The Commissioners' Court of each county in this State shall the power, and is hereby authorized, when a majority of the qualified voters of such county shall vote to create such fund, to create a fund to be known as a "Students' Loan Fund," for the purpose of enabling students of the public free schools of said county to borrow money to be used in their education for the purpose of graduating from the county public schools and after graduation to continue their education in any higher State institution of learning, such fund to be created and admin-istered by the Commissioners' Court of each county as may be provided by

And the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected within such county for the purpose of raising said students' loan fund, said tax not to exceed in any one year twenty cents (20c) on the one hundred dollars. have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State. to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to, any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corpora tion, association or company, provided, however, that under legisla tive provision any county, any polical subdivision of a county, or an defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include towns, vil-lages, or municipal corporations, upon vote of two-thirds majority of resident property tax payers voting theron who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts may issue bonds or other wise lend its credit in any amount not be exceed one fourth of the assessed to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory; except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this constitution; and levy and col lect such taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes, to

The improvement of rivers creeks and streams to prevent over-flows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation to in aid of such purposes. irrigation therefrom, or

(b) The construction and mainte-nance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purpose of irrigation, drain navigation, or in aid thereof. drainage

(c) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

Provided, however, that under islative enactment any defined dis-trict now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of as, which may be formed for the purpose of reclaiming and improving over-flows and swamp lands in this State, and maintaining the improvements thereof, may, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory, in addition to all other debts, issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed fifty per cent of the assessed valuation of the real property in such district or territory.

Provided, further, that where a county, district or other political subdivision has issued bonds for improvements for the purposes named in this Section, the Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of taxes for the maintenance of such improvements not to exceed fifty improvements, not cents on the hundred dollars valua-
