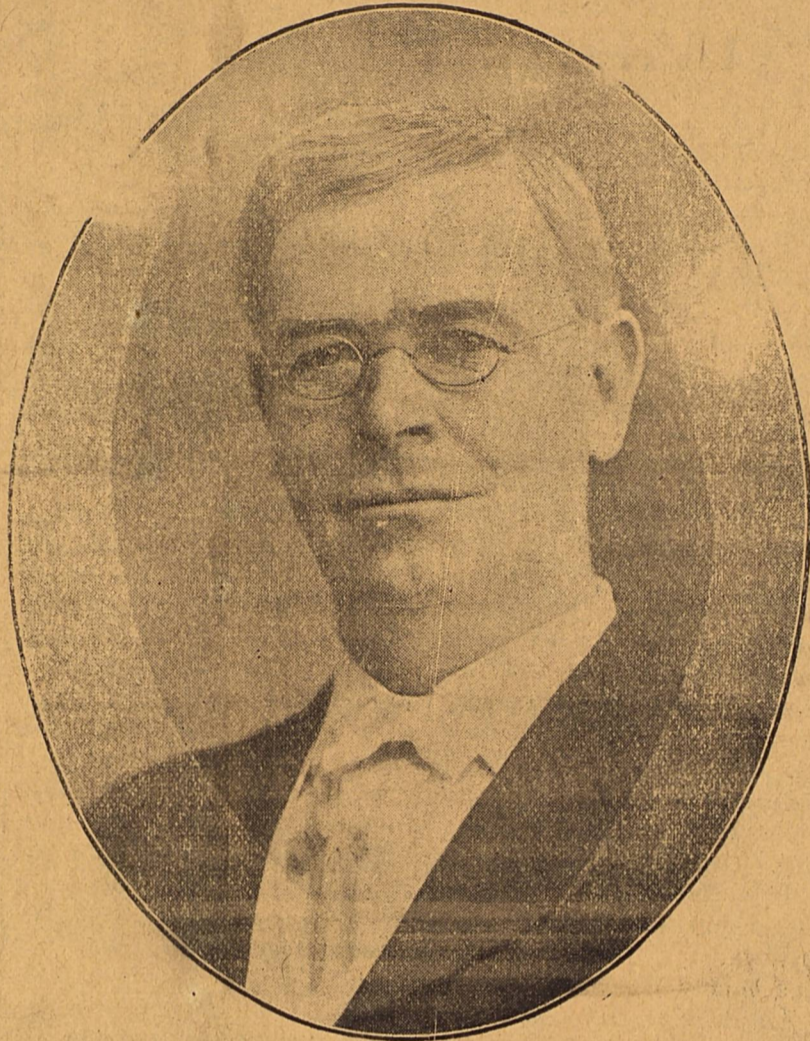

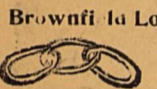

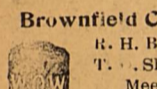

a gasoline engine. The large boiler is constructed of sheet iron, with parallel layers of pipes, and this is neatly placed over a brick furnace at an elevation of about five feet and this keeps the tank supplied with plenty of warm water at small cost of fuel. The latest pattern gasoline irons will be used and we predict success to this enterprise. Connected in this work with Mr. Harris is Tom Williams, another hustling young man of our town.

A business like this has been needed for some time, as delays in transit to railroads often delayed laundry so much that most people did not like to patronize them. Now that we have a laundry at home, it becomes the duty of our citizens to see that it has our hearty co-operation and patronage. It was tried this week and proved a success.

Death of Col. Elwood.

Col. I. D. Elwood, well known to many Plains people as the owner of the big Spade Ranch, located in Hale, Lamb and Hockley counties, died last Monday night at his home in DeKalb, Ill. Col. Elwood had been sick since the death of his wife more than two months ago, and the immediate cause of his death was paralysis. He was 77 years old, and was one of the many who went to California in 1849, where he laid the foundation of an immense fortune. He was a large iron and steel manufacturer, and it is his firm that manufactures a large part of the barbed wire used in the country.

Besides owning the Spade pasture, embracing about 300,000 acres, well stocked with fine cattle, he owned another large pasture and cattle in the vicinity of Colorado City. Col. Elwood's holdings at home and in Texas made him one of the wealthiest men in the country.

To School Land Owners

Through the kindness of Mr. M. V. Brownfield we have been furnished with the following copy of a letter written by Land Commissioner Robinson. Mr. Robinson personally gave Mr. Brownfield the copy while he was in Austin last week, so our Terry and Yoakum county citizens can take it as authentic and be governed accordingly:

General Land Office, Austin, Texas, Sept. 10, 1910.—Mr. D. Editor Upland Roundup, Upland, Texas—Dear sir:—In yours of the 7th inst. you say: "It has been reported that you (meaning myself) have given the people out here permission to move off of school land for a period of six months where it was necessary for them to do so in order to make a living."

I am glad you wrote me as it offers an opportunity to correct what seems to be some erroneous impressions that have gained circulation throughout the west relative to the power or authority of the Commissioner of the General Land Office with reference to the law of residence upon school land and the payment of interest.

