Methods Used To **Control The Rats**

The first step toward successful rat control is a sincere determination to be rid of the pests. Often the control measures to be used will vary for different premises .Study your problems, observe the feeding and nesting habits of the rats where they are running and how they gain entrance to building. With this information you are in better posi-tion to begin control work.

1 Poisoning: No poison, however good, will be effective unless the rate eats it. For this reason baits should be chosen that the rats will take rapidly. At least 3 different types of bait should be exposed at the same time in order to assure effective poisoning. Be sure the bait is fresh and attractive. Small pieces of pois-
