Two venturesome young gentlemen are in Oregon after 'thumbing' their way across the southwestern and western states to get there.

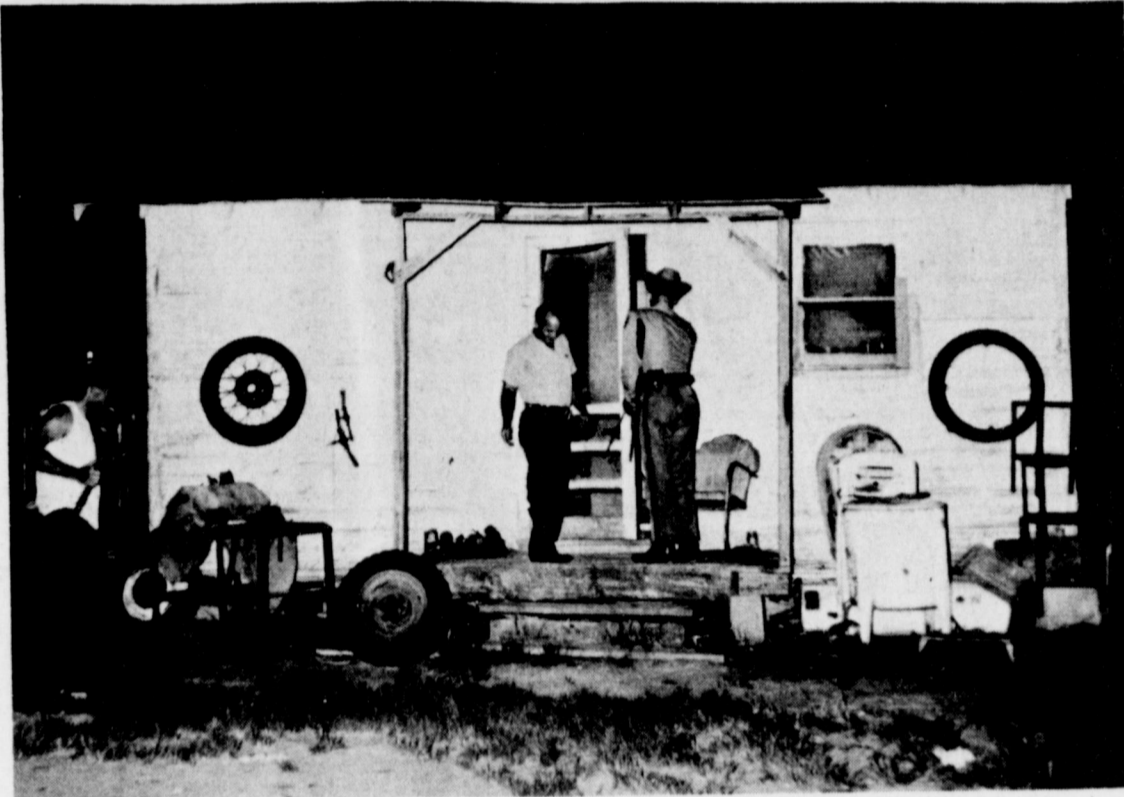

Bailey County Farms Benefit By FHA Loans

Farmers Home Administration in Bailey County loaned \$1,355,930 in the 1969 fiscal year which ended June 30 according to John C. Kennedy, County Supervisor. The amount loaned per year has remained about the same for the past three years, Kennedy stated.

Approximately one million dollars of the above money was loaned to farmers for farm operating and family living expenses, equipment, and livestock.

Also, 20 loans were made during the past year for the purchase of homes, most of them located in Muleshoe.

Kennedy reported the payment on loans to FHA during this same period of time amounted to \$1,311,134. Payments from farmers were a little short due mostly to poor grain sorghum crop in 1968.

In addition to loans for farm operating expenses and to finance homes, Farmers Home Administration also makes loans to purchase and improve farms, drill irrigation wells, and to finance small business enterprises for low income people.

