## Basketball, Volley Ball Schedules For County Meet

Mr. Frank Morgan, Athletic Director of Clay County Intercollegiate League events has announced the Basket Ball-Volley Ball Tournament schedule that will be held in the Petrolia High School Gymnasium beginning February 11.

## Leasing Activities On Boom Again

After thirty-one years, big time interest is again turning to Henrietta and Clay County. In 1901 the discovery of the Petrolia-Henrietta Oil and Gas field caused a huge wave of interest from the major companies to center here. Again there is that same interest in this section and large blocks are being assembled and leases are checkerboarded all over the county. Landowners are feeling confident again with only the confidence that a good bonus can give. That not only includes the drilling blocks, but the checker-board leases as well. Several deep tests are under way, and many others are assembling rigs and material because of the favorable reports of geologists and geophysical engineers have given them the confidence that has been needed for so long to discover within the next few months what every individual and company is interested in. Black Gold.

Roy Johnson of Ardmore, Oklahoma is drilling at 3160 feet in the W. C. Wallace 4,000 foot test on Block 34, J. H. Belcher Subdivision, located 12 miles Southwest of Henrietta and 3 miles West of Bluegrove. This is located about two miles Northwest of the old Nebraska-Texas well on the Myers Ranch, and is being watched with unusual interest. The Nebraska-Texas well has been producing for several years from the Strawn formation.

Walter Gant and his Associates have staked out three new locations for new deep tests. These are to be on the Earl Spring Worsham Ranch properties, about ten miles East of Henrietta. They will be North and West of the present wells now producing from the deeper sands.

Wirt Franklin and Ray Dawson have staked location for a 4200 foot test, about 4 miles North of Henrietta on a large block of acreage. The well is to be on the A. B. Staggs Ranch, Block 34, Angelina County School Land, Abstract 3. This well will be an extension of the Henrietta Petrolia Gas and Oil Field on a well-defined structure which has been favorably reported on from both geophysical and subsurface information. Geophysical engineers with the past few months and very favorable reports were returned. The

**CAPITAL NEWS LETTER**

**THE LUDLOW RESOLUTION**

By the time you read this you will know the outcome of the Ludlow Resolution and whether the question as to whether or not the respective states will have submitted to them for a vote of the people the question: "Shall the United States Declare War on \_\_\_\_\_?". Should the United States become involved in such a foreign war without determining the views of the people on this important question?

William Jennings Bryan, while the world war was still a national tragedy wrote:

"If there is any merit at all in the doctrine that governments must derive their just powers from the consent of the governed, surely the governed ought to have the right to decide for themselves, by popular vote, a question as important as going to war. No other subject comes so near to the people.

"It has long been the custom to submit constitutional amendments to a popular vote, and in cities bond issues and grants of franchises are submitted to popular vote. If the people have the right to be heard on such questions, how much greater is their right to be heard on questions that involve their lives and the exercising of the taxing power as it is employed in time of war.

"A referendum on war would give greater assurance of peace than any other provision that could be made".

The Ludlow Joint Resolution reads as follows:

"Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States to provide for a referendum on war.

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States.

"Section I. Except in the event of an invasion of the United States or its Territorial possessions and attack upon its citizens residing therein, the authority of Congress to declare war shall not become effective until confirmed by a majority of all votes cast thereon in a Nation-wide referendum. Congress, when it deems a national

crisis to exist, may by concurrent resolution refer the question of war or peace to the citizens of the States, the question to be voted on being, Shall the United States declare war on \_\_\_\_\_? Congress may otherwise by law provide for the enforcement of this section".

Please drop a post card in the mail today giving me your views on this important question.

**THE PRESIDENT'S SPEECH**

Speaking to the Joint Session of Congress, the Members of the Cabinet and high dignitaries of all foreign nations represented, the President delivered one of the most courageous and important speeches ever delivered by a President to Congress. The speech was translated into seven different foreign languages and broadcast throughout the world. The message fully covered the many perplexing questions now pending before the Government.

