The real reason is found in the fact that today there is a vastly greater amount of beer consumed. And beer is not conducive to drunkenness.

Prohibition is a failure and has had but one effect wherever tried: to put a ban upon the open and above-board drinking of beer and other light beverages and to drive men to secret, immoderate drinking of the strongest stimulants. This is notably true of Maine, a prohibition state. There is ten times as much drunkenness per capita as there is in France.

Some Apples

Together with M. V. Brownfield, Mr. Youngblood and Edcie Ward, we had a seat in the big Buick car of the former, and had a nice morning spin out to the Brownfield ranch, six miles south

east of town last Sunday morn. Upon striking the ranch our vision was greeted with fat cattle and grass between knee and waist high, the like of which Mr. Brownfield says he has not had in a number of years, but grass, or crops either for that matter have not suffered a minute hardly this year. They have a large Johnson grass farm down there that has been cut once this year and will be ready for another cutting in a few days, that supplies the ranch and they furnish a great deal of this splendid hay to the livery barn in town. Upon arriving at the ranch house, Ray Brownfield, the present boss, and his A1 hand, Walter Scudday, showed us over the orchard, that contains a sight of grapes, tons of apples, lots of plums and a good sprinkling of peaches. They have about four or five acres in orchard, surrounded by a locust forest, and to say the trees are bending is no fiction in this instance. Looking under the trees, you will see apples from the size of a marble on up, that have been pulled off. Ray says about every month he thins them out, but by the next month they have grown enough that they look as thick as ever, and ever since they have been large enough, they have permitted people to come and pick up those that have fallen off, and at this time they are real nice. We picked up all we could carry to the car in a grass sack, that are just as nice as any for canning, preserving and jellies.

As for the grape arbor, they have one of the nicest in the county, and most every variety is represented in the collection. It covers a place probably 50x75 feet, and the shade is very dense under them, and a nice hammock invites the tired and sleepy to pay old Morpheus a visit. The ranch house is surrounded by stately cottonwood trees and under them is a fine coat of burmuda, making the place one of the most, if not the most attractive places in the county. This was our first visit down there in three years and we enjoyed the trip very much.

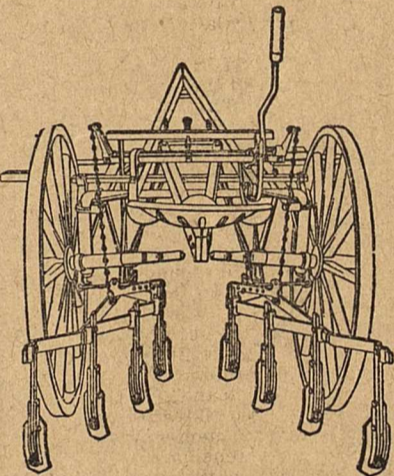


NEW STYLE OF CULTIVATOR

Purpose of Inventor to Perfect Machine With Series of Hoes That Can Be Adjusted.

In describing a cultivator recently invented by Clifford A. Cowin of Riverhead, L. I., the Scientific American says:

The cultivator shown in rear perspective view in elevation, is of the adjustable type. The purpose of the inventor is to provide one with a series of hoes connected together so as to be adjusted simultaneously with means for locking them in an elevated position out of contact with the ground, and with means for locking them in a plurality of adjusted positions intermediate their uppermost and lowermost positions. A plurality of hoes connected together is provided with means for taking up the shock incident to the change of position of the hoes. A cultivator with a plurality of

wheels, forming a carriage to support the same, the wheels being adjustable relative to the frame so as to guide the cultivator.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, AMENDING SECTION 24, ARTICLE 3, OF THE CONSTITUTION, INCREASING COMPENSATION OF THE LEGISLATURE AND EXTENDING LENGTH OF REGULAR SESSION.

Senate Joint Resolution (S. J. R. 26.)

Joint Resolution Proposing an amendment to Section No. 24, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to compensation for members of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Legislature of the State of Texas.

Section 1. That at the next general election of the State of Texas for the election of state officers, or at a previous general election, in case a general election for the state shall sooner be ordered by the Governor for other purposes, there shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas, for their adoption or rejection, the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, Article 17, of said Constitution, relating to proposed amendments thereto, it being intended to amend Section 24, Article 3, of said Constitution, relating to the pay of members of the legislature, and extension of term of regular sessions, so that the said section shall read as follows:

Section 24. The members of the legislature shall each receive from the public treasury as compensation for their services twelve hundred (\$1200.00) dollars for the year in which each regular session of the legislature is held, payable in equal installments on the twentieth days of January, April, July and October of the year in which the regular session is held, and five dollars per day for each day of every special session held in the year next succeeding that in which any regular session is held. In addition to said compensation, the members of each house shall be entitled to mileage going to and returning, from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed five cents per mile, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the state shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established, and by said table the mileage of each member shall be paid. Each regular session shall continue until the business of such session is disposed of.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to be voted upon by the qualified electors for members of the legislature, at the first general election to be held in this state. Those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution, increasing compensation of the legislature, and extending the length of the regular session of the legislature." Those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against amendment to Section 24, of Article 3, of the Constitution, increasing compensation of the members of the legislature, and extending the term of regular sessions of the legislature."

