

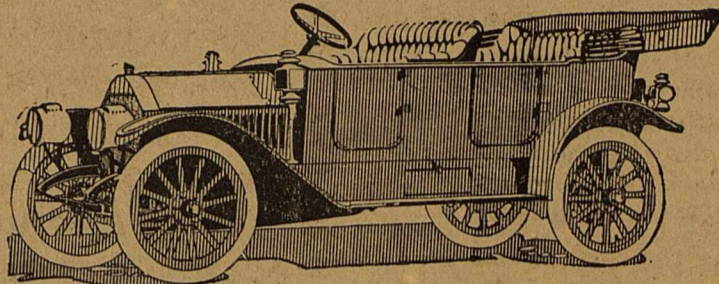

GOOD CROPS.

Parson Williams came in our sanctum last week and informed us that the white maize we viewed on our recent trip of crop inspection on his place and belonging to George Rose, had been cut, or ten acres had, and that it produced 4000 binds. These bundles at five cents per bind gross a neat sum of \$200 for the ten acres or \$20 per acre, on land valued anywhere from \$10 to \$15 per acre.

Now let us figure on a probable average yield of corn or cotton on the \$100 per acre land in Central Texas. We lived there long enough to know that 30 bushels of corn per acre is a good healthy average per acre, and at 95c per bushel grosses the farmer \$225 for ten acres—if the crab or hurrah grass don't happen to take possession. A half bale of cotton per acre is a good average also, and ten acres will gross him \$300, or \$30 per acre—if the weevils or worms don't get it.

Now figure a tax rate of 50c per hundred on Terry county's \$12 and their \$100 land and we find that the one amounts to 60 cents and the other to \$5; and to this we want to figure interest at 10 percent per annum, and we find there will be only \$12 interest on Terry county land and \$105 on the fine haired (?) land. Whenever we get done we find that ten acres of cotton nets \$195 on the \$100 land and \$188 worth of feed in Terry county, and \$120 worth of corn net, on the \$100 land.

Are we done with our figuring? No, no, no; Mr. Rose is a splendid farmer and he has his feed mighty near perfectly clean and we venture he has not spent over 6 or 7 days this year on each ten acres. But what do you suppose it would cost to "mighty near" clean ten acres of the \$100 land in Central Texas? We are almost ashamed to submit any figures, they are so tremendous. Mr. Rose has about 100 acres in cultivation and has worked it with his four little children. There are lots and cords of other Terry county farmers that have done equally as well.

Harken! farmers of the worn out and filthy hillsides of the East? Do you hear the welcome call of the new, level and fertile plains of the west? Here is room on the great staked Plains of the west for almost an empire itself. Here in the hospitable West, the rich and poor can mingle and live happily together. There is no social distinction and we are all white people. High rents and extortion are unknown. If you can read figures, you have read the "writing on the wall." The tide is drifting westward. Why not you?

Casey Jones a Reality.

It developed that "Casey Jones," the doughty hero of Amberol Record No. 450, was a figure in real life, and that the story of the song portrayed an actual incident in his career.

"Casey" was a nickname, and applied to John Luther Jones, an engineer on the Chicago & New Orleans limited, as a fast passenger train on the Illinois Central railway. It was on its midnight run, March 18, 1880, that he lost his life in a rear-end collision with a freight train at

The Co-Operation of Newspapers.

The following from a report of the Retail Hardware Dealer's Association, illustrates the value placed upon newspaper advertising space by the great business men of the country.

