James Pickens Dead.

Brownwood, Texas, Daily Bulletin.
April 4th.

Howard Pickens to-day received a telegram announcing the death of his brother, James Pickens at Edmonton, Colorado, yesterday. He had resided there about a year. "Jim" Pickens was well known to many Brownwood people and was highly esteemed by all. He was on the Bulletin at different times several years ago, and was one of the most accomplished pianists ever here. In manners he was Chesterfieldian and a polished and accomplished gentleman who made many friends and no enemies. He was 35 years of age. The cause of his death has not been learned though his brother has wired for information. He will be buried there. The news of his death comes as a sad blow to his relatives and many friends.

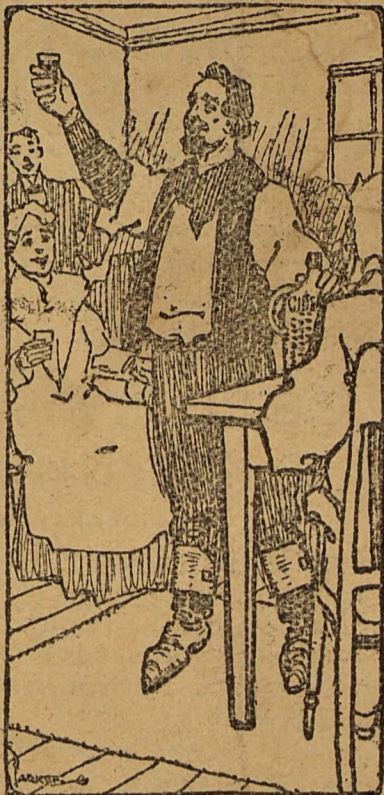
In our mention yesterday of James Pickens' death the printers made us say Edmonton, Colorado, when it should have been Canada. Mr. Pickens was a member of the Eagles and the local order of the Maccabees, in which he held a \$1,000 policy. He was buried at Edmonton by the Eagles. His brother, Howard Pickens, and mother intended going to Edmonton but a study of the time table showed that it would take five days to reach and the trip was abandoned.

James W. Pickens was a brother of Mrs. W. R. Spencer, of Brownfield, Texas. He was born Nov. 13th, 1870, at Richland, Holmes county, Mississippi. He was never married, and for many years made the house of his sister, Mrs. Sreneur, his home. He had written her a short time since that he had not been feeling very well, and that he was coming home, and for several weeks she had been looking forward to his coming when a sad telegram came announcing that the grim messenger of death had called him to another home in far-away Canada, and that he had been buried far away from his kinfolks and his friends. But it matters not when or where we die, for the canoe is waiting just the same to ferry the soul over the river the Dark River. The writer knew the deceased better perhaps than any living person and can testify to his nobleness of nature and generous heart. He was possessed of rare gifts—mentally, coupled with marvelous business capacity. He was an excitement seeker of the nobler sort, and in his last days with shattered health he pushed to the far-away and frozen North-West, and to the new town of Edmonton, Canada, and in the rush and bustle of that Magic City sought to satisfy his heart-longing for excitement.

The deceased left an aged mother and a maiden aunt, four sisters and a brother to mourn his loss. Our heart goes out to them in their bereavement, but from an intimate acquaintance with diseased I know that they need not sorrow as those who have not hope. That loved voice is hushed and that hand that was wont to make sweet music is cold and still, and it is hard to realize that we shall never on this earth feel again the thrill of his sweet melodies, but let us believe that we shall hear

it again in that heavenly choir, and that it has only melted away with the music of the spheres.

**The Brazilian Trust
on Its Coffee Crop.**

The Brazilian government has before it a proposition to keep up the price of coffee. It is a trust under governmental control, or by which one man or a board of men will set the price of this staple to foreign buyers. It must be remembered that Brazil furnishes 700,000 tons, or three-fourths of this staple that is put upon the markets of the world. The proposition is simple and feasible enough, as it proposes that the government advance a certain per cent of the coffee when delivered, and the balance when sold less storage charges. This is a fight against foreign tariffs, and is meant as an underhanded blow to hit below the belt in international commerce. This action will, probably, lead to the trustification, nationally, of other commodities. No one particularly objects to the taxing of the foreigner, but the foreigner himself, and he, not having any say in the matter, betakes himself to other fields to exploit or to find trade.

