#### Our Holiday Trip.

Leaving Brownfield, Tuesday, December 28th, and returning Wednesday, January 5th, we took in the cities and towns of Lubbock, Slaton, Wilson and Tahoka.

Lubbock, in our opinion, is the fastest growing town on the Plains, and like all other Plains towns, one is unable to get a house there, unless they build one. There are many beautiful and modern residences going up all over the city, and there are a number of nice and commodious brick business houses under construction or planned.

There is also another large coal and grain business going up just south of the square, that will be a great addition to the business interests of the town when completed.

While on the subject of coal and grain business, we had the pleasure of being conducted through the splendid elevator department of the Lubbock Grain and Coal Company, which is the latest and most up-to-date made. They were then loading a car of threshed maize. Seeing all this huge machinery moving along, and hearing no engine we asked "whence the power," and was informed they used electricity, supplied from a big concern at Plainview. The Lubbock Merc., has fitted up their basement into a kind of department and novelty store, and one is able to get almost anything they want there. Lubbock is fast developing into a real city.

#### SLATON.

We spent about two hours in this beautiful and coming little city between trains on Saturday Jan. 1st, and during that time

met Editor Lomis of the Slatonite, who has one of the nicest and best equipped little newspaper offices we ever saw, and he is giving Slaton a good paper. There is no grouch or egotism about Lomis and he keeps everlastingly at the boosting job. And by the way, he has a right to. They have railroad machine shops, roundhouse, Harvey House, a large and beautiful school building, large and well stocked stores and handsome residences. Slaton is a real live one.

#### WILSON.

We spent Saturday night and Sunday in this, the most beautiful little town we ever saw, with our old friends, Robert Forrester and R. R. Hughes and families. Wilson has a good hotel, run by the latter gentleman, a first class Mercantile establishment owned by a stock company, a barber shop, cotton gin, a good lumber yard owned and conducted by Messrs. Firch and Forrester, a splendid little church, post office, a scarcely a residence costing less than \$1000.00. This is the reason the town is pretty, as all the houses are all practically new and well painted and kept. The town is upon a high prairie, and the view is pleasant. We attended a New Years party at Mr. Lumsden's, Saturday night and we wish to state that are behind no place, socially. Wilson has every promise of becoming a good town.

#### TAHOKA.

We thought we were going to find this town in mourning, on account of a big fire that had visited them a few days before,

wiping out almost a third of the business section. But not so. While there was much regret that \$35000.00 worth of stock and a loss of nearly \$20,000.00 had gone up in flames, there was a strong current of optimism circulating around that made one forget the smouldering ruins, and from these ashes will rise a bigger and better Tahoka.

Almost without exception, the unfortunate business men will rebuild with brick and go back in business as soon as possible. In fact, some of them were in business again in a few hours and others open as soon as they got adjustment from the insurance companies.

There are several new bricks now under construction, and others to start immediately, and there is no excuse for the idle in Tahoka.

All the gins, lumber yards and business establishments are busy, and the town is growing and prospering as never before.

#### Brownfield is Moving On.

Nearly every other plains town is building more or less, and old Brownfield will not be behind any of the inland burghs; in fact, she gives every promise to outstrip some of them, and hold her own with the best of them. The reason for this is apparent, for there is no city or town anywhere that we are aware of, that has a better, or a more varied farming country to back her.

Among the most prominent things for the immediate future, is another big mercantile establishment, to be built just east of the Herald office, 48x80 feet, and contain a large and assorted stock of dry goods and groceries. It is to be occupied by A. M. Smith of Odell, Texas, who is already conducting a big establishment at that place, and comes to us well recommended. This will give Brownfield two as good dry goods and grocery stores as there is on the south plains. As stated last week, Mr. Smith has purchased the old Harris homestead, and is getting ready to come here as soon as possible, and construction work will begin right away on the store building.

There are talk of several more stores, and a big hotel, but that is a little previous. Anyway, Brownfield has almost a third more people than she had last summer, and others are arriving every day, to help build up the town, or Terry county.

There is talk of several nice cottages being constructed here this spring, and some will start up in the near future, and we should not be surprised to see a

number of rent houses go up this year.

Another thing that will be a great help to the whole country, is an up to now gin. A couple of gentlemen of Rotan, Texas, have proposed to come here and put in a brand new four stand, seventy saw gin, to be supplied with steam power, with a huller attached. They have offered to do this for four acres of land and a well. Their proposition has been accepted, and the committee has so notified them.

The country is filling up with progressive farmers, and the town is trying to keep pace with them. Let the good work go on.

## 1915 Weather

The following is a summary of the rainfall and temperature of the local U. S. W. B. for the past year: The total rainfall was 24.82 inches. The greatest was 5.55 inches in April while the least was .05 inch in Nov., a harvesting month.

The lowest temperature was on Jan. 24, when the thermometer registered one degree below zero, and the highest was June 19, (Negro Day) when it registered 102 degrees.

We find that 19.17 inches of this rain fell in the crop months, beginning with April and ending with September; only a little the rise of 5.50 inches falling in the winter and harvesting months. Who could wish a better distribution? Also remember that no rain runs off in creeks or rivers; it all soaks in the ground.