"Our newspapers were as sore—well, we could not get an inch of space of notice from them or anything for awhile, and I understand it, and they did not get a dollar from us. Did you ever notice that a newspaper in a town or village is an index to that town or village? No town on earth can prosper without good, live newspapers, and no newspaper is going on for very long if not supported by its home town. Look at Oklahoma City and look at their newspapers—when that Newspaper comes in to your office you are going to stop and look at it no matter how busy you are. It just looks like the people there know what influence it has, and the people are making that newspaper popular, and that newspaper makes Oklahoma city go up by metres and bounds. Now, we were not doing anything for awhile—our merchants didn't do anything. Why? Because anybody that was trying to do anything had a card advertisement, and that was absolutely worthless. You would give to this and that; if one of your customers came in to solicit anything you would give them something; and if someone with a dozen badges on her came in from somewhere saying she was president of so and so, and she put on a good talk, and you would just put on a grin, and put up \$4.00 and she would get \$3.60 of it and the organization she represented would get forty cents, and maybe have your name put on a card for your pains. We have spent thousands of dollars in different advertisements. Why, they could not have an ice cream sociable without having some advertising on the back of it, and the merchants had to put up for it. I have prepared a little contract to the effect. "That the undersigned merchants of the city of Sedalia hereby agree to cooperate with one another according to program advertisement for a period of one year, and to confine their advertisement to the newspapers for one year." And every man in our town signed that, and we have not had a fake advertisement in our town for months. Oh! they drop in. Now, what is the result? There isn't anything that the Sedalia retail merchants and the Home Industry Association wants that our papers will not print. The last advertisement I saw of my Association was on the front page and in the front column of the newspaper, to the effect that the Sedalia Association was working for a new factory to give people employment and to get people to come to that town. Everything we advocate the newspapers will take it up and give it wide circulation, because we are giving them our advertisements and they are entitled to it. Now, the lawyer generally subscribes for half a dozen periodicals. He has to practice law, but there are other things he has to subscribe for now. He has his library, but he has to have the latest reports of cases and recent decisions, and he is constantly keeping up with these things."

Keep Strings Out of Ensilage. Have a man stand beside the feed table of the ensilage cutter and cut every band and jerk the string away. Those strings cut up in short lengths and carried into the silo are not good for stock. A man not long ago lost four cows that were fed on ensilage, and the cut strings did the business. They are cut so fine and mixed so thoroughly that stock must eat them. The time of one man to do this would probably be well spent.—Iowa Homestead.

Proper Way to Feed a Horse. The stomach of the horse is quite small—that is, it will hold about two gallons. If the horse is fed his grain first, then hay and then watered, the grain will be pushed out of the stomach before it is digested. The best way is to water first, then feed some hay and then the grain. In case the horse is warm it would not do to give all the water it would take, but it should be given a little even then.

The well nigh ridiculous condition of postal rates in the United States is shown from the fact if you want to send a package to a friend in the next town, six or eight miles away, you must pay 16 cents a pound and your parcel cannot weigh more than four pounds, while if you have a friend in England, Germany or Russia to whom you wish to send another parcel you have to pay but 12 cents per pound and your package can weigh eleven pounds. Scheming lobbyists and sleepy congressmen have conspired to defraud the people out of their rights in this matter of reasonable postage rates, but it won't be for much longer. They will have to give the people what they want or get off the job for somebody who will.

In looking over the proceedings of a board of county supervisors as contained in a county paper not long since we saw a long list of items like the following: "Willie Blank, badger bounty, \$1.50." This putting of a bounty on badgers by these county commissioners was likely done in ignorance of the fact that next to hawks and owls they are the largest consumers and destroyers of gophers and other destructive rodents that we have. The badger is the most harmless and inoffensive creature known, and the only fault to be found with him is that he sometimes digs burrows in the meadows in neighborhoods where gophers and field mice abound. This badger bounty is a mistake and wherever in force ought to be repealed.

VENTILATION FOR TOBACCO.

Method of Curing Leaf Used by Large Growers in Pennsylvania.

The majority of the small tobacco growers thrash out their grain early, stack their straw and then use their barn mows and driveways for curing tobacco, says a bulletin on the production of cigar leaf tobacco in Pennsylvania issued by the United States department of agriculture. But the large growers usually erect separate curing sheds provided with some system for controlling the ventilation. In

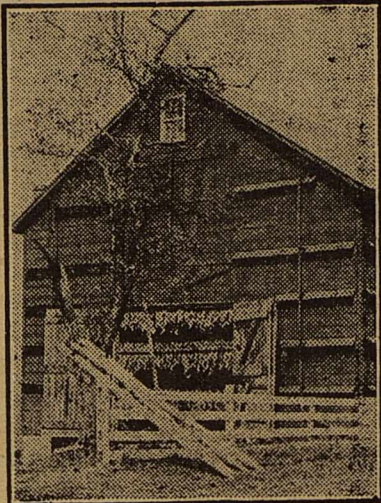


Photo by William Frear, vice director of the Pennsylvania agricultural experiment station.

some cases top ventilation is secured by means of slatted ventilators set in the gable ends of the shed or in the roof along the ridgepole or by means of valved, cylindrical, metal ventilators set in the roof peak. In others side ventilation is adopted, and either vertical ventilators are made by inserting loose boards at intervals of a few feet along the sides of the shed and fastened to a common vertical lifting rod, are fixed in the sides of the shed at points near the lower end of each tier. In still other cases the floor beams project on each side beyond the foundation walls, and the wall plates rest upon the ends of these beams rather than directly over or upon the foundation walls. The floor between these two lines of walls consists of trapdoors which can be raised to secure bottom ventilation.

