



PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PRESCRIBING QUAL-IFICATIONS FOR DIRTRICT JUDGES OF THIS STATE AND PRESCRIB-ING THEIR TENURE OF OFFICE.

(S. J. R. No. 11.) A JOINT RESOLUTION.

Amending Section 7. Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the creation and formation of judicial districts, the teams of compensation and qualification of the judges of the district courts, and the times of

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State

Section 1. That Section 7, Article 5, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: Section 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a general election, one or more judges, each of whom shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall have been a practicing lawyer of this State' or a judge of a court in this State for six years next preceding his election; who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two years next preceding his election; who shall reside in his district during his term of office; who shall hold his office for a period of four years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary of three thousand dollars, until otherwise changed by law. Court shall be held by a district judge at the county seat in each of the several counties at such times and in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall provide for the holding of the district court when the judge thereof is absent, disabled or disqualified from acting. The district judges who may be in office when this amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their resepective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment.

Sec 2. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue necessary pro-clamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the 19th day of July, 1913, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendof the State of Texas, relating to district judge and district courts," and all voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printer on their ballot the words: "Against the amend ment of Section 7. Article 5, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to district judges and district court.'

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated to pay expenses for carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

State Constitution Providing All State District, County And Precinct Officers Within This State Shall Be Compensated By The Payment of A Fixed Salary.

(H. J. R. No. 41.) A Joint Resolution

Of the Legislature of the State of Texas, proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State by adding to Article 16 known as Section 58, providing through the same. for the tenure and compensation of public officials.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That there be added to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be known as Section 58, which shall read as follows:

Section 58. All State, district, day (Tues.) with two thousand county and precinct officers within the State of Texas shall hereinafter be compensated by the payment of a salary to be fixed or provided for by the Legislature.

The remedy lies in organization and in co-operation in marketing.
