We left Lubbock at 7:45, and glided along nicely, clipping off the miles at an even gait until we reached the little village of Meadow. Here we stopped, chatted a few minutes with the genial Postmaster-Merchant, J. W. Peeler, in this community, as well as along the road between Lubbock and Meadow, the crops are simply fine, all kinds, and the range conditions could not be better cattle in fine condition and everybody busy.

Leaving Meadow, we hastened on to Brownfield, arriving there about 10:00 o'clock a. m. Here we met a number of old friends among them being the editor of the Terry County Herald, who was busy preparing the news for his readers. We left there a big lot of Mr. Lewis' four-page circulars and started for Gomez, the little town west of Brownfield five miles. In the few min utes we were there and met a few people of that burg, tacked up a lot of bills and departed for Plains, 30 miles further west. Passing over a country covered with fine grass and lakes of water on either side of the road, and where there were farms the crops were looking well, though not as far advanced in the sandy lands as in the harder soils of Lubbock and Terry Counties .-Lubbock Avalanche.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Legislature of the tSate of Texas.

Section i. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of previous general election, in case a general election for the state shall sooner be ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be sub-mitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejec-tion, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the legislature, and extension of term of regu-
