The Country Weekly

The latest newspaper statistics show there are 148 publications less in the United States today than there were last year at this time. These statistics also claim that the greatest mortality among publications has been in the field of weeklies.

Some may construe this as an ill omen and assert that the day of the country weekly has passed. Of course such a statement is absurd on the face of it, as the number of healthy and wealthy country weeklies now flourishing will testify without further argument.

What the figures do show, however, is that the newspaper which is conducted without good business methods cannot survive. Methods and adherence to strict business principles are foundation stones upon which to build success in every business nowadays, and this applies to the newspaper business more than any other.

Furthermore, the decrease in the quantity of weeklies published means that "any old thing" won't do. Quality is what is desired, not quantity. And if there are fewer weeklies of the kind that are slipshod, so much the better for those conducted in the right way.

The country weekly will never die. It has a well appointed place in the affairs of the American people. On the contrary, the country weekly, particularly the all home printed country weekly is growing greater in the estimation of newspaper readers from day to day. It is the chaff that is falling by the wayside.—The American Press.