In the first place, I, as Land Commissioner, have no authority to grant permission to any one to leave his land for any purpose nor under any circumstances. In the second place I, as Land Commissioner, have no power or authority to say to any purchaser that the interest on school land need not be paid on November 1st of each year.

Each of the foregoing propositions is regulated by the laws enacted by the legislature and I have no power or authority to suspend those laws.

Many letters have come to me asking that permission be given to move off the land and also that payment of interest be postponed.

To all I have written frankly the substance of the above observations. But I have told those desiring to move away temporarily on account of drouth, that while I could give no permission, yet my sympathy for them is so great that if they should leave and their residence be attacked I would notify them, give them a full hearing and then if their absence appeared to have merit in it I would exercise all the discretion I could in favor of letting them keep their homes.

With reference to payment of interest, I have many that those who could pay ought to do so promptly, but those who could not pay would not take any chance on having their land forfeited by me before late next summer, say about August 1911, and if at that time conditions were such it would seem best by

reason of crop prospects to forego a forfeiture until crops could be gathered, marketed and the two payments made on November 1, 1911, that I would be willing to exercise the discretion I have in this matter and not forfeit until later. This discretion will apply specially to those good people in the west who are actually making their homes on the land and by so doing trying to develop the country, rather than to the speculator who either just using the land to trade on or simply holding it for an advance in price.

You may say to your readers that I know by experience all about the hardships incident to crop failures. That my sincere sympathies go out to them and that I will use every discretion I possess towards protecting them, and that each one will be notified before anything is done here which jeopardize his home.

With earnest wishes that rain may soon relieve the present conditions in the West and that your people will again be prosperous and happy, I am,

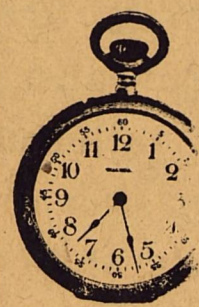

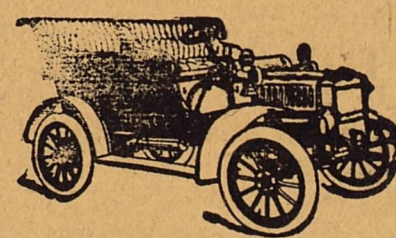

From Nobe New Mexico.

"Absence makes the heart grow fonder" hence, my delay in contributing to the Herald:

It has been so long since I have written that I am sure all the readers of the Herald are "dead in love" with me.

The most surprising and important news that I find in all of my papers and letters that were awaiting me on my return from an extended trip in Okla. and North Texas—You see, that is another reason for my protracted silence, I have been away from home since sometime in July—was the account of the Herald Editor's marriage!

I was surprised, glad, and sorry; glad for you and sorry that I am still left "on the war path" But, Stricklin, you have upset some of my plans. I had selected us, or for us, two gallant (gallant), bachelor maids, who have been holding down a half section of this free land each for about a year, and hence have four more years "batching" to get a title to it. It was my intention that you and I should, for the next four years, woe, win, and when they shall have "proved up" — in every way — marry them. I'll tell you, one of these bachelor maids with her 320 acres of land would prove a valuable asset for a poor bachelor or widower. Yet since you have gone, and that without consulting me, and passed the second great event in the life of man (you know there are three), accept my congratulations and heartfelt sympathy! May you both find the matrimonial sea one continual dream of sunshine and flowers, and every wind in your favor to bear you on to the goal of eternal bliss!

As I remarked in the beginning of this communication, I have just returned from a long visit in Oklahoma and North Texas. I was in Jackson and Kiowa counties in Oklahoma, and found the cotton fair, but many of the cornfields will not be worth gathering. I was in Hall, Childers, Hardeman, Cottle, and Motley counties and found the crop conditions just about the same as in Oklahoma. All this confirm me in my belief that there is more difference in different peoples fancy than is in the merits of different localities. Those high priced lands are worth more to sell than anything else. They offer no more certainties, of crops than do the cheap lands of Western Texas proper, and Eastern New Mexico. I came back better satisfied with the West than I have been in the whole twelve years that I have spent on "those wide extended plains." Roosevelt says that the western plains are as fertile as the valley of the Nile; and I dare say he has "been about" as much as I have, and doubtless is quite as good authority on such matters.

I see in the Herald of the 25th of August that the Editor is watching the political turmoil in New Mexico. Yes, we are in the midst of a nasty, red hot political wrangle over electing delegates to the constitutional convention; and this (Sept. 5th) is the final day, and I scringe for the people. 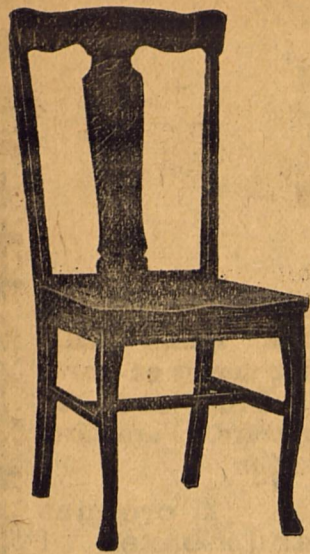