**BETTER BE POOR THAN
TO BE LOUSY RICH.**

Once in a while we see something about "graft" in a Texas paper, but Texas "graft" is like soda pop compared to Kentucky booze with the kind they have in New Mexico, Indian and Okla-homa territories. In those territories the art of "graft" has got down to such a point that it is a simon pure stand-patter. Some-time ago an account was published of a banker named Burdett, who was secretly assassinated at Eufala, I. T. This man was prominent in financial and business affairs in his section, his "John Hancock" made a good batch of worthless paper pass for thousands at the cashiers' window—his touch was magic, he could lift up and pull down, and of course the death of such a man could not be hushed; but if plain farmer John Smith had been cut off in the same way, a 4-line notice in a paper, perhaps garbled to intimate suicide, would have sufficed for him. The man that has lots of coin has friends,—that is true, but sometimes he makes a deadly enemy, and it is easy to make one when one's wealth enables him to become an oppressor. It was but last year that Col. Chaves, a wealthy official of New Mexico, met his death in the same manner. Both these men, started in life, comparatively poor, and both had accumulative talents, but each exasperated somebody to a point that they wiped out their grudge in the blood of their fellow-creature. Every one is not gifted to handle wealth, so be contented if you are poor.

missioners' Court.**

The Court having convened in special session on Monday the 26th day of March, A. D. 1906, for the purpose of opening the polls and counting the votes cast at a special Election held at the several voting places in Terry county, Texas, on Wednesday, March 14th, A. D. 1906, to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquors shall be prohibited in Terry County, Texas, and there being present on said day the County Judge and all the County Commissioners of Terry County, and the Court having opened the polls of said election, and counted the votes and verified the returns thereof, and it appearing to the Court that there were cast at said election eight-two (82) votes, and that sixty-eight (68) votes were cast at said election "For Prohibition" and that fourteen (14) votes were cast "Against Prohibition." It is therefore ordered by the Court that the sale of intoxicating liquors in Terry County, Texas, be and is hereby absolutely prohibited except for the purpose and under the regulations prescribed in Title 69 of the Revised Civil

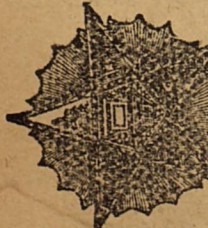

The Economical Chinese.

The Chinese are a very economical people. In North China the people will eat horse, mule, onkey or any animal, and they will eat all the animal, even when it has died of disease. The smallest children are sent out to gather fuel. One may see boys up in trees beating off leaves as if they were fruit and not a straw is allowed to allow to lie idle on the ground. In ordinary houses a dim light which costs almost nothing will be placed in a hole in a dividing wall so as to light two apartments. An old woman who was hobbling along pain-going to the home of a relative so fully was asked where she was going. She explained that she was to die in a place of public family graveyard and thus avoid the expense of coffinbearers for a long distance.

The Surrender of the Weak.

The popular idea of suicide undoubtedly is that it most commonly results from excess of emotion of some kind. The men whom most of us think of as likely to kill themselves are those whose passions are strong—men who love and hate fiercely and are violently impatient of physical ills, drink hard, or hold some idea so tenaciously that it possesses their whole being and they become insane.

These are the suicides of romance almost invariably. But Professor Bailey of Yale in his recent statistical study of suicide in the United States shows that they are far from being the majority of actual suicides. He has collected details of 10,000 cases of suicide from 1897 to 1901 and analyzed them with respect to the age, sex, social relations and other common factors of their victims, and the known or apparent cause of their self-destruction.

Bad health, insanity, disappointment in love and strong drink do lead to suicide, but they are causes much less potent than business losses, which the most frequent cause is that known as "despondency"—the feeling that the victim has made a failure in accomplishing his purposes and that further struggle against the obstacles that confront him is hopeless.

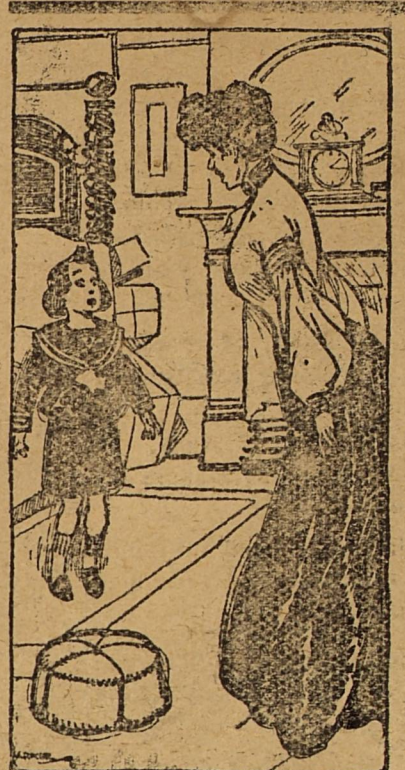
That more than three men kill themselves to one woman has long been known. Remembering what are the chief causes of suicide, it is easy to understand why this is so. Between the ages of 20 and 50, when two-thirds of the suicides occur, nearly every man is working for himself and a woman, already found or sought. Hence, when a man feels that he has failed, the weight that falls upon him is double. He has failed not only for himself, but also for the woman.

And the further conclusion seems justifiable that suicide is not a wild breaking through the barriers of life, as often imagined, but a rather an admission that these barriers are impassable. Suicide was long ago harshly described as the deed of the coward. It is practically true. Its most frequent causes prove that self-murder is not the revolt of the strong, but the surrender of the weak.