On Foreign Affairs the President, in part said:

"In spite of the determination of this Nation for peace, it has become clear that acts and policies of nations in other parts of the world have far-reaching effects not only upon their immediate neighbors but also on us."

On Agriculture and Industry the President remarked:

"Our national life rests on two nearly equal producing forces—agriculture and industry—each employing one-third of our citizens. The other third transports and distributes the products of the first two or performs special services for the whole".

"I gladly note that measures which seek to initiate a government program for a balanced agriculture are now in conference between the two Houses of the Congress. In their final consideration I hope for a sound, consistent measure

which will keep the cost of its administration within the figure of current Government expenditures in aid of agriculture. The farmers of this Nation know that a balanced output can be put into effect without excessive cost and with the cooperation of the great majority of them.

"To raise the purchasing power of the farmer is, however, not enough. It will not stay raised if we do not also raise the purchasing power of that third of the Nation which receives its income from industrial employment".

On balancing the budget the President laid down these conditions:

"The first, we continue the policy of not permitting any needy American who can and is willing to work to starve because the Federal Government does not provide the work.

The second is that the Congress and the Executive join hands in eliminating or curtailing any Federal activity which can be eliminated or curtailed or even postponed without harming necessary Government functions or the safety of the Nation from a national point of view. The third is to raise the purchasing power of the Nation to the point that the taxes on this purchasing power—or, in other words, on the Nation's income—will be sufficient to meet the necessary expenditures of the National Government".

On Tax Reform the President said:

"First, the total sum to be derived by the Federal Treasury must not be decreased as a result of any changes in schedules. Second, abuses by individuals or corporations designed to escape taxpaying by using various methods of doing business, corporate and otherwise—abuses which we have sought, with great success, to end—must not

be restored. Third, we rightly change certain provisions where they are work definite hardships, especially on the small business of the Nation. But speculation should not be over earned income.

"It is human nature that this or that tax is responsible for every ill. It is human nature on the part of those who pay graduated taxes to attack a taxes based on the principle of ability to pay. These are the same complainants who for a generation blocked the imposition of a graduated income tax. They are the same complainants who would improve the type of flat sales tax which places the burden of government more on those least able to pay and less on those most able to pay".

In fact every citizen of the nation should carefully study this message as it has been acclaimed by many the most straightforward message ever delivered by a President to the Congress.

**THE CALENDAR**

The House began last Thursday the consideration of the Independent Offices Appropriations Bill and will continue consideration of same until Thursday of this week when the House will begin the consideration of the Treasury and Post Office Appropriation Bill. The Senate, after hearing the President's Message on Monday, adjourned until Wednesday and resumed consideration of the Anti-Lynching Bill on Thursday which will be pending business until disposed of.

### JUST CRUISING

(By the Captain)

President Roosevelt's Jackson dinner address, which he delivered at the dinner given in the city of Washington and which address was broadcast to a nation wide hook-up and heard at the dinners given in each of the forty-eight states was an interesting part of the program given at the dinner served in the Adolphus hotel in Dallas Saturday night. The president was presented to his nationwide audience by Postmaster General James A. Farley who had first-hand opportunity of hearing just what he had to say, without having to wait for a daily paper the next morning to read "only a small portion" of what this great American, who is following in the footsteps of Andrew Jackson in his battles against monopoly and for the common good, had to say. Mr. Roosevelt says what he thinks in language that even a child can understand, and for that one reason, if not for many more, what he says resounds from coast to coast and from the great lakes to the gulf. None need wonder just what the president had in mind!

Jesse H. Jones, chairman of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, was a speaker at the Dallas Jackson Day dinner and his address was one delivered in a very plainly spoken manner and without any degree of hurly-burly! Mr. Jones is like most all other financiers; they think in terms of money and returns, and seldom, if ever, are public speakers, but when they speak they "say something!" He eulogized Andrew Jackson and his long fight for the masses during his administration as president. U. S. Senator Josh Lee of Oklahoma closed the program with one of his famous addresses and with his wit and humor interspersed with his statements regarding what the administration is seeking to do, he kept his hearers, numbering something over fourteen hundred, in a high state of excitement throughout. It was a \$30,000 dinner, as announced by Myron G. Blalock, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, who presided.

