Provided, however, that under leislative enactment any defined die trict now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Tayas, which may be formed for the pur pose of reclaiming and improving over-flows and swamp lands in this improving State, and maintaining the improvements thereof, may, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereow who are qualified electors of such district or territory, in addition to all other debts, issue bonds or otherwise lead its credit in any amount not to lend its credit in any amount not to exceed fifty per cent of the assessed valuation of the real property in such

district or territory.

Provided, further, that where a county, district or other political subdivision has issued bonds for im-

stitution, authorizing the issuance of bonds for levee, drainage, road and other improvements, and for taxes therefor."
