ings or on the grounds.

6. Time to Assemble—Pupils shall not be permitted to assemble about the building before 8:30 a. m., nor remain about the grounds after the regular school hours.

7. Conduct and Discipline—Scuffling, whistling, rude language or behavior shall not be permitted in the building. Throwing stones and other dangerous missiles, having negro-shooters, etc., are forbidden. Playing for keeps, having or using tobacco in any form, quarreling, etc., shall also be prohibited. Pupils persisting therein shall forfeit their freedom to the grounds.

8. Injury to Property—Pupils who shall deface or injure school property shall pay in full for all damages.

9. Lunch—Pupils bringing lunch to school shall be required, except during very bad weather, to eat same on the school grounds. Pupils who do not bring lunch shall not be permitted to go elsewhere than to their homes to get it.

10. Pupils shall be under the school authorities from the time they leave their respective homes until they return and make their report to parents or guardians. Loitering on the way to or from school will not be tolerated. Parents are urged to require pupils to make an immediate report on returning from school.

NOTICE—While it is known that to have a successful school it must be well disciplined, it is also known that it is not best to try to tabulate all the "shalls" and "shall nots" in our Bulletin. However pupils are expected to conform to all regulations herein and hereafter given. Pupils should make it one of their great purposes to do right.

Janitors.

It shall be the duty of the janitor to keep the school building and grounds in good order, to sweep the rooms daily, to dust the furniture each morning before the school assembles, to make the first fires, and to wash floors and windows when directed to do so by the School Board.

A Word to the Patrons.

Enrollment and Attendance—Parents and guardians are urgently requested to have their children enrolled the first day of the school term, that they may be properly classified. Send them regularly to school. Delay in enrollment or the loss of a few days makes a great difference in the child's interest and progress and may cause the pupil the loss of a grade. Parents should see that their children are punctual in attendance. The good of the children demand it. All patrons are invited to confer freely with the principal concerning the interest of their children. Suggestions made in kindness are appreciated.

Parent-Teacher Club.

Realizing that for any school to be really successful, the parents and teachers must work together in perfect harmony, we are expecting to organize a Parent-Teacher Club. Through this organization we believe we can bring our school upon a higher plane of work. The primary object of this organization shall be to discuss the work and the possibilities of the school, which we believe will enable all to keep together on the one system of operation. The teachers and parents will be brought closer together, in that they will better understand each other; then, the teacher will know the needs and wants of each individual, thereby be prepared to prescribe the proper remedies for the existing evils.

This scheme has been tried in all the leading schools of the State and has proved to be a grand success. It will be a success in Brownfield. The mothers and fathers, and especially the mothers, who have children in school are interested in them enough to spend two or three hours a day of each month discussing the work which is so vitalizing to their well being. It is a well known fact that if the parent is interested in the school the child will get interested. It is also known that you can not convince a child that you are interested by only remarking about the school work. The thing for the parents to do is to awaken to their duty and get busy. The school is a business institution and not a play house, as some would term it. For any business to be successful it must have the healthy co-operation and support of all those interested in its purpose.

Parents are cordially invited and urged to visit the school and acquaint themselves with what their children are doing and what the teachers are doing for them. Do not criticize from hearsay, but examine for yourselves the character of the work.

AFFILIATION

Arrangements have been made by which the Brownfield School has been affiliated with the East Texas Normal College, thus giving the graduates of the Brownfield School the privilege of entering the College without examination. This is done to bring about a closer relation between the school and the different colleges, in consequence of the belief that there should exist among the different classes of schools perfect articulation.

The Mayo Scholarship—As an inducement for more efficient work in our high school, President W. L. Mayo of the E. T. N. C., will offer each year a free scholarship to the honor graduate of the Brownfield School, entitling him or her to one year's tuition in the College. This should serve as an inspiration to the pupils expecting to finish the courses offered in the Brownfield School. No pupil could hope to take a higher recommendation to a school than are the honors of his high school. Let every student awaken to the full significance of this offer and be ready to enter school on the first day full of determination to carry these honors to his own credit.

We have, also, obtained affiliation with the Stamford College of Stamford, Texas, through this institution we receive affiliation with all Texas Colleges and the State University. A pupil receiving a certificate from the Brownfield school, may enter the Stamford College with full credits through the tenth grade; by taking the eleventh grade in this college he may enter the University with full preparatory credits. Thus, it should be a delight to the students of Brownfield and convenient districts to cast their lots with us and continue until the full course is acquired.

