> All persons, whether women or men, who may desire to become Census enumerators must be citizens of the United State; residents of the supervisor's district for which they wish to be appointed; must be not less than 18 nor more than 70 years of age; must be physically able to do the work; of good habits; must have at least an ordinary education and must be able to write plainly and

> Those who can comply with these requirements are invited to put in their applications, as there will be at least 68,000 enumerators' places to be filled by the middle of March in preparation for the enumeration beginning April 15th.

> Application forms, with full instructions for filling-in and complete information concerning the test and the method of appointment, can be secured by writing to the supervisor of census for the supervisor's district in which the applicant lives. All applicants, properly filled in must be filed with the supervisors not later than January 25th as any received after that date cannot be considered. Letters or applications should be mailed to Jno.
