But these two questions will only occupy public attention a short time. The primary election will take place on the 25th of this month, and the railrond bonus matter will be settled in equally as short time, and after that a barbeoue and celebration would be an appropriate thing to have after a season of excitement and anxiety. Successful candidates would certainly exert unusual efforts in assisting to get up the barbesue, and the defeated ones would find it a good place to work off their feeling of disappointment. Then, if the railroad bonus has been raised. it would be an appropriate place for the people to fraternize and prove that no ill feeling or resentment exists among them.

Several of the old soldiers living in the county have expressed a desire that the ex-Confederates in this part of the country have a re-union some time during the summer or fall. There could be no more appropriate time and place to have it than at a barbecue; it would probably bring some old soldiers to the re-union who would otherwise not be in attendance, and the re union would be an interesting feature of the barbecue.




