## SUCCESSFUL TURKEY RAISING

PRIZE ARTICLE.

I will confine this article to just one branch of the industry, as only limited space is allowed. I could do justice to only one, when we consider there is so much to be learned along this line. As there is a great demand for this bird, of all the meat supplied for the table; turkey stands pre-eminent at the head. Xmas and Thanksgiving would be incomplete without the lordly turkey "done to a turn" whenever a dinner is given, on whatever occasion, or whatever may be the order, where all the viands, delicacies and sweetmeats are to be found in profusion, if the turkey is missing there is a void that cannot be compensated for by anything else; it is the bird reserved for great occasions. Besides the profit assured, which is a paying business just now, as they are decreasing in number each year.

### SELECTING THE BREED

We have several good breeds: the bronze ranking first; then comes the black Spanish with Greys and White Hollands each a close second. There is the Naragansett and the Slaters and many other crosses which are all good breeds if properly managed. The bronze seems to be the most popular and is a larger bird than the other breeds, but I have successfully raised others with as great profit. My experience is, the marketing is the thing that counts up the profits, which I will speak of later.

I select a tom of good average size, not over large; about one or two years old, and mate him with six to twelve two year old hens, as I find a full grown hen produces a greater number of hatchable eggs. I gather the eggs each day as fast as laid, as the night air and due will chill them and you will not get a satisfactory hatch. I turn them every day until I am ready to sit them. I find it best to let the turkey hen run at large on the farm and select her own nest. I watch her very closely, as she is very shy and cautious about her nest. Nests are to be found under brush, or near some tufts of grass, on a high knoll.

I place from seventeen to twenty eggs under each hen. It takes twenty-eight days for a turkey egg to incubate. About the 24th day I sprinkle the eggs with warm water, but should a rainy spell set in about this time it is

not necessary, but if very dry, it is, as difficulty in hatching is experienced by the skin [membrane] of the egg being so tough that the turks can't peck thru, caused by the excessive dryness of the atmosphere.

### FEEDING THE POULTS.

As fast as hatched, take from the nest and put in a warm box, best lined with flannel. Do not let them get chilled as this causes bowell trouble, and do not feed for forty-eight hours. For first feed, I take cold bread, soak in warm sweet milk, with a dash of black pepper. Give what they will eat up clean, I feed this for two days and then I fix a curd with onions added, which they relish very much. I begin feeding grain when about a week old usually at night, as they are great foragers. By letting them roam at will they get a variety of food consisting of seeds and insects. Nature supplies the food they crave most and upon which they thrive best. Turkeys will destroy a great quantity of insects if allowed to roam the fields where there is range or large area available, like here in the West. Turkeys may be profitably raised. Prices have been exceptionally good for two or three years, making turkey raising attractive.

There is nothing on the farm that will be found as lucrative as turkey raising successfully managed; more profit is gained from the amount of money invested than any other animal or fowl on the farm. Why not get some good breeding stock and raise turkeys? With the editors permission I will give my experience in marketing in another article.

### Live And Let Live.

The old idea that a corporation is soulless is being exploded. Deeds of corporations indicating that they are not altogether selfish are constantly coming to our knowledge. The donation by J. Ogden Armour of a million dollars to be used as a nucleus for a pension fund for the employees of Armour & Company, which has recently been in the public eye, is one example.

Another that probably has not been given so much publicity is furnished by the Santa Fe Railway. Last year there was a wheat crop failure in Northwestern Oklahoma and the settlers, many

of them new in the community because discouraged. They were short on finances and there seemed no way for them to obtain seed for another year. The Santa Fe Railway, having confidence in the future of that country, extended to the farmers the line of credit they needed. The Company purchased eighteen carloads of seed wheat and sold it to the settlers at cost, taking their notes therefor, payable in a year. With a fair crop in that section of the state this year, nearly all of the settlers were able to pay their notes. Those who felt the need of an extension of time were given additional encouragement by being permitted to renew their notes.

The Railway Business Men's Association of the United States in a report issued a few weeks ago presented a synopsis of legislation, or rather of the absence of legislation, in forty state bodies. That the last Texas Legislature did not pass one law inimical to railroads was accorded special recognition, and the fact is being commented on favorably throughout the Union. This action is being construed by capitalists over the country to mean that Texas people are inviting railroads construction in their state. This is true. The citizens of Texas realize that the railway is probably the most powerful single factor in the state's industrial advancement and that the wonderful resources of the Lone Star State can never be developed without the construction of many times the present railroad mileage.

The people of the country, the factories and the railroads are inter-dependent. The financial success of each is more or less contingent upon the prosperity of all. Co-operative advancement is the only safe plan. The action taken by Armour & Company and the Santa Fe Railroad, and the lack of antagonistic legislation by forty states, noted above, would indicate that all are awakening to a realization of the basic principle of applied economy - reciprocity.

An exchange says:

"A prominent farmer paid \$400 for a pair of mules. He refused to pay \$300 for a pair of smaller mules because the larger ones could pull 150 pounds more because of their increased size. He refused to vote a bond issue for good roads that would have enabled the smaller mules to pull one thousand pounds more." Penny wise and pound foolish.