Sec. 3. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of such proclamation, publication and election.

(Note.—S. J. R. No. 26 passed the senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 26, nays 0, and senate concurred in house amendments by two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 1; and was passed by the house of representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 101, nays 22.)

TRUMBULL TALKS DEVELOPMENT.

Pending Litigation Against the Katy Prevents Improvements and Extensions.

Mr. Frank Trumbull, the executive head of the M. K. & T. Railway in a recent communication discussed the litigation instigated by the Attorney General against that line. Mr.

Trumbull has brought many millions of dollars to Texas and it is so seldom that we have an opportunity of hearing men who are capable of influencing investments, that his utterances are here reproduced in part.

"I have been particularly interested in the development of Texas, as it was formerly my home, and I have been for a number of years connected with properties which are important factors in the industrial life of the state. More than that, I have been instrumental in getting a good many millions of dollars invested in Texas.

"We want to improve our Texas lines. We want to give better service. On the other hand we want to look everybody in the face, including our creditors and shareholders, as well as our Texas friends. We cannot ignore our responsibility to investors. No conscientious man can do that.

"I regret that what seems to me an unwarranted and superfluous impairment of our credit has made some of the things I had hoped to do even less possible than they were before. If the state of Texas had endeavored to find a way to prevent our making extensions, it could have hardly chosen a more effective method than to bring suit for penalties aggregating \$105,000,000. We will do the best we can, all things considered, but ought we to ask our friends to put more money into Texas except for maintenance of existing lines?

"If the suit brought by the state of Texas is successful, I and all my friends here and abroad will lose every dollar we put into that state. What would you do in my place? This is a broad, far-reaching question, but it is a broad and far-reaching condition and not a theory that confronts us. And I am sure you will agree with me that it is a very sobering question to ask ones self."

There are 3,000 steam and 802 gas engines in Texas factories. We also have 3,454 electric, 1 water motor and 31 water wheels supplying power.

Less than 2 per cent of the factory wage earners of Texas are under 16 years of age.

To operate Texas factories one year requires a million tons of coal, two hundred thousand cords of wood, three and one-half million barrels of oil and a hundred million cubic feet of gas.

Only 3,882 women work in the Texas factories.

The prevailing hours of labor in Texas factories are 54 per week.

The average mortgage debt of a Texas farm is \$1,548; the average equity \$4,619.

Texas has more large farms than any state in the Union.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, AMENDING ARTICLES XI, SECTION 7A, OF THE CONSTITUTION—PROVIDING FOR AUTHORIZING COUNTIES BORDERING ON THE GULF OF MEXICO TO BUILD SEA WALL.

(S. J. R. 22.)
Senate Joint Resolution
To Amend Section 7, of Article XI.

of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls, by adding Section 7a, so as to authorize such counties to build sea-walls and designate sea-wall reclamation districts for the protection of life and property from storm overflow, and to build or condemn land for sea-wall and reclamation districts, the county to have State's title to the roads and bay shore line to low tide within the district, and the right to issue district bonds for acquiring and developing the district and building the sea-walls, and when district is developed as townsite to sell such portions of land as not reserved for public use by the county.

BE IT RESOLVED By the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas be proposed to the voters of the State of Texas for their adoption in accordance with law, and that the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to add Section 7a, of Article XI, and that Section 7a, of Article XI shall read, as follows, to-wit:

Section 7a. Where protection against the waters of the Gulf of Mexico is needed for protection of life, health, property or the sea-wall, any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico may acquire title to the land for said sea-wall or sea-wall reclamation district as designated by the County Commissioners' Court by purchase or condemnation of all the land desired for sea-wall and land for the sea-wall reclamation district from the sea-wall to bay shore tide line boundary of the property abutting on the bay, and the State hereby cedes to the county, for such district for reclamation and general uses of the district, the title to bay shore lands in the district between the property tide line boundary and the low tide line of the bay shore, and any land in the reclamation district that may have been retained by the Republic of Texas of (or) the State for roads when the lands adjacent were platted and sold, and the county is given the right to dredge in the bay or to the gulf for fill for the district, and right to sell the land reclaimed and laid off as townsite or otherwise, and where condemnation is used to acquire the land the proceedings to be as under the Statutes for condemnation for railroads, provided that the condemnation shall vest title in fee in the county, and county may issue bonds or other evidence of district indebtedness for acquiring the property, building the sea-wall, reclamation developments and all incident thereto as expense of sea-wall and reclamation district, with lien on land and such terms and conditions as county, through its commissioners' court may deem best, and the County Commissioners' Court shall appoint two persons who are owners of land within the district, and who desire to sell for reclamation and buy back from the county when reclaimed, who with the County Judge as Chairman, shall constitute a sea-wall reclamation district commission, whose compensation shall be fixed by the court, and this commission has power to make all rules and regulations for acquiring the land of district sea-wall building, reclaiming and plating land of district, issuing bonds or other evidence of indebtedness for same, sub-

