Their Relation to Each Other is Welded by Common Interest.

There are no three businesses known to man that make even a pretense to mimic the grand famous Bible drama of friendship that existed between Johnathan

and David, like that of the Country Newspaper, Farmer and the Country Merchant. When the three work together in the same social and civic band, they become so wedded in friendship, that they are well nigh impregnable. Like the fabled "bundle of sticks" they are easily broken when separate, but consolidated and a giant cannot break them.

The country merchant in the country town without the country paper, finds the same old monotonous grind day in and day out. There is absolutely no

change in his business relations. It does not make a particle of difference where he would advertise or not, if he had the paper, he would appreciate seeing his name in print once in a while, or the interest of his town and county boosted. If he is any business man at all, he readily recognizes the fact that it is hard to land a prospector or an enterprise unless the town sports an enterprise for outside information. He forcefully realizes that a majority of people are averse to leaving a

community blest with all modern conveniences and sit down in one without some kind of home and foreign circulation. If he is too "short to make any effort to land and retain such an enterprise, he should be content and never ache about his isolation, but be content to spend the remainder of his rushing career without them. The hum of machinery should never disturb his solitude.

The newspaper, while generally unpretentious and unassuming and unoffending, is recognized by the real business world to

be one of the greatest assets to a town, amount of capital invested considered. Many good things are in reach of the town favored with a newspaper that cannot be secured without the. Their paper is an index to the enterprise of a town. Every once in a while we receive encouraging letters from other states congratulating us on our little paper. They wonder how a town the size of ours supports a paper at all. They cite the fact that their towns had many times the population of Brownfield before anyone had

moral and financial nerve to launch a newspaper to talk the town and county. It is the indomitable courage that permeates the marrow of every true Westerner that makes it possible for a paper to be a permanent fixture in comparative villages in glorious West. It positively cannot be done in no other country on earth. There is no such word as strife in our language, but all "stay together" through thick and thin, season and drought, poverty and and prosperity. "United we stand; divided we fall," is

no idle proverb in the West, but a hard, cold fact. Without the newspaper the merchant cannot cheaply and successfully tell the public of the arrival of Easter bonnets, Spring dry goods and fresh groceries. Personal letters to each customer is money, time and trouble; therefore prohibitive. The land agent cannot successively tell the crowd East about the sun-kissed skies, pure water, health giving air, and the boundless opportunities of the boundless West. The rural community would have no way to tell

other neighborhoods of their happenings. Farmers would have no mutual medium through which to discuss this or that specie of grain, when to plant, how to cultivate, or how best to grow and harvest alfalfa. The churches lodges and societies would have no quick and efficient way to notify members of called meetings or no convenient way to publish the obituaries and resolutions of respect, etc. In fact people today would be no better nor no further advanced than Cave Dwellers, were it not for outside

circulation which brings about a broader view, and people know it.

The third part of this grand combination is the reading public, the rural population, if you please, who compose the bulk of the readers, traders and exchangers. Without them and the barter, trade and exchange, consequent to their varied wants, the merchants would make assignments poka wana. Without the reader it is impossible paper to make its debut. Circulation is required before the business man

will advertise, and the rural population constitute the bulk of the readers, and it is to them that the business man directs his speech in his advertising space.

In turn the rural population demand a publication, stores and shops, which they may call their own. Merchants off some where else care nothing for their little telephone exchange, schools lodges, churches and societies, or if old Grey got well of blind staggers, or if the old blue goose is

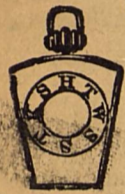

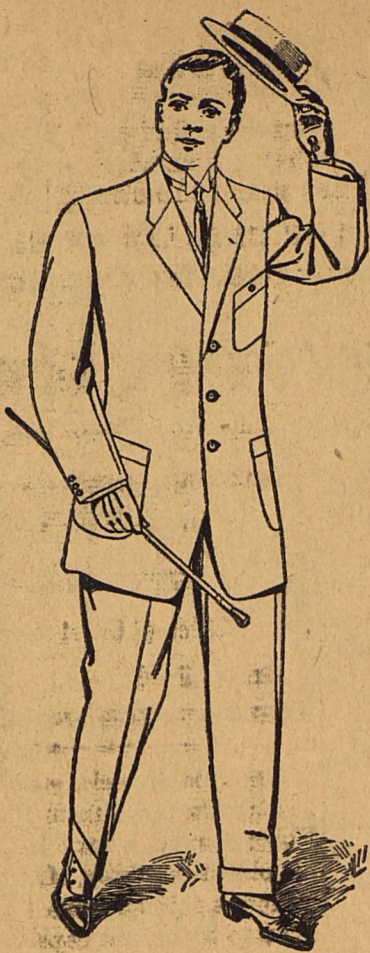
