Yesterday morning while returning from Tahoka with a big load of lumber, the above citizen of southwest Yoakum county, met almost instant death, when his teams ran away, throwing him off the wagon, a wheel running over his head, crushing it and breaking his neck.

The deceased was 78 years old and his teams were young and fat and just before reaching the turn in the Brownfield-Tahoka road just east of Nobles place, a car ran up behind, but as the driver saw he was scaring the old man's team he stopped 75 yards behind.

There was a boy with him who was walking and tried to catch the team, as Mr. Robinson was very careful with the team, and saw the deceased fall but thought he was only stunned, thinking the wheels missed him, and went on after the team.

Deceased was brought to Brownfield and taken charge of by the Merc. undertaking department, awaiting the arrival of relatives in Yoakum county.

South Plains Road Plans Extension

Under the construction plans which have already been approved, the South Plains and Santa Fe Railway—which has been known as the baby line of the West—will become one of the powers of the Plains country. The line is now being extended south a distance of seventy miles to Seminole in Gaines County and it is probable that it will be then built from there to Lovington N. M. On the north end the road is to be extended to Hollis, Okla., across the Fort Worth and Denver at Childress. I. M. Hunt is secretary and treasurer of the South Plains and Santa Fe road, having succeeded R. M. Bassett when the line was purchased from the C. B. Livestock Company by the Santa Fe.—Ralls Banner.

We have often wondered why the press of the county persists in saying that the above road goes to Seminole, but we have kept our head for fear some one would say that we were knocking on Seminole. In the first place, seventy two miles, what the charter calls for, just puts the Santa Fe two miles over the Gaines County from line Lubbock or about three miles from the corner of Terry and Yoakum counties, and should the road be extended on, it would in a stright line, miss Seminole ten miles to the west. In fact the road has never been surveyed to Seminole only to Blythe, in the extreme north central portion of Gaines county. However for the benefit of Seminole, we wish to state that the Midland and Northwestern is now constructing a railroad from Midland, Texas to Seminole.

You are hereby commanded to summons, by making publication of this Citation and Notice once a week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return date hereof in some newspaper published in Terry County, Texas, H. H. Holden, a non-resident of the State of Texas, to whom the hereinafter property belongs, to be and appear before a setting of the undersigned special Commissioners, duly and legally appointed and qualified to be held in the Court Room, in the Court house, in the town of Brownfield, the County Seat of Terry county on the 22nd day of December, 1916 at 2 o'clock p. m., then and there to answer the petition for condemnation of the South Plains & Santa Fe Railway Company filed with the County Judge of Terry County, Texas, on the 20th day of November, A. D. 1916, in cause No. 57, wherein the South Plains & Santa Fe Railway Company is plaintiff and H. H. Holden is defendant.

The nature of the Plaintiff's suit is as follows, to-wit: Petitioner, South Plains & Santa Fe Railway Company, a body politic duly incorporated under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Texas, having its principal office in the City of Lubbock, County of Lubbock, State of Texas, complaining that H. H. Holden, a resident of Los Angeles, California, respectfully represents that by the terms of its charter it is authorized and empowered to locate, own, operate and maintain a railroad through certain cities, towns and counties in the State of Texas, including Brownfield and the County of Terry; and for that purpose has authority among other things by the general laws of the State, to receive, take, hold or obtain any lands necessary for the purpose of locating, constructing and maintaining its railway. That for railroads and other lawful purposes, as hereinafter set forth, it is necessary for petitioner to have the possession and use of the following described tract of land situated in Terry County, State of Texas, to-wit:

All that part of Lots Four (4) and Five (5) in Block One (1) in First Addition to Brownfield in the town of Brownfield, as designated on the map or plat of said addition of records in the Deed Records of Terry County described as follows: Beginning at the northeast corner of said Lot Four (4); thence south along the east line of said lots to the south line thereof; thence west along the south line of said Lots Four (4) and Five (5) to the southwest corner of said lot Five (5); thence north along the west line of said Lot Five (5) a distance of One Hundred Fifteen and Ninety-One One-Hundredths [115 91] feet to a point, thence northeasterly along a straight line to a point in the north line of said Lot Five-5- distance Thirty-Nine and Seventy-Three One-Hundredths -39 73- feet from the northeast corner of said Lot Five -5-, thence east along the north lines of said Lots Five -5- and Four -4- to the point or place of beginning. Containing Thirteen Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Two and Six Tenths -13,752 6- square feet, more or less.

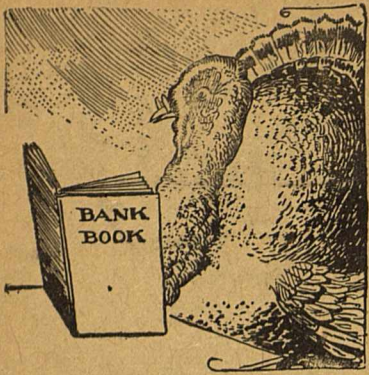

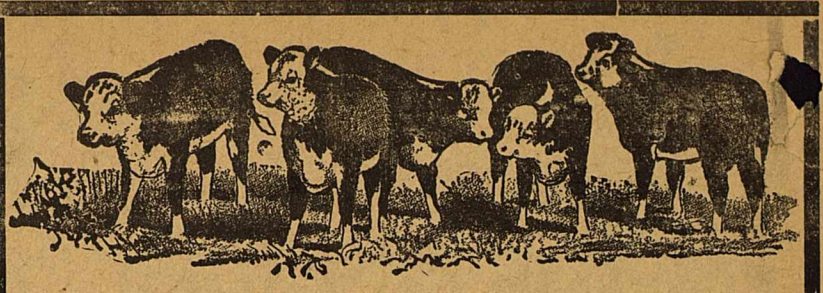

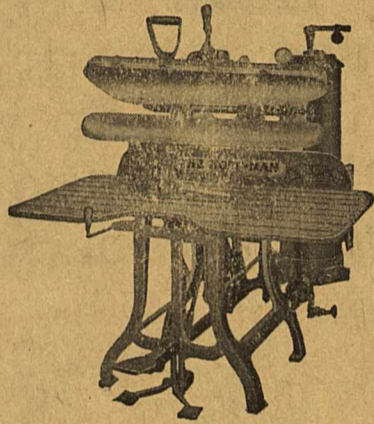
