#### The Progressive West

When the county superintendents bill was before the house of consideration last Monday there was almost a geographical division of the vote on the measure. Most of the East Texas members were against the bill and most of the West Texas members were lined up in favor of it.

The bill embodied one of the fundamentals ideas of progressive education. It was killed by one vote. It is true that some of the most able advocates of the measure were from other sections of the state, but we cannot believe that it was accidental that the bulk of support given it came from districts in West Texas and the Panhandle.

Without suggesting any idea of sectionalism it is with a degree of pride that we view the make up of the present house and see that so little of the cheap demagogery which curses modern methods of legislation emanates from the great West and the Panhandle. The members from that section are behind all constructive legislation which is now pending before the legislature. Every progressive measure calculated to improve conditions in the state and develop its resources has the support of West Texas, and inasmuch as it is the fastest growing and the most rapidly developing section of the state, it is a good sign that is true. The time is not far off distant when West Texas and the Panhandle will play a much larger part in determining the policies of the state than they have in the past and is gratifying to see that indications or that their influence is most likely to be given a greater and better Texas.—Star Telegram.

### Commissioners Court

Commissioners Court was in session three days this week, transacting much business and paying the regular quarterly bills.

The Brownfield State Bank was accepted as the County Depository for the next two years, making a bid of three percent interest on the daily balance.

Discussion of opening up a road up and down the railroad right-of-way was at length finished and it was finally decided to await a petition of the citizens along the rail-road which will likely be presented the second Monday in March, and it is asked and expected that the Lub-

bock county commissioners will do the same thing.

As the county has no official surveyor, Mr. Twitchell was allowed ten dollars for running out the Lamesa road. He is also employed by the citizens of Blocks T and C 36, to run out their lands and establish corners.

While the commissioners were not in session as a board of equalization it was discussed and decided that valuations placed on property last year would stand, and that if more revenue was required at all, rates would be raised, as a raise in value would benefit the state more than the county, and it is a well known fact that the state gets more tax

es from West Texas counties get more than they get back, while East Texas counties get more than they pay in. The only tax that will likely be raised however, is the road tax.

The band does not care to entertain visitors now, as they are not in any shape to entertain, and besides visitors attract attention that should be employed in their music.

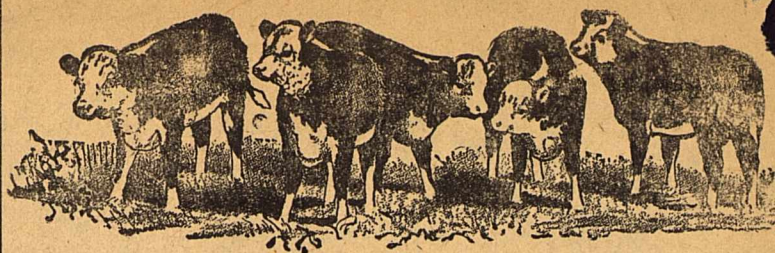
