## School Tax Defeated.

By the decisive vote of 29 to 14 the anti-school tax people carried the day Saturday. There is no use to say that if the pro side had turned out that it would have been different, as there were many confessed antis out also.

The Herald is too democratic to howl over the rule of the majority, as we suppose the people know what they want, but there is no use in denying the fact that our school will be badly crippled next term.

We never could see the policy in lying about "our great school system" in order to get people to come to town to a supposed eight or nine months school, when it can't possibly go over seven. Just because we made the great mistake of bonding the district, it does not license us to kill the whole school.

Our trustees inform us that we have only \$1200 for next year, which will pay a principal \$75 per month and two assistants \$50 each per month for seven months, and we must maintain as many as three first grade teachers and run eight months to hold our place as a high school of the first class.

We have heard several say that experienced teachers can be had from \$35 to \$50 per month. We wish to state that the trustees would be glad to have their address, or your assistance in getting them.

## Live At Home.

The Farmer's Union is inaugurating a "Live at Home" campaign among the farmers of Texas. Mr. Peter Radford, President of the Union, in discussing the subject said: "There is no reason why a farmer should buy a dollar's worth of meat during the year, but from such information as I am able to obtain, the farmers of Texas buy \$26,000,000 of pork and its products per annum, to say nothing of other kinds of meats and supplies purchased that should be raised on the farm. No farmer can afford to buy a thing he can raise, no matter how cheap it may be."

According to government estimates, the per capita consumption of pork and its products per annum is 100 pounds and the Federal Census Reports on hogs marketed and slaughtered in each county, give a reliable basis for production by counties.

The report shows Terry County produces 209,400 pounds

of pork and consumes 117,400 pounds per annum.

The Farmer's Union is asking that the farmers reduce the cotton acreage and "plant" hogs, raise more corn, milo maize, build silos and feed and fatten livestock on the farm and live at home the whole year around.

Terry is one of the few Texas counties that produces enough pork for home consumption.

## Commissioner's Court

Court met Monday and Tuesday and settled all claims satisfactorily, on the road running two miles south of town, and the same is opened up, and grading will be finished this week.

The road running southeast in the direction of Lamesa, was partially established and report of jury of view received.

Contract was let to C. W. Taylor to re-clar the mud holes near the Shepherd place on the Plains road, and on on the Gomez road, and one east of town on the Tahoka road.

The Commissioners are corresponding with surveyors to have the road north, in the direction of Lubbock surveyed, and contracts for grading were postponed until this was done. On account of the fact that Lubbock has dropped any road work in this direction, the Court decided to grade this one only a few miles out from this place.

All proceedings had in the road running south from Gomez, toward Gaines county, was rescinded and annulled.

### Four Silos Contracted

On last Saturday morning, four of our stock-farmers closed a deal with an all steel silo man for a car load of silos, which will be shipped some time in the next two months. Those contracted for are Burnett Bros 385 tons, Harry Braidfoot 385, Jack Bryan 256 tons and Frank Proctor 200. Making a capacity of 1226 tons of ensilage for Terry county parties already contracted. We believe this is only the beginning of orders for silos, as the steel silo man has now located in Lubbock, we understand, and will have occasion to visit us quite often.

Herald congratulates these four gentlemen however for being the original silo men of Terry, and predicts for them unbounded success. Let the good work go on.

### A Destructive Hail.

Another good rain and a hail that wrought havoc in some portions of the county, visited Terry last Friday afternoon. The hail was especially heavy in the Fisher settlement and a long strip across the southern portion of the county.

Mr. Carson informed us that in the Fisher settlement, northeast of town that lots of prairie dogs and rabbits were killed, and that hail and water was nearly six inches deep on the ground. He said it was the biggest rain and hail he ever saw, and he has seen mountain torrents in the Rockies. Mr. Fisher's folks picked up enough hail to make ice cream Saturday afternoon.

Here in town the hail was heavy, covering the ground about two inches, but was small and accompanied by a deluge of rain which soon melted the ice. John Gracey said they had no hail at his place, six miles north of town, but had a good rain after bed time.

