### Armour on the Business Outlook

J. Ogden Armour one of the very first of the wealthy business leaders of the country to insist in the movement for greater food production and the conservation of food by the elimination of waste. He was one of the original advocates of food control and as an object lesson to the country had his fine lawn plowed up and planted in potatoes. He has not changed his attitude on the question, but continues to preach increased production and food economy. A statement coming from him on the general question of war economy, therefore, is of special value. He is a leading business man who knows business intimately, and in addition has proved himself a patriotic citizen in the present crisis.

In an interview given out at Chicago, Mr. Armour points out that there is no call for a general retrenchment in buying by the public, and indeed, that such slackening would be productive of dire results. The interview is so packed with wisdom and good sense that we print it here with practically in full.

Mr. Armour said:

"A continuation of the great prosperity that has ruled in this country for two years is assured. There is an abnormal demand for every thing the workers of this nation can grow or manufacture. There is work at high wages for every man and woman who wants work; the earning power of the people is restricted only by physical limitations; the buying power of the public is greater than ever before. These are certain guarantees of continued prosperity and of an ever-widening

scope of our business and industrial life.

Now about the billions of dollars we are lending to our allies. He was asked. Wouldn't it be better to keep the money at home? I am glad you mentioned that. I am glad you mentioned that. As a matter of fact it is a misnomer to call it a loan to our allies. We are primarily extending them credit. Instead of sending billions of dollars out of the country the transaction means that billions of dollars will actually be freed for circulation in this country.

Practically all of the billions we lend our allies will be spent in this country for the products of our soil and our factories and for payment of our workers. We are the storehouse and the factory of the world now and the more money the world can get hold of the more will be spent here, and the more that comes here the more work and the business will result. And in this connection remember that the government of the United States is now a buyer for war purposes and the dollars of Uncle Sam have already begun to pour forth to stores, factories to pay for the expense of mobilizing, drilling, equipping and feeding the army and navy.

Under the civilian boards gathered together by the President to direct the great work of preparation, this nation is going ahead, fortified against the delay and mistakes through the intelligent application of the lessons learned in England and France. This applies to industry as well as war. There is abundant evidence that we are profiting from the experience of Europe and that our President and his advisers are going to prevent any industrial hitch such as preceded the prosperous business

conditions now prevailing in the British Isles and France.

I consider the present more auspicious from the standpoint of national prosperity, in my memory. There is not one good reason why the business of this country should not proceed in its normal course and on ever increasing lines. There is not one reason why people should fear for the future or should permit themselves to be swayed from the certainty that they are on a sound financial basis.

The per capita wealth of America to day is greater than ever before greater than that of the people of any nation of any time in the past, or in the present. Our national wealth is past the wildest dreams of a few years back. Labor is satisfactorily employed and at record wages. Every day that the war lasts will find a greater demand for labor and the brains of the wage and salary earners of the United States. Certainty of work and certainty of wages are the prime factors of prosperity. They make prosperity certain.

Whether the war ends tomorrow whether it lasts indefinitely this much is certain; the United States having possession of approximately 40 percent of the world's supply of gold, the greatest natural resources and geographical isolation, is certain to suffer less than any other nation in the war or in the whole world.

The future of our nation is secure; our business prosperity is founded on safe ground; our labor situation is remarkably good and I cannot conceive of a sane or justifiable reason why the people of the United States should become alarmed over any phase of the business or industrial situation.

The nation has been advised to economize in food; economy means the intelligent use without waste; it does not call for self-denial. Economy was recommended to stop the waste of \$700,000,000 worth of food which goes to the garbage pool each year. The wave of patriotism sweeping over the country should not seize upon parsimonious economy as a means of expression. There is no need for people to cease purchasing; there is need only for the elimination of extravagances and waste. There is no reason whatever for curtailment of the use of things ordinarily needed by people; there is a need that everything be put to use.

As patriots it is our duty to stop the wastage of food; as patriots it is equally as important that we do not stop the ordinary purchasing on which the business and the industry of the country are founded. Hysterical economy is as much a menace to the nation as is prodigal waste. The pursuance of our normal business along usual lines is of paramount importance at this time in order that our nation may maintain its self on sound economical and industrial basis from which to prosecute the military phase of the struggle for the freedom of mankind.

Faith is the greatest need of the people to day, faith in providence to lend might to our right faith in Nature to respond bountifully to the wonderful efforts of our agriculturists to increase the food supply, to provide a surplus for our allies, and faith in government which has taken hold of the problems before is in a way that demonstrates it is deserving of our faith.

