On A Cash Basis

As announced some time ago the Herald is getting on a cash basis, and is going to stay that way. We revised our mailing list this week, and cut off out of county subscribers that were behind, but left a few home folks on this country that were from one issue to seven months behind and will notify them and give them just two weeks to ante, and if they remain silent, that is a sign that they do not want the paper longer, and their names will forewith be erased from our list. This is not because we are sore at any body, but the high cost of all printing materials forces us to this, if we keep the Herald at \$1.00 per year.

Besides, it is nothing but business, for any one can just as easily keep their home paper paid in advance, as any other, then there are no misunderstandings to arise by long time credit.

While we have some subscribers that have gotten three years behind, in time past, and then paid up without a whimper, on the other hand we have lost hundreds of dollars from others that would let their papers lapse, a year or more and never pay up.

If we lose a hundred or two hundred dollars a year on subscribers like this, then we are bound to go in hole on subscription, as high as material is.

We will treat all alike from now on, and if you want the Herald to continue to your address, watch the little strip of yellow paper on your copy, and keep it paid in advance. We want you to have the Herald, as bad or worse than you your self, but when your time expires and you have not renewed, we shall take it that you do not want the paper, and we do not want to send it if you do not want it.

After this, you will not receive

a statement of your subscription account from us, for aim to forget the color of a subscription dun.

Austin Citizens Plan Paper Mill

A well organized movement is under way in Austin looking to the establishment of a paper mill, in that city. Several business men of the city, including A. C. Goeth, are behind the movement and they feel optimistic as to the result. Mr. Goeth said Saturday that he had written to a number of paper manufacturers in the east in an effort to interest them in the proposed enterprise.

It is planned to utilize the power to be furnished by the Austin dam and the material to be used will be cottonwood, which grows in large quantities along the Colorado river above Austin.

"The establishment of a paper mill in Austin along the lines we plan will in a great measure solve the paper shortage problem in this section of the country," said Mr. Goeth.

Women

Modern white women are apt to be unhappy, according to Miss Kathryn Fite an Indian maiden from Tahlequa, Okla. The main reason for their unhappiness, she said is that they don't know how to live. Too much time is spent by the average white woman today in trying to undo her neighbor socially and too little on her own home the welfare of her husband and children and her own health, she believes.

In order for women to be happy and make their husbands it is essential that they remain young and pretty as long as possible, Miss Fite pointed out. To do this they do not have to resort to the use of cosmetics or indulge in every whimsical inclination they may think of. If American women would live more as Indians do they would be healthier and happier she declares; their youth and beauty would be preserved naturally.

"There is many an American husband who would heave a sigh of relief and delight on being told that his wife had turned to a squaw", she continued. "The Indian woman never cause to worry about her husband's love. Divorces never occur among us, simply because when an Indian selects his wife he always receives full value a woman who wears well, who doesn't require mending or patching even after 50 years of married life". Here are a few rules for living which she offers to her white sisters: Don't talk so much. Burst forth into a warwhoop once in a while. Discard your chair and sit on the floor. Carry a load on your back if you haven't a papoose. Take your afternoon nap on the floor. The Indian woman is noted for her beautiful back, which is strong and perfect because she uses it. Don't wear a corset. Wear moccasins instead of shoes. Keep the pipe of peace lighted and pray often.

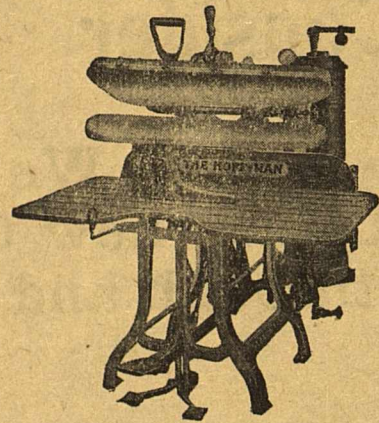

ADJUST THE HARNESS RIGHT

Collar Boils Often Caused by Improper Fastening of the Trace Chain on the Hame.

Collar boils are often caused by improper adjustment of the fastenings of the trace chain on the hame. Every hame should have several places for adjustment and the regulation should be made to conform to the slope of the shoulders of the individual horse. Horses with straight shoulders should have traces about midway of the hame, while horses with sloping shoulders

should have the adjustment about two-fifths of the way up from the bottom.