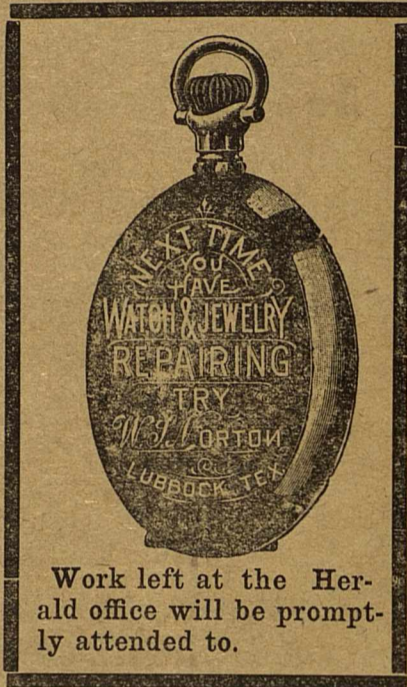

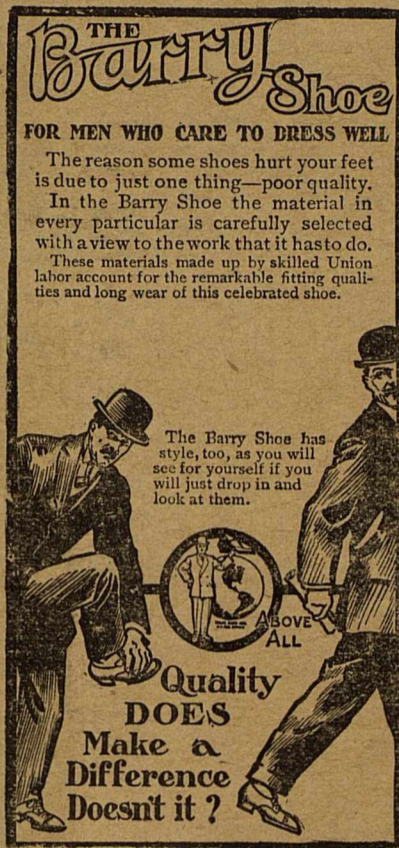

**WHITES vs. NEGROES.**  
Director Durand of the Bureau

of Census, Department of Commerce and Labor, has Just issued a preliminary statement giving for each state and territory of continental United States the distribution of the population according to the elements of race, natively and parentage, as shown by the returns of the Thirteenth Decennial Census taken as of April 15th, 1910.  
The foreign element is proportionally greatest in the New England and Middle Atlantic divisions. On the contrary, in nearly all of the Southern states more than two-thirds of the total population is native white of native birth.  
The statements shows that in Texas the negro race did not in-

crease proportionally as much as the white and that the negro population of the entire state represents a smaller percentage in 1910 than in 1900.

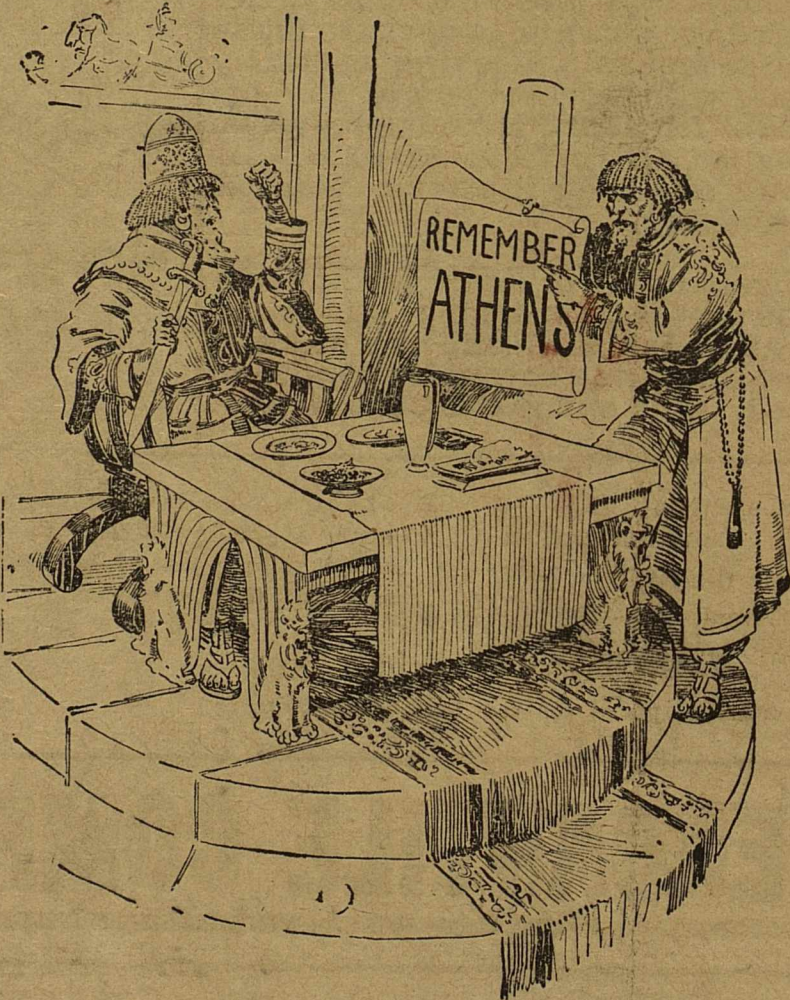
