Is About Complete in Terry and other West Texas Counties

The big base ball leagues are now busy trying out a large squad of men in order that they may safely choose an aggregation capable of defending the sporting reputation of their respective cities, and mayhap pennant winners also. In a few days the

"weeding out" stunt will take place, and those capable will sign season's contracts with the promoters at high salaries, while those who cannot make good will be consigned to oblivion so far a contract with the major leagues for this season is concerned.

The people of the United States are also "trying out," as it were the Democratic party. Having become tired of the continuous succession to office by the Republicans, who either through confidence of further victory, or that the office belonged to them,

their heirs and assignees forever, carelessness, contempt for their constituents, dickering with corporations or their agents, to legislate in their favor and against the masses, until the people took matters in their own hands, they party pledges and principles? to elect a Democratic Congress so decisively that there is no room to believe it a mere accident. 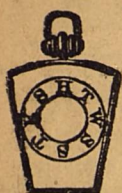

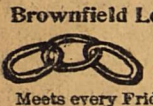
