### NOBE, NEW MEX CO.

Dear Editor:—

It has been over a month since I wrote for the Herald. This may seem odd for one who was so punctual for a period of nearly eight months; but during that time, I was working for and representing a worthy community in Terry County, and was writing to do whatever I might to further the interests of my people; while now the readers of the Herald would enjoy a letter from me as only one of them "has beens".

I am glad to see the Meadow School Notes still appearing under that familiar caption. Thanks "Tell-It" for taking up the work where I left off. Leave no stone unturned to make Meadow a place of interest to the readers of the county's paper and it will

result in much good for the people of your village.

That my letters, which I hope to write as often as every two weeks may be the more appreciated, I will tell my readers as nearly as I can where in the Territory of New Mexico I have settled. I am just twenty four miles West of where the North line of Lubbock Hockley and Cochran Counties would cross the state line. In every physical feature this country is very much like Terry and Yoakum Counties, the rocky places becoming larger and more frequent as you go west until you reach West Caprock, which forms the eastern brakes of the Pecos valley. This increase in rocky surface is very noticeable in passing from the east side of Yoakum County to the west side.

Throughout this part of the plains in New Mexico, the surface consists of belts of alternating sand and tight land extending in a north west and southeast direction, each varying in width and constituency. Of the tight land a very little is so good as it appears, owing to the proximity of the rock to the surface. However

body of this class of land, that I have seen, is in and around Red Land. There is some of this class of land on the Baker Flat, some fifteen miles south of here, and again in the Ranger Lake country about fifteen miles west by north from Broncho. All of this class of tight land is really a mixed land thick set with bear grass or "sorp weed;" and a cat claw. The grazing grass is usually mesquite and gamma (I don't know whether that is the right to spell the words or not.) There is enough of sand in the soil to make it plow fine when it has moisture, but it is impenetrable when it is dry. The sandy land ranges from the red sage grass and shinary sand to the deep, white muscalary sand that is fit for nothing. The redder sand seems to be fairly fertile, and is wonderful in its drought resisting properties. It farms delightfully on still days. Farmers on this class of land can plow for a long time after the dry land men have had to quit.

It is very dry here now; having had no rain since I came home over a month ago. We had several days of hot wind that destroyed nearly everything on the sandy land; but for the last four

days the wind has been blowing a gale from the east, and is still pushing hard from that direction and we are all praying with one voice that it may bring us rain.

In my next letter, I shall try to tell something of the class of citizenship in this part.

### Santa Fe Depot at Plainview.

A Plainview correspondent to the Dallas News says: The Santa Fe is now building a depot in Plainview, which, when completed, will be one of the most elegant and commodious structures of similar kind in Northwest Texas. The contractor is responsible for the statement that the cost of the building will be \$30,000, aside from the freight bills on materials, this being laid here by the railway company without charge to the contractor.

A separate building is to be built for a baggage room, and it will be constructed entirely of concrete.

It is stated that the company expects to have trains running over the Texico-Coleman cut-off by September 15. All of these trains will stop here.

Orders have been issued to enlarge the yard facilities at this place and also to add another passenger track through the entire yards.

While it has been some time since we had a real good rain the old settlers are still taking things as easy as they say they have always had sufficient rain to make good crops generally, and fairly good crops to put on long acres and study about the swamps way back east."

During the week we have interviewed 4 substantial farmers, representing as many parts of the county and they all say they have the best crop prospects they have ever had at the time of year.

True some have had a considerable amount of corn ruined by rolling sand during the high winds two weeks ago, but there is ample time yet to plant and make more corn and feedstuff than they can gather.

Don't be discouraged as most of you saw old Terry tried out last year under the most unfavorable circumstances ever remembered since farming has been tried on the Plains, and her soil awarded you handsomely when you take into consideration the extreme dry year 1909.

Two years ago rain came very late (some time in July) which discouraged a "new one" from Comanche county and he hiked for the sticks leaving his young crop at a critical stage, but Mr. D. Williams, the land lord came to its rescue and that fall gathered nearly \$1000 worth of corn and feed.

When you become a little disheartened, remember the old saying:

"West Texas come promise us and do more than any land under the sun."

J. L. Randal returned from McKinney Wednesday afternoon here he attended the District conference of the Methodist church which was well attended and the reports from different parts of the district showed that the preachers are doing good work. He also, stated that while politics did not enter into proceedings of the Conference, yet he heard a good deal of talk as to the prohibition question and the election of the several candidates for Governor to the ques-

tion. He believes that about four-fifths the delegates he heard express themselves are Cone Johnson supporters and the remainder are Poindexter men. Mr. Randal also spoke of the New Methodist school at Plainview which is to be known as "Seth Ward University." He said that Rev. G. H. Hardy, now Presiding Elder of this District, has been selected as President of the school and Rev. P. E. Riley for Principal, which would take both these preachers out of the regular work.

