JAMES R. ROBINSON

We are glad to be afforded the pleasure of announcing to the qualified voters of Terry county the candidacy of Judge James R. Robinson, of Lubbock, for the office of District Judge, of the 72nd Judicial District.

As a boy he served the last 14

months in the Confederate army in that great conflict. He took a prominent part in engineering the early civilization of Texas and in the legislature the first term was chairman of Indian Affairs and saw the dread savage pass out of Texas. This was then a very important committee. During both terms he fought for the preservation of public lands for the settler. He came to Lubbock in the spring of 1906, and he and his six sons are all residents of the South Plains.

Perhaps we were too previous last week about the Yoakum Co. Commissioners Court being slow on road construction, as we learn this week that they are considering bids on their end of the road. The two heretofore decenting commissioners have come across and the good road will now be constructed. Perhaps they saw "the hand writing on the wall" in the determination of the good people of Yoakum county to have a good road.

In this connection we want to say that our Court has just received the Tahoka road with the exception of possibly a day or so's work near Burnett Bros. ranch, and has given Mr. Copeland the contract to make the road from here to Gomez 24 feet instead of 16, and one of the commissioners said the work would likely be extended on to the county line. The big hill at the draw will be given a good working, being either bedded with rock or clay. We have nearly \$8,000 in our treasury and our Commissioners Court believe the money can be no better spent than to give their constituents respectable thoroughfares. They are a progressive set and have the hearty support of the people.

In this connection and with reference again to the Roswell mayor's letter published in the last week's Herald, we wish to state that these new efforts toward good road construction will give us a hundred percent better show to land the Trans-Continen-

tal auto line from the East to California; one to come in from Dodge, Kan. to Amarillo, Plainview, Lubbock, Brownfield and thence west to Roswell, and another from the Southern states to branch off the T. & P. at possibly Sweetwater and come into this Northern line at Brownfield, via Snyder, Post and Tahoka.

We are reliably informed that nearly 1000 owners of autos in the North, and South have signified their intention of attending the Panama-Pacific exhibition in 1915, and it is thought the total by that time shall have reached a total of more than 2500. Just think what this immense travel will mean to our South Plains country, not to mention the annual pleasure trips incident to the long stretch of good roads to be found through here, prior to and after 1915.

People who are able to travel across the continent in the luxury of a touring car, are bound to be wealthy, influential people, whose words count for something where they come from. If we show up with good roads, they will be sure to mention the fact when they return home and this advertising will be worth thousands of dollars to us for more than 50,000 people will return to their homes and say: "The people of the South Plains are few but they have a rich level country and are the most public spirited on the entire route. We still remember how the authorities investigated the affairs on the Slocum when it went down, and thought perhaps that there after any great disaster at sea would find the confiding passengers amply provided with the best of life preservers and plenty of life boats, but alas! for the carelessness of man. Perhaps this disaster will see a set of officials appointed whose soul duty will be to see that all pass-

enger boats will have sufficient protection for the lives of its passengers.

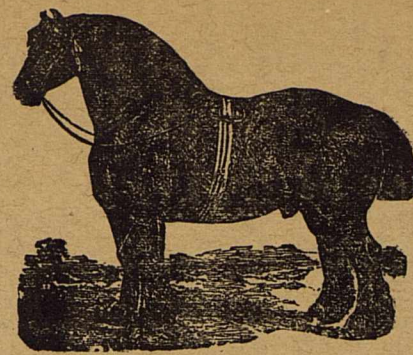

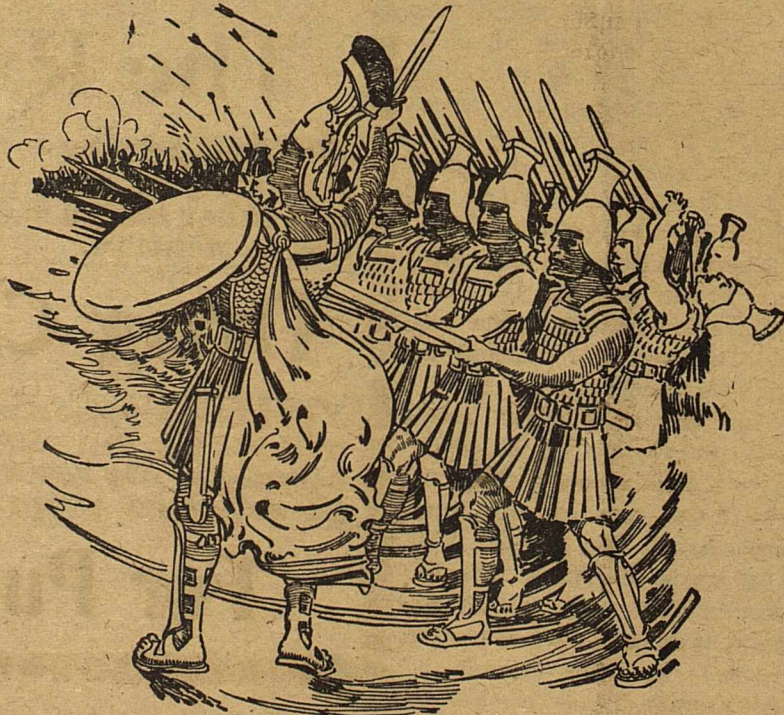

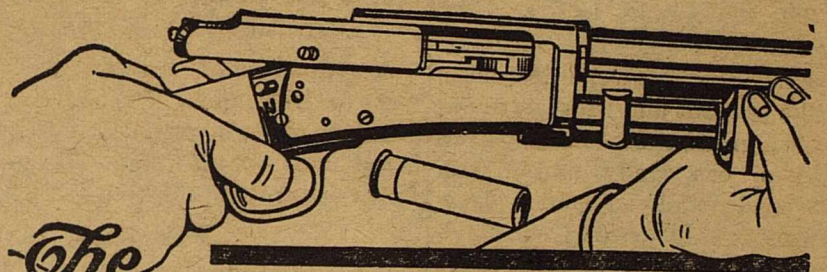
