P. M. M. SHROCK.

Phillip Marmaduke Mitchell Shrock, was born on the 1st day of April, 1832, and died Monday night at 11 o'clock, and was buried Tuesday at 4 p. m. in the Odd Fellow Cemetery. He was the son of John Westly and Celia Shrock, and was born in Madison county, Mississippi, his father being one of the old saddle bag Methodist circuit riders. At an early age he learned to love Christ, and has lived a devout christian life since. His parents moved to Texas in 1837, when Texas was a republic, and settled at Washington now in Washington County, Texas, where his early childhood was spent on the farm. His father died when he was a small boy, but an older brother moved over from Louisiana, and took charge of his affairs, and when the Civil war broke out in 61, the Shrock family was quite wealthy in land and slaves.

The early part of the great civil strife found him in the ranks of the Confederacy, and such a sure shot was he, that he was made chief gunner in Mosley's Battery, which made itself felt more one once. Latter on he was commissioned by the Confederate authorities to take a big wagon train with cotton to Old Mexico to buy supplies, and he returned with wagons laden with precious coffee and other eatable for the soldiers. During Reconstruction, the black years for all the South, the Carpetbagger and negro destroyed and took charge of their splendid plantation, and they moved to Milam county, latter to Ellis, then to Palo Pinto in; 1902, he and family landed eight miles east of where Brownfield now stands and took up land, together with his youngest daughter,

Mrs. J. L. Randal, and her husband.

In young manhood, Mr. Shrock took unto himself, one of the beauties of south Texas, Miss Cynthia M. Jolley, and they lived a long and devoted married life, sharing both trials, sorrows, peace and prosperity together. She preceeded him to the great beyond just about eight years, and now welcomes him home.

The subject of this sketch was said to be one of the brightest Masons in this part of the country, and until he lost his sense of seeing eight years ago, and latter his mind, he was a great help to that order here, and in younger days, instituted many of the early lodges in Texas. He was probably one of the oldest members of that order in Texas, having been a member 63 years.

He leaves four children to mourn his death, being Mrs. Harris, Bunker, Texas; Mrs. R. L. Farrar, Maryneal, Texas; Mrs. Chas. Randal, Seymour Texas, and Mrs J. L. Randal with whom he has made his home for several years.

The funeral services were conducted at the Methodist church at 3 p. m. Tuesday afternoon, by Presiding Elder W. E. Lyon, after which his body was taken in charge by the Masonic order, and was buried with their beautiful rites.

The Herald believes in giving flowers to the living as well as to the dead, and while too much cannot be said of P. M. M. Shrock as a citizen, a neighbor indeed and a follower of his Lord we cannot pass this up without a tribute to the devotion of his daughter, Mrs. Jessie Randal, who night and day, sick or well, administered to the many wants of her old father in his helpless condition, and we only voice the sentiment of the town, when we say: "She is an Angel on earth."

Undoubtedly she was an angel of light to this good old man.

The Herald joins with the entire community in offering condolence to the heart broken relatives of Grandpa Shrock, and and let us all so live that we may be able to meet him in the great beyond.

Congressman Blanton is the latest "infant" congressman that Washington has been introduced to in many years. He has been in congress only a few days but in that brief time he has been more active and participated more aggressively in national affairs than have many men who have been in the same office for years. Blanton disregarded all the rules of precedence and made his first speech before congress was fairly organized, and his address was original and not the product of some salaried writer. He spoke for an hour and received courteous attention. Blanton is new to congressional affairs and congress was new to him, but he will have to be counseled with in the future. In one term he will have been more active than his predecessors in the entire 14 years of his service. Blanton is different from most progressive men who are sent to congress. They are allowed to make their maiden speech and then are quietly but firmly pocketed and flattered out until they are reconciled to become merely an inobtrusive cog in the party machine. Not so with Blanton; he never quits. Trying to push him back from the front by emptying parliamentary rules that constitute the Waterloo of others will only make him work the harder, and his would-be bosses will learn that he is something of a parliamentarian himself. He will be there working and receiving just as much attention when his term is up as he is now. Blantonite.

AS PRICES RISE HIGH COST OF LIVING HITS THE RAILROADS

Service Will Be Crippled Unless Relief Comes Soon.