Those Japanese soldiers who crossed over into the territory set aside for the internationalists and which territory is under the governing authority of an international council, and

look a couple of British policemen and drug them across the lines and gave them a severe beating, and later knocked a French policeman down when the latter came to the aid of a Chinese woman who was drawing water from a well on the international side and whom the Japanese soldiers were beating, have again brought near a real crisis; already protests have been filed and most likely apologies offered and accepted from high Japanese authorities. There is surely a limit to such things and if this continues there is yet likely to be a very bad ending to the Japanese-Chinese conflict. It is to be hoped not, but it looks as though those Japanese are determined to bring about war.

Clay county is surely coming in for its share of oil development within the next few months. Already large acreage blocks have been secured by various well-known operators, and all-in-all, at this time, some ten deep tests are being prepared

and will be drilled to depths ranging from 4200 to 6000 feet. Others will likely be located and drilled during the next few weeks. Seitz and associates in southwest part of the county on the L. S. Wright farm, is now down 4960 and will continue to the 6000 foot level.

Local cafes and hotel and rooming houses are enjoying a noticeable increase in their business, brought about by visiting oil company scouts and lease men. Much acreage in Clay county is being blocked and preparations are being made to test the county for all the deep sands. Let the good work continue and ere long the old town and county will "come into its own!"

If you haven't yet paid your Poll Tax, better go around and get that little slip of paper, as it is the only way in which you can have a part in saying who shall conduct the affairs of government, both local, state and national.

### COMMISSIONERS COURT

The Commissioner's Court approved the plans and granted permission to the State Highway Department to finish Highway 66 from Byers to Red River. The work on this Highway is to begin within the next ten or 15 days.

**"THE REST OF THE  
RECORD"**

The Secretary of State recent-  
ly invoked the "tramp" corpora-  
tion doctrine, the effect of  
which was to discontinue the  
policy of granting permits to  
"tramp" corporations for the  
transaction of business in the  
State of Texas.

"Tramp" corporations as de-  
fined by Edward Clark, Secre-  
tary of State, are corporations  
whose charters have been ob-  
tained in a foreign state by citi-  
zens of the State of Texas for  
the purpose only of transacting  
business in Texas and with no  
bona fide intention of transact-  
ing business in the state from  
which their charter was obtain-  
ed. It was felt that the practice  
of granting permits to foreign  
corporations of such nature was  
a discrimination against those  
corporations incorporated in  
Texas because the stockholders  
of the "tramp" corporations are  
not required to comply with the  
capital stock requirements as  
prescribed by the Constitution  
and laws of this state for domes-  
tic corporations. Such foreign  
corporations also found it easier  
to evade the jurisdiction of the  
state courts.

tion doctrine, a charter obtain-  
ed under such circumstances  
from another state confers no  
rights upon the corporation and  
is not within the rule of comity  
between states which permits  
corporations chartered within  
one state to transact business in  
another.

At the present time a total of  
approximately 300 "tramp" cor-  
porations are now doing busi-  
ness in Texas. Under the policy  
invoked by the Secretary of  
State, such corporations will be  
requested to surrender their per-  
mits and organize corporations  
under the laws of this state. Since  
these corporations paid their  
franchise taxes up to May, 1938,  
they will not be expected to sur-  
render their permits and form  
as domestic corporations until  
the end of the present fiscal  
franchise tax year. It would be  
an unfair demand upon these  
corporations to request the  
change to be made at a time  
which would cause them to pay  
a double franchise tax for a part  
of the taxable year.