ject, however, to all such rules, regulations and acts of the commission, being authorized and approved and ratified by County Commissioners' Court. The district must bear all expenses of sea-wall and purchase of the land and expense of filling (filling) same and other expenses, and the same shall not in any way involve the credit of the county or be a basis for a tax by the county on general lands of the county unless authorized by a vote of two-thirds of the property taxpayers of the county voting at a special election therefor. It is further provided that any owner of land in a proposed district may subscribe and pay for the district commission, when organized, as the pro rata of his land of the expense of the wall, reclamation, platting as town lots, on a basis as such area of land is to be to the whole land of the reclamation district and sea-wall, and at any time before the completion of the district may surrender the bonds and receive from the county a bond for title for his land in town lots, less streets and alleys deducted therefrom, for which on surrender deed may be demanded from the county after the district is walled, filled and platted into streets, alleys and lots, and bonds so bought shall so provide. It is further provided that no district shall be formally designated by the County Commissioners' Court until owners of at least one-half of the proposed area of district petition therefor, and subscribe out for bonds for repurchase from the county as herein provided. This amendment may be acted on without delay of legislation in aid thereof or legislative action may be had in furtherance thereof if desired by the county, acting through its Commissioners' Court.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

That the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas for their ratification and adoption at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and at such election those favoring the ratification and adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls," and those opposing the adoption and ratification of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "Against the amendment to Article XI, Section 7a, of the Constitution, providing for authorizing counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to build sea-walls." Proclamation of such election shall be made by the Governor, as required by the Constitution and the law, and there is appropriated out of any funds not otherwise appropriated the sum of five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the expense of advertising and holding such election.

(Note.—S. J. R. 22 passed the senate by a two-thirds vote, yeas 24, nays 1, and senate concurred in house amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 27, nays 0; and was passed by the house of representatives with amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 114, nays 0.)

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION, AMENDING SECTION 1, ARTICLE 3, OF THE CONSTITUTION, PROVIDING FOR THE INITIATIVE AND REFERENDUM.

Senate Joint Resoution (S. J. R. No. 12.) To Amend Section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give to the people, or reserve to them, the power to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at th polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any Act of the legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED By the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read:

Section 1. The legislative power of this state shall be vested in a senate and House of Representatives, which, together, shall be styled "The Legislature of the State of Texas," but the people reserve to themselves power, as herein provided, to propose laws and to enact or reject the same at the polls, and to approve or reject at the polls any law, or any part of any laws enacted by the legislature. The legislature shall provide by law for submitting to the vote of the people, upon the petition of ty per cent of the qualified voters of the state the enactment of laws and

the approval or rejection of any law enacted by the legislature.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That the above and foregoing is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this state, and shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Texas for members of the legislature, for their adoption or rejection as a part of the Constitution of this state, and shall be voted on by such electors at the regular election for the election of officers to be held throughout the state on the second Tuesday in November, A. D. 1914, and those voting for the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballot the words: "For the amendment to Section 1, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and referendum," and those voting against the adoption of said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to Section 1, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the initiative and referendum." And the foregoing proposed amendment shall be duly published once a week for four consecutive weeks, commencing at least three months before the election at which it is to be voted upon, in one weekly newspaper in each county in the state, in which such newspaper may be published. The Governor shall make proclamation of such election upon said proposed amendment by publication as aforesaid, and as required by the Constitution and laws, and the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) is now appropriated out of any fund in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of making such proclamation and publication and hold-said election.

(Note.—S. J. R. 12 passed the senate by atwo-thirds vote, yeas 21, nays 5, and was passed by a two-thirds vote yeas 21, nays 7, and senate concurred in house amendments by a two-thirds vote, yeas 23, nays 0; and was passed by the house or representatives with amendments by the following vote: yeas 84, nay 36.)

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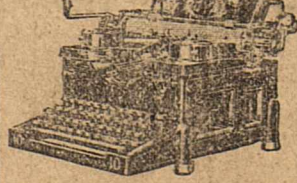