Adjustment of the backband will in a measure correct any weakness in the formation of the shoulder. The backband can be made not only to carry a part of the weight, thereby adjusting the dept of the plow, but it can be made to adjust the draft to fit the horse's shoulder. The adjustment can be made either by shortening the backband or moving it farther back on the horse. The length of the trace should be such as to prevent the horse's legs knocking against the singletree and still have no surplus length.

HORSES KNOWN AS 'ROARERS'

Uncomplimentary Terms Used to Indicate Unsoundness in Animals—Trouble May Be Cured.

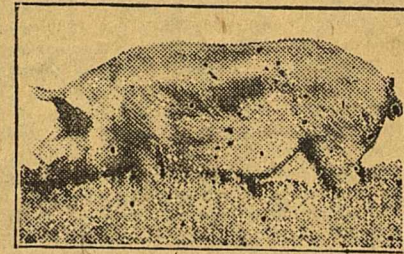

Whistlers, wheezers, blowers or roarers. These uncomplimentary

terms were not applied in anger, but merely used to indicate the character of the unsoundness in horses, known as roaring. Their use may be avoided by saying that the horse is afflicted with laryngeal hemiplegia. Horses affected with this disease appear normal while at rest, but when severely exercised the breathing efforts become much greater and the characteristic noises are heard. Ninety per cent of the cases are caused by partial paralysis of the muscles of the left side of the neck. It may be cured in a great majority of cases by an operation on the larynx. The operation is not dangerous if performed by a skillful veterinarian. Most cases are ready to be put back to work in course of eight weeks.

INHERIT FERTILITY IN SWINE

Experiments of Kansas Experts Watched With Closest Interest—Tamworth Most Fecund Breed.

Can litters of 8 to 12 pigs per sow be increased by any system of bonding? Possibly so, is the reply indicated by the work of Wentworth and Ambel, Kansas Agricultural college. Their experiments in breeding will be watched with the closest interest.

Fecundity appears to be inheritable, at least to a slight degree. This fact is borne out by herdbook records, allowing for their errors. It is questionable whether the size of the litter really represents the hereditary factors transmitted. The wild hog usually averages four pigs per litter, very fertile sows of improved breeds often average eight pigs, but the Tamworth, with an average of 12 pigs per sow, is the most fecund breed.

LANDS SUITABLE FOR SHEEP

Animals Do Best Where Grasses Are Produced Naturally or Introduced by Cultivation.

Sheep do best on high, dry land—that is, on hard-soiled land, where the grasses adapted to sheep are produced naturally, or are easily introduced by cultivation. The short grasses, or such as usually are termed pasture grasses, are essential to the well-being of the sheep. Cattle and horses will thrive and do well on hay grasses, on wet land grasses, tall grasses, but with the sheep it is different; they depend on the short-growth, dry-soil-pasture grasses. It is important that they be not confined to wet, soft, boggy pastures. The sheep inclines to foot scald, sore feet and finally foot rot where the hoof is constantly under the influence of moisture in the soil.

DRY FOOD QUITE INJURIOUS

Cows and Sheep Grow Feverish and Stomachs Show Effects of Unnatural Food—Give Green Roots.

Cows and sheep fed on dry food in summer grow feverish and their stomachs show the effects of the unnatural food. Green roots, when mixed with the grain diet, will prevent this. If it is not desired to feed the roots whole they can be massed by passing them through a pulper.

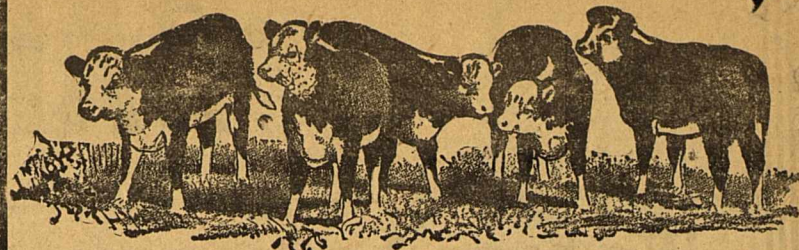