There is not a man in Terry county that would work harder or vote stronger than we to keep saloons out of our fair county, but when that is said we are done. We firmly believe in a majority rule, therefore we believe that the people should be given the chance to say whether or no open saloons run in Texas, as a majority is for submission, but when the time comes for a statewide vote, we will—if not converted during the time intervening—vote nay. We have our convictions which we hold sacred and grant the other man the same privilege. That conviction is that prohibition is a local business just the same as the stock law. If East Texas folks want to turn stock on the outside range and Central Texas does not, East Texas has no right by a majority vote to dictate to Central Texas; neither does the Central Texas citizens by a majority vote have a right to say that the East Texas citizen must keep his stock up. Here is a parallel case:

Terry county has no right by a majority of votes to say that Dallas county must close her saloons; neither has Dallas county, by a majority of votes, the right to force open saloon upon us. The whole thing reminds us of a grindstone with a large notch out of one side; it is as good as any just as long as the right side is coming our way very undemocratic it seems to us. Our local option laws are the acme of perfection, and slowly but surely by education and experiment our fair state is ridding itself of these undesirable. Why haste? Through haste Molly not only spilt the water but broke the pitcher also.

This is the reason we are for Davidson first, last and all the time. He is conservative enough for the best among the antis, and radical enough to suit the thinking people of the pro faith. He is a man that is advocating unchallenged issues—the others have an issue. He is a man of many good deeds, for which he has gained a national reputation. He is an unassuming gentleman but will uphold our sacred laws with an iron hand. He has been weighed in the scales of public trust and was pronounced "very good." He is a Texas Commoner and is therefore a friend of the man from the forks of the creek.

**That Tahoka Road.**

The Commissioners met last Saturday in extra session to consider bids for the building of the Tahoka road to the county line. After receiving all bids which ranged from \$80 to \$90 per mile, all were rejected. Nearly all day was spent in discussing plans and specifications, and it was decided to let 3 miles of test road to three men in order that they could see just what it would take to build the road. The following is part of the proceedings of the court:

"It is ordered by the Commissioners of Terry County that Joe Fisher, Redge Burnett and Jim Walker, be employed to construct one mile of road each as follows: Grub twenty feet wide plough 13 inches deep and 16 1/2 wide on the Tahoka road as designated by Commissioners Copeland and Gist, at \$83 per mile to be paid on completion of each one's mile."

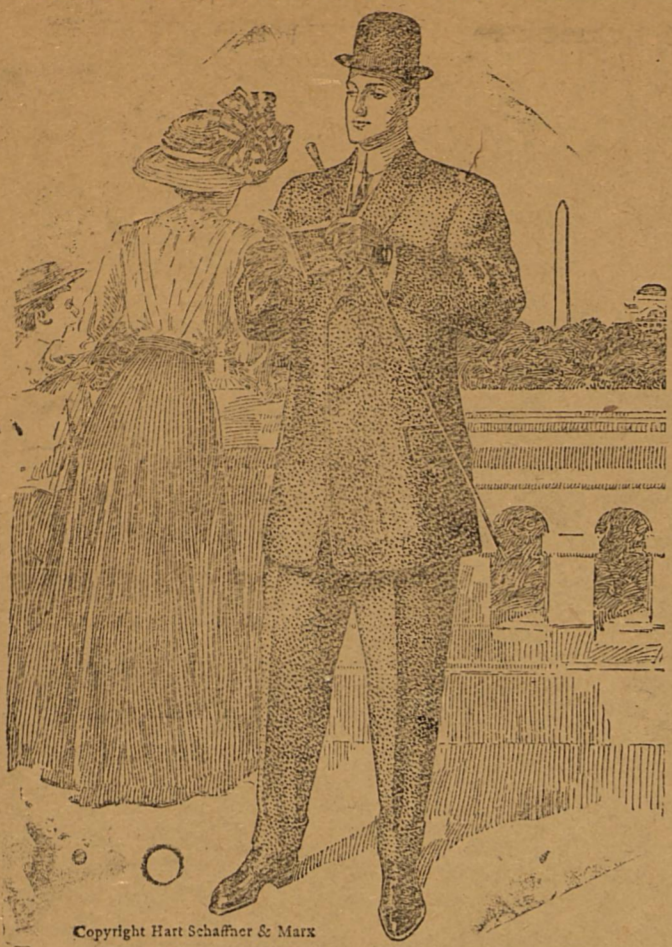
