

You can solve us selve some you and the war effort by avoiding any wasteful use of telephone facilities. Here are a few simple suggestions:

4 WAYS you can help

1. Speak clearly. Having to repeat yourself takes time, and ties up the lines needlessly. Please talk in normal tones directly into the mouthpiece, with the lips about ½ inch away.

2. Hang up carefully. A book or other object under the receiver may put your telephone "out of service." Please replace the receiver carefully. It will insure your getting all incoming

3. Answer promptly. Even seconds are important these days. However, when you make a call, give the other fellow enough time to reach his telephone before you hang up.

4. Avoid "rush hours." You may avoid the possibility of occasional delays if when possible you will not make long distance calls during peak hours - 10-12 A.M., 2-4 P.M., and 7-8 P.M.
