In reference to the institute Judge Neill says: "Teachers who attend the County Teachers' Institute shall receive full pay as provided under their contracts for each day they are absent from the schools they have contracted to teach and are in actual attendance at the sessions of said institutes.—School Laws of Texas, Sec. 97.

"The County Superintendent shall organize and hold, with such assistance as may be necessary, within the first four months of the scholastic year, one institute of five consecutive days he shall require the attendance of the teachers upon the institutes; provided further, that the County Superintendent of Public Instruction shall be authorized to cancel the certificate of any teacher who willfully and persistently absents himself from attendance upon the County Teachers' Institute.—School Laws of Texas, Sec. 38.

The institute will be practically a five day school of methods and each teacher is earnestly requested to study each topic on the program and to be able to discuss it, or ask such questions as will call forth the necessary discussion.

Each teacher should bring with him some text on methods, a each of the State adopted series that he has to teach, the course of study and a note book and a pencil. If we have before us what we have to teach and when we have to teach it, and the discussion will bring out why we teach and how we teach, the institute will be a success."

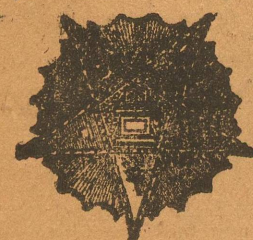
