needed storage space and a small amount of table space in my kitchen," says Mrs. C. A. Morris of McLennan county, "so I bought a small chest which fits into the 16 inch space between my stove and door. nOtop of it I placed an old piece of marble that belonged to my mother making it the height of my stove. Besides giving me room to store my electrical equipment near the stove where the outlet is, I have the marble slab for setting hot foods on when removing them from the stove, and in pouring up home-made candies."

### CENTRAL TEXAS FARMERS FIGHT GRASSHOPPERS IN EFFORT TO SAVE CROPS

Central Texas farmers are using poison materials furnished by the Federal government and are buying poison and bran with their own money to fight the grasshopper infestation which is threatening Central Texas crops, according to county agricultural agents in that section.

"Poison furnished by the government has saved cotton farmers of Hamilton county an estimated \$25,000 on this year's crops, not including the value of destroying the grasshoppers before they have a chance to multiply," says T. D. Craddock, Hamilton county agricultural agent. To date, approximately 15,000 pounds of poison and bran has been given to 105 farmers.

Approximately 32,000 pounds of grasshopper poison has been distributed to Wichita County farmers. The county is furnishing cotton seed hulls to mix with the bran and poison furnished by the government. The county also provides for the mixing and distributing.

Farmers who attend the twenty-eighth annual Farmer's Short course at Texas A and M College during August 16-19 will find a simplified program presented by representatives of Texas A & M College faculty, Extension Service, Experiment Station members and other agricultural workers, according to Roy Snyder chairman of the general Short Course committee.

The practice of offering a series of courses on varied subjects during the entire period of the Short Course has been discontinued, except in a few instances. Instead, farmers will find that each of the four days of the Short Course has of agriculture. The mornings will be taken up with a series of discussions, and in the afternoons the program will be broken up into sections which will give each individual an opportunity to learn more of the subject in which he is most interested.
