What a Virginian Thinks of of Terry County,

The following letter was writpublished in Pulaski, Virginia, by Mr. P. R. Hicks while on a visit here to his daughter, Mrs. I. H. Hukson, living three miles north of Gomez. The editor of this paper met Mr. Hicks during his visit here and found him to be a man of very fine intelligence who is thoroughly comnetent to pass correct judgment on the country:

"I am sending you a few lines giving you a brief description of my trip to Texas and this Western country. I left Pulaski City at half past four o'clock Sept. 17th, and arrived at Big Springs at 11 a. m. the 21 inst. There I left the train and took an auto for Gomez, leaving there at 1:15 p. m., I arrived at Gomez at 7:30 o'clock of same day, running a distance of 105 miles in six hours. Since that time I've been looking over the country and can scarcely describe it, yet am making an effort.

Texas is divinely beautiful, all that I had expected to find it, and even more. I passed through some pretty country coming into Texas but nothing has surpassed this western country for magnificence and granduer in scenery No trees nor mountains in this part of the state. Inst one wide vast prairie, and as one drives over it it seems that we are gradually climbing a hill, yet we never reach the top for it is a plain indeed, level and smooth, and the soil is as rich and fertile as the Kentucky bluegrass or our Virginia bottom land, only it can be bought for one fourth the money that one pays for land there. It is a thing of the past that Texas is only for cattle raising.

Of course there are lots of people here that still own herds of fine cattle, but the sixty and one hundred sections of land that farms. They realize that west Fexas lands are far too valuable for grazing cattle and thousands of people are coming into Texas every year and securing this land for their homes, and a man with small means can buy a farm of 160 acres up to a section er even more by making a small payment down and reasonable time on balance and in this way it gives the poor man a chance to make his land pay for itself; and it can be done, for I have seen crops of corn here that produced from 50 to 60 and even 100 pounds of the best sugar grows from one-half to a bale for \$6 25 at Brooks & Cordill's per acre. negligent when I pass their homes and see good crops with half work, I wonder what a good hard working man could do with ten for the Southwest Times, this good rich Texas soil. Understand all Texas people are not lazy and all men are not idle and indolent that live here; no, far from it, for I've seen some cribs filled with fine corn and large stacks of milo maize and kaffir corn that I know required some work, although good crops can be made here with less labor than in Virginia. As to seasons, they usually are good. This country seldom has a drouth, tho' they have few rains. The heavy frosts in winter and a couple of good rains in spring are all sufficient for the ground holds moisture much better than Virginia lands would on same amount of rain.

At present we are one hundred miles from the railroad, our nearest railroad points being Big Springs on the south and Plainview on the north. Both are progressive Texas towns.

The people of Terry, Gaines, Yoakum and Lubbock counties nave secured a railroad building east and west and is to be completed by Dec. 1909.

The people of Terry Connty and Brownfield, the county seat. gave a hundred thousand dollars which has been accepted and the contract signed that this road will be completed by above mentioned date.

Taking into consideration its soil, fine water and other advantages, it is the best county on an eventral Plains. It was organized about five ears ago, and is settled, so lar, with a splendid lass of people who obey the laws and have proper respect for religion and morality. The county is thirty inless quare, the usual size of west Texas counties.
