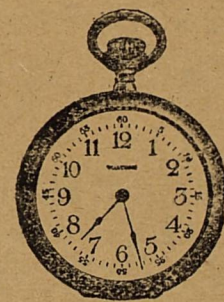

W. corner of section No. 113 in block T; thence north on same said section line to Main street in the town of Brownfield, Terry county; thence east on Main-st. to 6th street; thence north on 6th street 200 feet. Thence east to center of court house yard; thence north to Tahoka street; thence west to 6th street; thence north 6th street to north line of section No. 113; thence west on section line to N. W. corner of section No. 139; thence north to the north county line of Terry county; thence west on county line to N. W. of Terry county; thence south to the place of beginning.

Prec. No. 2 described as follows: Beginning N. E. corner of precinct No. 1 on north county line, thence east on county line to N. E. corner of Terry county; thence south along the east boundary line of Terry county to N. E. corner of section 2, block Y. Thence west on section line to N. Thence west to court yard; thence north and west with the east boundary line of precinct No. 1 to place of beginning.

And voting place of precinct No. 4 on block 50 in town of Brownfield S. E. of public square.