J. C. Patterson said the hail was light at his place south of town, but there was a destructive strip on both sides of him. There were rabbits and prairie dogs killed in his neighborhood.

There being little planted other than garden truck, the destruction was confined mostly to that and fruit. Mr. Carson lost twenty acres of cotton that was up. Anyway, Terry has a fine season to plant with, and many a seed went into the ground this week.

### Many Tennesseans Come To Texas.

Chattanooga, Tenn., May—A census bulletin which was recently issued by the Federal Department of Commerce and Labor has attracted considerable attention among the business men and commercial organizations of this State. The report shows that there are 134,702 persons born in this State who now reside in Texas while Tennessee's population consists of only 5,592 persons from the "Lone Star" State.

It is reported that a movement to keep "Tennesseans in Tennessee" will be launched in the near future and the plan is expected to meet with the cooperation of every citizen of this State.

### Record Breaking Cattle Receipts.

Fort Worth, Texas, May—Although large consignments of South Texas cattle passed through the Fort Worth market enroute to pasturage, all previous records in cattle receipts were broken in April. The cattle receipts for the month aggregated 120,385 and is considered as an indication of an onward move in the cattle industry. During the week ending April 26, 35,306 cattle were received at the stockyards which is the largest run in any one week in the history of the yards.

Mrs. H. M. King sold two cars of straight grass cows at \$6.75 per hundred pounds and a car of grass heifers at \$7.45 per hundred. These were the highest prices ever paid for grass stuff.

### EXCELLENT FOOD FOR STOCK

Carrots, Turnips, Beets, Mangels and Potatoes Are Easily Digested and Keep Animals Healthy.

Better plant that extra patch next year in vegetables for your live stock. Beets, potatoes, carrots, turnips, and mangels are good food for animals. They are easily digested and keep the animal in good health.

Roots should be prepared properly before being fed. They should be shredded or sliced and mixed with chaffed hay. They also may be cooked or steamed, which makes a mash of them.

Beets are fed quite extensively in sections where sugar beets are grown and show good results. A test with ten cows made in France shows that it is more profitable to feed the residue or pulp from the sugar factory to cows than the whole beet. Mangels are very good feed for dairy cows and sheep. From 40 to 60 pounds may be fed to dairy cows daily. Fattening cattle may have 100 pounds and pigs four to twenty pounds, daily, in proportion to their size.

## FARM LIFE COMMISSION

Texas Secretaries Study Farm Life Conditions—Head of Farmers' Union to Manage Bureau.

The Texas Farm Life Commission is going to inaugurate a movement to "keep the boys on the farm" and they propose to do this by making farm life more attractive and the business of farming more remunerative. Many of the youngsters, attracted by the glare of the city, leave the farm before realizing the wonderful possibilities that surround them in their country homes. Then there are problems in production and marketing that must be solved through organized effort.

The commission will study every phase of agriculture and will endeavor to provide the machinery for taking out the waste in methods of producing and marketing farm products.

The commission was organized by the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association and is composed of fifteen members. Mr. S. A. Lindsey of Tyler is chairman of the commission and Peter Radford of Fort Worth manager. The following are the commissioners: H. Lass, Brookshire; S. D. Steedman, Hagerman; J. T. S. Gant, Archer City; Geo. B. Dealey, Dallas; W. F. Proctor, Tyler; E. W. Knox, San Antonio; Joe Hirsch, Corpus Christi; Mrs. E. P. Turner, Dallas; A. Caswell Ellis, Austin; E. J. Kyle, College Station; Edwin Chamberlain, San Antonio; E. W. Kirkpatrick, McKinney; C. W. Post, Post City, and R. J. Kleberg, Kingsville.

The commission will hold a meeting at an early date to outline the work and appoint sub-committees and otherwise organize its forces for aggressive work in every county in Texas.

Mr. Peter Radford, manager of the commission, is president of the Farmers' union, and his general knowledge of agricultural conditions in the state and wide personal acquaintance among the farmers well qualifies him for the work. Mr. Radford will spend most of his time on the road in the interest of the movement. The state headquarters of the organization will be in Fort Worth.