EXPENSES UP, RATES DOWN

Wasteful and Conflicting Regulations Hamper Railroad Credit, While Advance in Labor and Materials Outstrips Revenue, Chairman Kruttschnitt Tells Congress Committee. Unified Federal Control Will Improve Conditions

Washington, April 2.—The condition in which the railroads find themselves as a result of constant increases in wages, prices of material, taxes and other expenses, while their revenues are restricted by legislation, was strikingly described by Julius Kruttschnitt, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Southern Pacific Company, in his testimony during the past few days before the Joint Congressional Committee on Interstate Commerce, which is making a study of the question of railroad regulation. Mr. Kruttschnitt urged the committee to recommend a plan of regulation which will center responsibility for regulation and its results in the federal government, so that conditions affecting both expenses and revenues may be made subject to a uniform policy instead of the waste-

ful and often conflicting policies involved in the system of combined state and federal regulation.

Why Roads Need More Money.

Mr. Kruttschnitt's testimony also had a bearing on the reasons for the application of the roads to the Interstate Commerce Commission for a general advance in freight rates. He showed that while the price of transportation has declined in recent years, the cost of producing transportation, like the cost of almost everything else, has rapidly advanced. This he illustrated by showing that if freight and passenger rates had increased during the past twenty years in the same proportion as average commodity prices the railroads of the United States would have received \$1,654,000,000 more for transportation in 1915 than they did receive. This saving to the public was effected, in spite of an increase of 93 per cent in the cost of operation of trains, by a reduction in the average passenger rate per mile from 2.04 cents in 1895 to 1.98 cents in 1915, a decrease of 3 per cent, and by a reduction in the average freight rate per ton mile from 8.39 mills in 1895 to 7.3 mills in 1915, or 13 per cent. During the same period the cost of operation per train mile rose from 92 cents to \$1.78, almost doubling. At the same time the average price of 346 commodities enumerated in a bulletin of the Department of Agriculture increased 115 per cent. Transportation is practically the only commodity in general use that has not increased tremendously in price during the past twenty years, freight and passenger charges being lower than they were twenty years ago.

Big Saving to Public.

If rates had risen proportionately to the increase in the cost of other articles of ordinary use, Mr. Kruttschnitt told the committee, the average passenger rate in 1915 would have been 2.95 cents a mile, or 50 per cent higher than it was, and the average freight rate would have been 1.21 cents, or 66 per cent higher than it was. The saving to the public in passenger fares through this difference was \$314,000,000 and in freight rates \$1,340,000,000. Universal railroad bankruptcy under this reduction in rates and increased cost of operation, he said, was avoided only by heavy expenditures to obtain increased efficiency in train movement, making it possible to haul more tons of freight per locomotive. This had reduced the average cost of hauling a ton of freight, but the decline in the average freight rate had reduced the net revenue of the roads from each ton hauled. If the operating costs of the railroads, including the prices of coal, labor and material, continue to advance at the present rate a lot of railroads will be in the hands of receivers by 1918 unless some relief is afforded. Mr. Kruttschnitt told the committee, "Owing to the rise of commodity prices," he said, "the purchasing power of the dollar has fallen 55 per cent and the railroads are in the position of being compelled by law to accept payment for their service to the public in currency worth 45 cents on the dollar."

Public's Chief Interest.

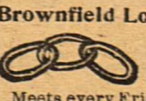
"The public's greatest interest is in adequate transportation facilities and not so much in low rates. As to most commodities freight rates form a very small proportion of their cost. Excluding low grade commodities, the percentage of the freight rate to the cost is so slight as to offer no justification for any substantial increase in prices to the consumer. It may be stated with little fear of contradiction that the consumer seldom, if ever, profits from a lowering of freight rates. "Exorbitant charges are a thing of the past, and under the attempt to cut rates to their lowest possible figure the interest of the whole public in the character and standard of transportation is subordinated to the interest of that part of the public only that profits by lower rates—that is to say, the shippers and their agents and not the general public, the ultimate consumer."

More than 1,000 students at the University of Texas began regular drill Monday morning under the direction of Capt. J. C. Boswell U. S. A., who was detailed by Gen. Pershing to drill the students. The students are in three contingents, the first from 8 to 9 a. m., the second from 9 to 10 a. m., the third from 10 to 11 a. m. The faculty company numbering nearly 100 men drill from 5 to 6 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday of each week. The activity in military drill has made it necessary to omit all field athletics for the rest of the year, both the baseball and track teams having disbanded. The intramural games—tennis, track, swimming and baseball—have been called off, and the athletic field has been turned into a drill ground.
