SOUTHERN NATIONAL HIGHWAY ASSURED

Col. Dell M. Potter, Pres. and Party Pleased. Official Logger to be Through in About Two Weeks.

As announced last week, Col. Potter of Bisbee Ariz. President of the Southern National Highway, and party, passed through Brownfield on their way to Roswell and El Paso, where Mr. Westgard, the official logger of the American Automobile Association will be met, coming this way. Col. Potter expressed himself as being highly pleased with the route as established through this part of the country. After spending a short time in Brownfield, they persuaded Judge Neill, one of our main good roads boosters off to Roswell with them and tried to get W. A. Bell, but he couldn't leave the bank. Judge Neill reports that they were treated royally at Roswell and that Roswell, like Sweetwater and Snyder, will stay with us on the proposition.

Dick Brownfield reports that recently while at Sterling City, he found they and San Angelo were claiming the route through their towns and they had sent a car to El Paso where they will try to get Mr. Westgard to come over their route; funny to relate

their party came through Brownfield, 200 miles out of their way. Why? They can't get to El Paso handy without taking this route or the T. & P. railroad.

On their return back the party raised \$50 at Plains and at an enthusiastic meeting here, \$200 was raised in a few minutes to reimburse Sweetwater for what they have been out. Mr. M. V. Brownfield, Pres. of our association, went to the Singleton ranch this week to confer with Mr. Singleton before laying out and scraping a route to O'Donnell, and thence to Gail, which will be done before Mr. Westgard gets here.

Mr. Brownfield and Judge Neill are delegated by Pres. Potter to meet the official logger at Bronco and conduct him to half way ground toward Gail.

Helping Girls to An Education.

Mr. George Brackenridge of San Antonio has given the University of Texas \$25,000 which is to be loaned to young women wishing to study law, Medicine, or Architecture. The money is loaned to young women who with out this aid would not be able to obtain a University education. Up till the present time nearly every young woman who has studied Medicine in the Medical Department at Galveston has been able to do so through the generous aid of Mr. Brackenridge. Out of a class of fifty young physicians who graduated in June the student taking the first honors and the student take the second honors were both young women. One of these students was a Russian girl who has been in the United States only six years. The other is a graduate of the Academic Department in Austin. She supported herself while a student in the University and at the same time helped support her widowed mother. It has taken years of heroic effort on her part to obtain the two degrees she holds from the University of Texas. Her perseverance and courage are now to be rewarded with a splendid situation, the income of which will enable her and her mother to live in comfort.

The story of this young woman should be an inspiration to every boy and girl in the state of Texas, no matter how poor, who wishes a University education. It may take hard work and sacrifice, but a good education is possible Texas for every aspiring young person. It is one of the blessings of our great public school system, at the head of which, as an intergral part, stands the University.

C. M. Evans, Superintendent of the extension Department of the A. & M. College has the following to say in reply to a recent inquiry from San Angelo, Texas. "Probably the best feeds for use in the silo in your section are milo maize, kafir corn, and sorghum.

"Don't despise the old hen on the farm. She is a great money maker if properly cared for," says John C. Burns, of the animal husbandry department at A.

& M. College. "Feed her right and she won't try to eat the feed put in the trough for the cows and horses. Provide clean roots and a clean place to nest and she will pay you \$2.00 a year at the least. Those who have properly cared for the ordinary scrub chicken on the farm have found that their labors were met with big returns. She will also give you a good living at home.

Sixteen different courses of study in the Bible will be available to the students in the University of Texas during the next session, upon which, under proper restrictions, they may receive credit on their University degrees. The instructors in these courses are ministers and laymen of various churches in Austin who devote their time to teaching. In addition to these courses in the Bible, other courses are offered by the Texas Bible Chair founded by the Christian Church of Texas; Bible study courses are also offered by the Y. M. C. A., and by the Texas Presbyterian Seminary. The Methodists of Texas are considering the plan of erecting a building near the campus to be in charge of a minister who will give courses in the Bible for students in the University. In time it is likely that every prominent church in Texas will establish work similar to that already undertaken by that of the Christian Church for the religious instruction of the ever increasing numbers of students at the University of Texas.

An improved highway is the shortest distance between two given points.

Good roads is the question that involves the happiness of the home. The perpetuity of our government.

The happiness of the home is involved in the question of good roads. This is the reason that our mothers are interested.

Economies in all its phases is embraced in the construction of good roads and streets. Advocates of good highways are the heralds of prosperity.

A large portion of ignorance in our State is due to a lack of improved highways. Good roads beget wisdom and is an evidence of good citizenship.

A good way to keep the boy on the farm is to have good roads, and make rural life as effective as city life. An effective way to reduce the cost of living is to cheapen the marketing of the products.

If you would prosper, make wise investments. In road building the best investment is to have the proper machinery with the application of business judgment in the expenditure of road funds.

I had rather live in a hovel on the side of a permanent road than to reside in a palace where there is no such highway. I had rather be an advocate of good roads than to be a king on a throne and oppose them.

I would not discourage foreign

missionary work, but I am rather envious of the permanent high ways that have been constructed in some of the countries to which we are sending Christian missionaries.

If it were possible to assemble the money wasted on patch work on public roads, there would be fund enough to build a permanent road from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean and from the City of Mexico to Chicago.

The beneficial effects of rural free delivery in Texas are becoming more and more apparent. Nothing will contribute more to the enlargement of this service than to have an increase in mileage of improved highways.

The Crewless Ship.

The German Naval league has just tested the work of an inventor of Nuremberg, a ship to run without a crew.
