MORAL TRAINING BY THE PATH OF LITERATURE

We, as teachers, know how important it is to teach morals in our schools. We have several methods of teaching incidentally and accidentally as some one has said. I will give my methods of teaching by literature: I write selections on the blackboard for my pupils to copy in their little commonplace copy-books. These books are made by the pupils, and the copied passages do duty as a reading lesson after it has been thoroughly analyzed and disposed of in a grammatical fashion. All the time, we are enjoying the beauty of thought and language and taking in by the way the ethical truth conveyed by it. This method of teaching morals and at the same time literature, grammar and reading, has proven very successful wherever I have tried it. I find that very few homes have a library where their children can read at their leisure. In this way they get a mere glimpse into the literary world as you introduce passage from Shake speare, Wordsworth, Tennyson, Miss Browning and many other famous authors. I determine to teach morals for their own sake, primarily and let the spelling and writing come as a secondary matter. These lessons are to be additional to the regular spelling

and reading, but the little ones think it a treat to be allowed to copy easy sentences from the board, such as: "Be courteous" "Straight is the line of duty." "Politeness is to do and say the kindest things in the kindest way. Others like these are used

HOW I USE MY LITERARY GEMS

During the first ten minutes of each morning session, I read a short selection from the Bible followed by a song. Then the whole school recites together their "pieces" as the little ones call them. All repeat together one beautiful at a time, until all are committed to memory. Then individual pupils are called upon to repeat one beautiful until all are thoroughly learned by the pupils. This is how I apply them: If I observe any ill feeling or quarling among pupils, I call their attention to "Blessed is the peace maker." One morning I saw some of my boys beating their donkey unmercifully, and that morning we repeated the beautiful, "Blessed are the merciful." Then I followed with a few pointed words to carry home the meaning, uttered in the kindest gentle manner. The downcast, shamefaced looks, soon told that the lesson was applied. Had I reason to believe that some of the pupils had copied arithmetic problems, or did I see them casting stealthy looks on their next neighbor's paper to catch a glimpse of his spelling

of a word, I would take the earliest occasion to read the fifteenth or twenty fourth Psalm, setting forth the beauty of walking uprightly and doing righteous. Here is something from Geo. Herbert—

Dare to be true, nothing can need a lie; a fault which needs it most, groweth two thereby." And from Schuler: "Who dares to think one thing and another till my heart detests him, as the gates of hell." Another good one: "Be good, sweet maid, and let who will be cherry, do noble things, not dream them all day long, and so make life, death and that vast forever one grand sweet song." Another still: True worth is in being, not seeming, in doing each day that goes by some little good, not in dreaming of great things to do by and by, for whatever men say in their blindness and in spite of the fancies of youth, there is nothing so kind as kindness, and nothing so royal as truth." Or those which were the guide of our old Roman long ago. Be brave, be just, be pure, be true, in word and deed, care not for your enjoyment, care not for your life, care only for what is right.

spend the most of their time.

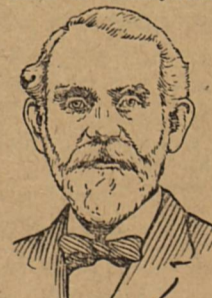
It is also a well known fact that beauty attracts children even more than grown ups, and in beautifying any locality, one naturally cleans and sanitates. For instance, it is a hard matter to get children to go to school, but if you will at least make their quarters at the school house as nice and beautiful as at home, there will be less likelihood that you will have a job each morning to get your child to school. In this article, we propose to confine ourselves to the school alone, as that is the place we aim to send our children before long, and keep them there for seven or eight long months. In the first place, our school building is like some abandoned shack in a bum mining camp; that is needs painting can be told a thousand yards distant, but as we are short of funds, and the anti school people will not let us have more, the public spirited people of Brownfield will have to put up the cash, and a Mothers Club shall lead us. Let us at least put one coat of paint on. Again a Mothers Club would begin early preparations to put out trees, and beautify the school play ground. Above all things the windows need shades and the floors need a genuine scrubbing, once in every decade at least. It takes cooperation and money to do these things. It is a damnable shame for parents to permit our school play ground to grow up into a patch of sand burs that make our barefooted children walk like high wire performers. Such people ought to have to walk barefooted over them every day for about three months, and we believe they would consider some plan to get rid of them, at least on the school play ground. One good mother had a talk with the editor this week about the Mothers Club, and we informed her, it would prove a blessing to the town. It is a pity that men cannot get enough heathenism out of themselves to form a Fathers Club, but we have no hopes. Let the mothers of Brownfield talk this over every time two or more get together. By all means get together.