THE NEW SCHOOL LAW

There taken effect in June 1911, an additional school law; briefly stated as follows: The Commissioners Court shall appoint 5 county trustees, one at large and one from each Precinct, who shall assume general control of the high schools of the county, and arrange with district trustees in transferring children. They shall classify the schools of the county into Primary, Intermediate and High schools. Primary school teaches 1st, 2nd and 3rd grade. Intermediate 4th, 5th, and 6th grades. High schools are of three classes: 1st class teachers 4 years work, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th grades. 11th grade preferred. Must have two teachers with first grade State Certificate, or higher to teach High school subjects, term of 8 months or more. 2nd class school, shall, maintain at least three years or grades above the 6th grade, have two teachers with first grade State Certificate; Term of 8 months. 3rd class shall teach two years or grades above 6th grade, employ one teacher with first grade State certificate, term of 7 months. All high schools teach all lower grades. Said County trustees shall prescribe a course of study for the county. The Commissioner Court have appointed the following County trustees as above stated. J. L. Randal Brownfield at Large. H. T. Day, Brownfield Com. Pre. No. 1, W. H. Gist Meadow, Pre. No. 2, W. A. Shepherd Gomez, Pre. No. 3, J. C. Lewis, Gomez, Pre. No. 4. Geo. W. Neill Sect'y. Successors to be elected at general trustee election in April, 1912. The above board, have classified Brownfield School No. 1, High school of the First Class. Gomez school No. 2 High School of the Third Class. All other schools, Intermediate. All the latter teach not above the 6th grade, altho where the conditions are suitable the County Trustees may permit a higher grade to be taught in Intermediate schools. Above this grade may be transferred to a High school, with free tuition. For further information in these matters, consult with the Trustee living nearest you, or this office. The adopted course of study follows in these pages.

This system is intended and calculated to better the pupils interest in giving the lower grades the benefit of the teachers full time and the higher grades more time and attention, and the advantage of classified high school learning. This system, if co-operation of parents is given, is estimated to save some three or more years in the school work of the average scholastic pupil. We urge the patrons to give serious thought to this before condemning it. Its purpose is for the betterment of pupils schooling; to obtain full value from the school; to save time in the scholastic life; to equalize the work of the teacher in the common school, and to give to more pupils a more effective High school training. To this end we ask the assistance of the people.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR TERRY COUNTY, TEXAS, AS ADOPTED BY BOARD OF COUNTY TRUSTEES SEPTEMBER 8, 1911

First Year or Grade

READING: During first term, use Chart, Blackboard and Cyr's primer; Second term, Our Country's First Reader and Art Literature reader book 1. Supplementary work selected by teacher. (if any used)

SPELLING: Spell appropriate words taken from Reader, Chat Board and conversation.

WRITING: In beginning to write children should use pencil and tablet. Teach position, accuracy and neatness; copy work given by teacher.

LANGUAGE: Beginning oral, taken from Readers and conversation with Teacher.

NUMBERS: Teach from objects, to illustrate combination of numbers from 1 to 10. Names of signs and their uses.

GENERAL LESSONS: Physiology, and hygiene, local geography and nature study. No book. Give lessons on sun, sunshine, weather, seasons etc. Primary colors, forms of water, fruits and domestic animals.

Second Year or Grade.

READING: Our Country's Second Reader and Art Literature Book 11. Drill in phonics, and diacritical marks. Expression.

SPELLING: New Century Spelling Book, Complete Sec. 147. Memory Gems, page 43. Teach letter sounds, silent letters; oral and written.

WRITING: Berry's writing book No. 2. Drawing book selected by teacher.

LANGUAGE: Oral and written production of stories and fables. Teach common marks of punctuation and simple abbreviations. Short composition may be written from plants, animals and other objects. If any book, in hands of teacher only.

NUMBERS: Continue combination of numbers, develop idea of surface, giving simple addition and subtraction. No book required.

GENERAL LESSONS: Nature study. Lessons on roots, cereals, leaves used as food; domestic animals, ice, snow, rain, wind, etc. Lectures on simple Physiology and Geography (Home)

Third Year or Grade.

READING: Our Country's Third Reader and Art Literature No. 3. Phonetics and diacritical marks.

SPELLING: New Century Spelling Books. Complete part 1. Memory gems on page 64 (phonetics review page 6.)

WRITING: Berry's writing book No. 3. Drawing book selected by teacher.

LANGUAGE: Buehler and Hotchkiss Modern English Lessons. Chapters 1. and 2. Strict attention should be given to correctness in detail spelling, punctuation, penmanship, etc.

NUMBERS: Myers-Brooks Elementary Arithmetic, pages 13 to 107. Mental Arithmetic page 1 to 27; Hopkins & Underwoods. Multiplication table mastered in this grade.

GEOGRAPHY: Frye's, (or Dodge's Primary Geography page 1 to 112) May use either.

GENERAL LESSONS: Nature study; review work in preceding grades; continue observations of clouds, winds, water.

Fourth Year or Grades.

READING: Our Country's Fourth Reader. Supplementary reading selected by teacher and trustees.

SPELLING: New Century Spelling Book; Complete Sec. 75; memory gems pages 85. Phonetic and diacritical marks; oral and written.

WRITING: Berry's writing book No. 4, using pen and ink.

LANGUAGE: Buehler & Hotchkiss Modern English Lessons; Chap. 3 and 4.

NUMBERS: Myers-Brooks Elementary Arithmetic, page

Extension of Quanah Line.

Funds for Building Westward Said to be Available.

Austin, Tex., Sept. 7.—The Railroad Commission was today notified that the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railroad had completed arrangements for the necessary finance to build the extension westward, which has been projected for some time. It is to go to El Paso, with Roswell, N. M., as the ultimate destination. A meeting is to be held in Quanah within the next few days to put the final touches to the selection of the route. At present the line is in operation from Quanah to Paducah, forty-three miles. The distance from Quanah to Roswell is 350 miles. —Dallas News.