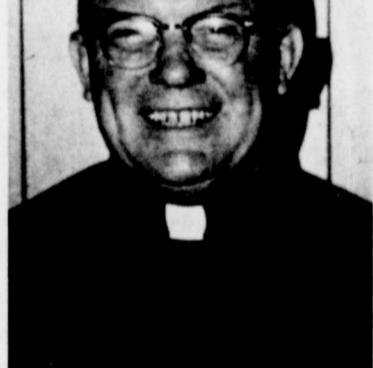

A very modest, delightful German visitor stopped by the Journal offices Friday morning. Father Robert O'Leary of the Immaculate Conception of Mary Catholic Church brought him by the office to visit. He is Brother Theodore Wahl of Duisburg, Germany.

With his teasing manner, Bro. Wahl explained that Duisburg was a 'very small town in Germany, only 100,000 people.'

He has been in Muleshoe for the past several days visiting his old time friend, Father O'Leary. The two men worked together in Germany more than 30 years ago. Father O'Leary went to Germany in 1937 and worked with Brother Wahl for several months. In 1939, they were working together when the Nazis took over Germany and continued to work in Germany for 14 months before coming to the United States.

They did not discuss Nazi Germany at any length while in the office.

Joe Chaney, 64, was charged Friday morning with murder with malice and is being held under \$10,000 bond following a fatal shooting incident on South Main Thursday night.

Kermit Russell Volkman, 56, died in surgery approximately an hour after he was taken to West Plains Memorial Hospital by Singleton Ambulance. Doctors reported that the bullet went almost straight into his body into his lower right chest. An autopsy was performed at the funeral home to ascertain the extent of internal damage from the .22 caliber bullet.

Borden Milk Co. submitted the low bid for milk for the school lunchroom with their bid being .0672 cents per half pint. Cloverlake bid .07 cents per one half pint; Bell's Dairy bid .07 cents per one half pint and Plains Creamery bid .0725 cents per half pint.

It was also reported that 94.61 percent of 1968-69 school taxes have been collected with \$527,175.60 being collected to date. A total of \$28,373.01 in delinquent taxes has also been collected.

He urged every person involved in sales to become an authority on his or her line of merchandise or service. A survey by Redbook magazine has shown that shoppers complain most about poorly informed and disinterested salespeople and about merchandise which is advertised but not available.

Leigh said the sales forces of a store should know the latest in fashion and should be the first to introduce them into the community.

"Whether you are in soft goods, furniture, hardware, a flower shop, you should take pride in your ability as an expert in your particular line," Leigh declared..... "and treat each transaction as though your career depended on its outcome."

He cautioned against "pre-judging" a customer and pointed out that everyone is a prospect for a sale.

The sales authority talked about cash versus credit customers and suggested that an attempt be made to set up a credit account for each customer. "A customer with cash belongs to any merchant," he said, but a charge customer's loyalty is to the store where his account is carried."

A highlight of Mr. Leigh's presentation was a discussion of the "10 customers who require special handling." His list included the chisler, egotist, tough guy, moody type, silent type, gripe artist, indecisive type, "uh-huh" type, the browser.

"And customers are hard to come by," he explained. "You should make a sincere selling...the approach, demonstration and close." He advised, "Make the customer like you by first liking the customer." "Know your products and merchandise and be enthusiastic, and know when to close the sale."

He says the trend is expected to continue for the next several years and could mean a substantially changed demand for the type of calves required in the future.

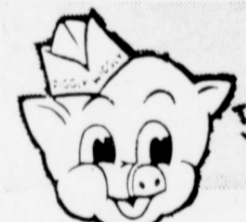

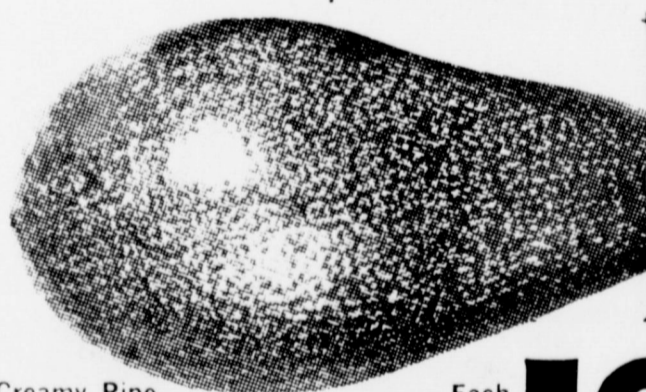