Very commonly the system adopted provides for both side and roof ventilators, each under control from the floor, or for bottom and top ventilators. Heating systems for the control of ventilation are very exceptional.

Live Stock Notes.

Sugar beets have long been highly valued as a feed for cattle, and especially for milk cows, but it has lately been demonstrated that they have a high feeding value for hogs as well.

Behind the uncurried horse rides a worried man.

Little pigs may be kept from danger of crushing by the mother when she lies down by having a fender made of a scantling, rail or pole securely fastened, say, eight inches from the wall and the same distance from the floor.

The silo is usually thought of as an accessory of the dairy, but it is equally valuable for beef cattle. The cow brute has been trained to produce either beef or milk, but her digestive apparatus has not been changed.

Pick out the best lamb in the flock to keep or else buy one of some successful breeder of sheep.

Salt is necessary to the health and thrift of the domestic animals, and they should have it in winter as well as in summer.

Many a colt has been spoiled by indiscriminate petting and handling. Let the master pet and govern the youngsters until they know who is boss.

An occasional handful of oilmeal will do the horses good, especially if their main grain is corn. The pea size oil cake is handiest for this purpose.

A dairyman we read of the other day took the kinks out of his herd bull by compelling him to climb up and operate a tread power while getting his ration of hay. This would seem to be a plan worth adopting.

It is said that a vessel which recently landed in New York harbor had aboard a cargo of 20,000 pounds of Chinamen's cues which will be fumigated, renovated and manufactured into rats and puffs and fluffs or what you call 'em for milady's bogus head-gear.

Many who took the precaution during the last protracted dry spell to sink their wells to a good depth are feeling pretty comfortable these days when they see many of their neighbors driving their stock to flowing streams or hauling water to them in tanks or barrels.

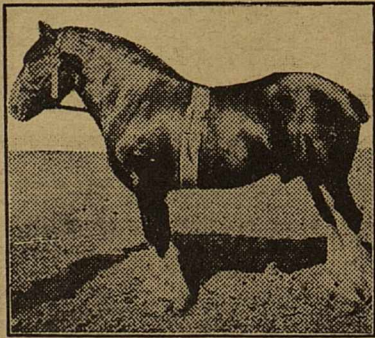

IMPROVEMENT IN HORSE BREEDING

Nearly all the states in the northwest have taken a positive stand on the proposition of aiding in the improvement of horseflesh. We refer to the fact that these states have enacted rigid stallion registration laws, laws that, if enforced, will show to every stallion patron the status of the sire in question both as to breeding and to health and constitution. It remains with the mare owner whether he will make the most of his opportunities and work toward constant improvement of his horse stock. Dr. Alexander of the Wisconsin station gives the following sound advice to mare owners:

Commence grading up the farm horse stock by mating carefully selected, sound, suitable mares with sound, prepotent, muscular, pure bred registered stallions.

Continue year after year to use the best obtainable pure bred stallions of

the character and breed first chosen and never outcross to any other breed.

Do not use any stallion that is unsound, unsuitable, partially impotent, unlicensed or not registered in a stud book recognized by the department of agriculture, Washington.

Do not breed from any mare that is deformed, sick, diseased, vicious, unsound, unsuitable, a poor milker or a cross mother.

Breed horses with the object of steadily improving the stock on the farm and advancing the horse breeding industry of the state.

Do not retain for breeding purposes any colt that is not pure bred and eligi-

ble to registry in a stud book recognized by the department of agriculture.

Encourage the working of pure bred stallions sufficient to keep them healthy, muscular, prepotent and prevent pampering, weakness, partial impotence and actual sterility and so tend to insure vigor, strong constitution and health in their offspring at birth and throughout life.

Encourage the home production of pure bred stallions to take the place of the host of undesirable grade, mongrel or scrub stallions at present retarding progress in horse breeding.
