Gov. Coke Stevenson has proclaimed the week beginning April 19th as "Navy Appreciation Week" in Texas and during this period the solicitation of funds will be made. A chairman has been named in every county in Texas in order that the entire state may be afforded an opportunity to contribute to this war effort.

"The Navy Relief Society is the substitute for the head of the family when a man is in the Navy, Coast Guard or Marines and is fighting our battles on the high seas or battle fronts," County Chairman Felix Watson stated. "The Navy Relief Society relieves our navy men of the anxiety concerning the welfare of their loved ones at home. In contributing to this fund we are sharpening the fighting edge of the fighting men."

R. Dee Price Urges Farmers Vote May 2

Contrary to popular belief the department of Agriculture advises the carry over of wheat on July 1, 1942 will be 753,000,000 bushels as compared to 630,000,000 bushels on July 1, last year. The war effort requires that we produce other foods by so doing.

A vote for wheat marketing quotas on May 2 is a vote for:
1. A fair distribution of a limited market and fair prices.
2. An organization of supplies so transportation systems will not be clogged.
3. Releasing acreage to be used for production of foods needed in the war effort.
4. Maintaining soil fertility.
5. The 85 percent parity loan that is responsible for present price level.

Our present wheat supply is enough to last 2 years.
All storage facilities are filed to capacity.

The 85 percent loan gave U. S. growers about 96c per bushel on 1941 wheat. In Canada wheat brought 70c in Australia, 56c, and in Argentina 55c.

Marketing Quotas will apply to all producers who have planted 15 acres or more or whose normal production of the acreage is 55c.

Marketing Quotas will apply to all producers who have planted 15 acres or more or whose normal production of the planted acreage is 200 bushels or more.

You will be advised as to time and place of voting at a later date.

'I'm An American' Day Proclamation Issued

Washington.—President Roosevelt Wednesday designated Sunday, May 17th, as "I'm An American" day and urged that it be observed in a manner to impress on all citizens the duties and opportunities of citizenship and its special responsibilities in a nation at war. He said in a proclamation that it was even more essential in time of war than in time of peace for a people to understand fully "the form and genius of their government and responsibilities of citizenship."

Consequently, in accordance with an act of Congress calling for recognition of all citizens in an "I'm An American" Day on the Third Sunday in May each year, the Chief Executive called upon federal, state and local officials, patriotic, civic, and educational organizations to take part in patriotic exercises.

In a proclamation President Roosevelt has designated and called attention to the great day which we always celebrate and keep sacred—Mother's Day May 10th.

R. Dee Price Writes On Cotton Loan Quota

Producers who may be inclined to plant more cotton than their cotton acreage allotment are advised to consider marketing quota penalty on the production of the excess acres before they plant says Mr. R. Dee Price, Administrative Officer of A. A. A. in Clay County.

This penalty is one half of the government loan and at present is 7c per pound. If the loan value is increased the penalty will increase accordingly. The penalty free cotton will be the production of the allowed acres.

In addition to the above marketing quota penalty, the penalty under the Agricultural Conservation Program is \$12.50 per 100 pounds on the production of the excess acres.

The Continental Oil Company hit a gusher this week in their No. 2 Earl Springs, in Eastern Clay County. The test rated at more than 3400 barrels of oil per day after an 8000 gallon acid test treatment in the Caddo Lime zone from 5630-45 feet and is rated high among the gushers of this entire area.

The well is in section 23, block 4 H & T C RR survey and is 4000 feet north and 660 feet east of the No. 1, Springs, discovery well and means the proving up of a good large territory.

In the Commission test Wednesday the well flowed 1424 barrels per hour during the test through 3/4 choke. The oil showed 45 gravity.

The same Company has staked location for No. 3 Earl Springs, 4764 feet from the east and 374 feet from the south line of section 23 block 4 H & T C RR survey, and expect to move a rig to the location within the next few days.

Two miles west of Joy the L. T. Burns No. 5 C. L. Wynn, a Mississippiian test in block 34, H. Williams survey, abstract 704, is waiting for the cement to set and expect to drill the plug about Monday.

Local Men Attend Brown Funeral Service

Messrs. Virgil and Frank Johnson attended the funeral services in Montague last Friday at 3 P. M. of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Brown, who drowned while looking for sheep at their home near Montague Wednesday night.

The Browns had lived six miles west of Montague since 1872 and were well known by many Clay county pioneers. They were both in the 70's and neither very strong.

Their son, R. L. Brown Jr., was sick in bed so the father fearing their sheep would drown in high flood waters said he would go see after them. The son begged him not to go, but just about night when they failed to show up decided to go for them as the wife decided to go with him. No one will ever know just what happened, but it was supposed that Mrs. Brown must have fallen into the stream and drowned. Her body was found the next morning where Mr. Brown had carried her out on high ground across the stream about 300 yards from the house, then had crawled to the gate and after failing to get the gate open had broken a plank and wire that had cut his hand.

He continued to crawl about 30 or 40 steps toward the house and there the neighbors found his dead body the next morning.

It was thought that he suffered a heart attack. His cane was found near the body of Mrs. Brown.

Crop Shortage Can Be Cut In Half

Prevention of waste in food distribution will be a vital factor in the effort of Clay county's 2,370 farm operators and workers to achieve their wartime food production goals, it was indicated today in a survey by a leading distributor of Texas farm produce.

At least half of the estimated \$12, 600,000 annually lost from spoilage and damage to Texas fruits and vegetables alone can be prevented by the use of better grading, packing and by better and more direct distribution methods. Further savings can be realized from improved handling of other Texas farm products.

If Clay county farmers, working with distributors, cut by half the average 10 to 12 per cent of fruit and vegetable shipments lost thru damage and spoilage, they will have achieved the equivalent of a 5 to 6 percent increase in production with out any extra acreage, seed, fertilizer, equipment or farm labor.

The average farmer the survey revealed, fed 11.7 persons in 1929, ten years later was feeding 14.1 persons from his fields.

For A Good Diet You Must Include

1 pint to 1 qt. of milk per day.
1 egg; 1 serving of meat, poultry, fish or cheese.

In buying meat—Look at the cleanliness and storage facilities of the market.

Learn government meat cuts and ask for: roasts by weight and cut; steaks by thickness and cut.

Learn government meat grades:—try to buy by grade; choose grade and cut it as suited for purpose and income. Consider proportion of the meat to bone in figuring the cost.

Use cheap cuts sometimes.

Cheap cuts are nutritious, as expensive cuts and may be better in flavor. Buy liver or heart once each week. Buy roasts and stew meat that are large enough for more than one meal.

In buying cheese: judge cheese partly by the length of time it has been cured. If it is fairly fresh it is rubbery, lacking in flavor, and becomes tough and stringy when cooked. It is called "green" cheese. Use a smaller amount of ripened than "green" cheese in cooking. Consider that a slice of cheese cut from a large cheese is cheaper than packaged cheese.

In using meat: learn to cook meat that is suitable for "different cuts". Vary the cooking methods. Use less-tender cuts for stews, soup, ground meat, etc.

Cook meat at low temperature (300-350 degrees) for roasting. It shrinks less, is juicier, and has better flavor. Be sure to cook pork until it is well done.

Use a small amount of meat 2 or 3 times a week rather than a large amount once, if income is limited.

Use rice, vegetables, etc., as meat extenders.