Under this new policy, the At-  
torney General will be requested  
to file suits against those cor-  
porations which fail to comply  
with the law or which may be  
exempt from the "tramp" cor-  
poration rule and any money  
which may be tendered by such  
corporations to the Secretary of  
State for 1938 franchise taxes  
will be held in suspense pending  
disposition of such suits.

It is expected that this new

policy not only will eliminate  
the present discrimination  
against domestic corporations  
bring the corporations under  
closer jurisdiction of the state  
courts, but it will increase the  
revenues to the state by the ad-  
ditional incorporation fees un-  
der Texas laws.

Doubtless the policy will  
arouse some opposition on the  
part of those who have been  
operating under the old rule,  
but its invocation should be re-  
ceived with favor by the stock-  
holders of domestic corporations  
who have had to comply with  
the capital stock requirements  
of this state while in a sense  
competing with those of the  
"tramp" corporations who es-  
caped the requirements of the  
Texas law.

widespread interest created among the oil fraternities during June, 1937, by the unusual showing of sands in the L. T. Burns-Sanzenbacker well, the Nutter Well, and that of Roy Johnson on the Wallace Tract, both located in the Blue Grove potential field, will be carefully watched by scouts for the major companies and the various independent operators of this territory. Many of these companies have obtained a good spread of acreage for protective purposes to the North and West of these wells. Open acreage is scarce in this vicinity, with most the play centering East of Halsell and in the general vicinity of Bluegrove.

The extreme Southwest part of Clay County is receiving much attention also from some of the larger oil operators at this time, due to the good showing encountered in the Hanlon-Buchanan deep well on the L. S. Wright land which is being tested out for pay at 4960 feet. This rig is one of the best that has been brought to this section of Texas, and preparations have been made to carry the well down to the 6000 foot level, in event the present showing is not sufficient. Seitz-Comegys and Seitz, Inc., are engaged in drilling of a deep test on the S. Wright Ranch in this part of the County, T. E. & L. Co. Section 2632, which is about two miles Northwest of the Hanlon-Buchanan 6000 foot test. Many of the larger companies have secured protective acreage on both of these wells.

Ben Russell and L. E. Bowen have assembled about 4,000 ac. of land, part of which is located within the Southwestern limits of the city of Henrietta, and extends for about two miles South

and East. Landowners have that happy smile on this block, with cash bonuses. Drilling agreement for 4000 foot test to begin within 60 days.

The Wood Petroleum and Royalty corporation of Oklahoma City let a contract for a 5000 foot test three and one-half miles southwest of Petrolia Wednesday. This test is on the I. H. Kemper lands to be drilled 330 feet out of the southwest corner of block 44, Bosque county school lands.

J. S. Bridwell has purchased a large block in the Douthitt and Boddy Ranch vicinity, located about 9 miles Northeast of Henrietta, and a deep test will be spudded in on this block within 90 days from January first. Mr. Bridwell and Associates are now drilling offset wells to the three wells on the Edrington Ranch, Section 24, BBB&CRR Co Survey, Abstract 898 which they have established production in.

Barnett Petroleum Corporation are moving in rig and material on Block 30, Grayson County School Land, Abstract 156, Nutter Estate Ranch, located 9 miles South of Henrietta in the Bluegrove section. This is a 4,000 foot test and is about a half mile North of the old well drilled by Chicago interests years ago which had pay sand at 2240 feet. This section has been checked carefully by several prominent geologists and

Up to this time there have been few deep tests in Clay county although Clay county has always been considered potentially as having a great amount of the deeper pay sands.

Indications now point to the fact that these sands will be given a thorough test during the early part of this year. Most of the wells drilled in Clay county have sought to find shallow sands which have been producing in the Henrietta-Petrolia Field since 1901. It is believed that this field is fed from larger and deeper pools which may be proven during the present play. Hotels, cafes and other business concerns in Henrietta report a large increase in business from the oil men and others who are active in securing oil leases and blocks for acreage in all parts of Clay county.

As this thing grows and grows, so will Henrietta, and to date it looks as though everyone will have to step lively to keep up with this town at the rate the boom is piling up.