## Santa Fe Making extensive Improvement.

"Large sums of money will be spent by the Santa Fe, beginning this summer, on construction of new branch lines in the Southwest.

The Osage county and Santa Fe Railroad will be 65 miles long, from Owen to Raisin Oklahoma, via Pawhuska, through rich oil fields. It will shorten distance from Oklahoma City to Kansas City and Chicago. Steel bridges have been ordered. This line will be expensive to build because of the broken country traversed, but it taps rich territory.

The Barton county & Santa Fe is a 35 mile branch to reach the heart of the wheat belt in central Kansas. It will connect Holyreed and Galicia. Running over a level prairie its cost will be low as railroads figure constructions about \$20,000 a mile or \$700,000 to which must be added cost of equipment needed.

A third new line is being surveyed from Statania Kansas 75 miles west of the state line. Right of way is being secured.

The Minkler Southern, nearing completion in California, from Lindsay to Porterville, traverses the center of a rich orange district. The track cuts through groves valued at \$6,000 an acre to afford outlet for car load shipments direct to the new Santa Fe fruit terminals at 22nd. St. and Archer Ave., Chicago.

Work else is being pushed rapidly on the new Santa Fe branches from Shattuck to Spearman, and from Lubbock to Seagraves, in northwest Texas. The building of new mileage on proposed Santa Fe extension from Kansas City to St. Louis is the next item that will be taken care of.

Nearly 1200 miles of heavy new steel rails have been ordered by the Santa Fe for use during 1917 and 1918. Other important improvements are being made in the thirteen states served by this Company."

Four Pecks of Oats and Four Pounds of Rape to Acre Will Furnish Ample Supply of Grass.

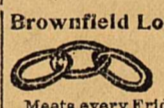

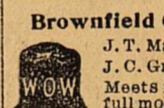

## FAIRM STOCK

### SOWING RAPE IN CORNFIELD

Dwarf Essex Rape Broadcasted After Final Cultivation Best Adapted for Sheep Pasture.

As a feeding proposition there is none that gives better profits, considering the amount of capital invested, than fattening sheep in the cornfield where rape has been sowed at the last cultivation of the corn. The sheep may be bought early, and pastured or fed earlier sowing crops until the rape is fit for them to be turned into the cornfield. The Dwarf Essex rape is the variety best adapted for sheep pasture. About five or six pounds of seed will afford an excellent stand, if sowed broadcast after the final cultivation of the corn crop, providing that the conditions are favorable for an early germination of the seed.

Practically no damage will result to the corn crop; the sheep will consume a large percentage of the lower leaves and lodged stalks. Old breeding ewes that have passed their ma-

ternity usefulness, can always be bought at prices which make them profitable to turn into a rape and cornfield. Yearling wethers may be fattened in the same way. No grain foods will be required. Rape alone will produce enough increase to insure a good profit. By growing rape with the corn crop, and pasturing it with sheep, an intelligent flock owner may greatly increase his income from his corn crops.

### RING WORM IS EASILY CURED

University Expert Favors Iodine and Acetic Acid Treatment for Removal of Trouble.

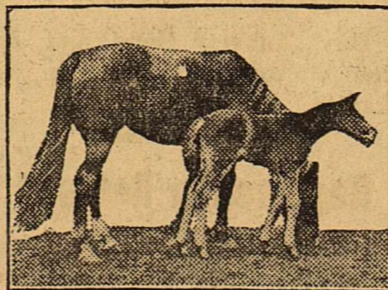
Ring worm appears most commonly in cattle as a round, slightly raised, bald patch, being seen especially about the head and neck of a calf or yearling. Older cattle, other animals and men are subject to the trouble. It is caused by minute vegetable parasites which grow under the skin, something like mildew in a grape leaf.

Ring worm can be rather easily cured by giving the spots a good scrubbing with soft soap and water, then treating them once each day with equal parts of tincture of iodine and glacial acetic acid. The treatment may be continued for several days, as appears necessary.

### WEANING COLTS IS SIMPLE

Ordinary Youngster Should Be Taken From Its Mother When From Four to Six Months Old.

The ordinary colt is best weaned from its mother at from four to six months of age. If the mare has been re-bred or is kept at constant hard work, four months is none too soon, otherwise, six months. If properly handled, weaning is a simple matter. Before weaning, the colt should be gradually accustomed to a rather full hay and grain ration, so that when final separation comes there will be no setback. And the separation must be

complete, the foal and its dam not being permitted to see or smell each other for some weeks.

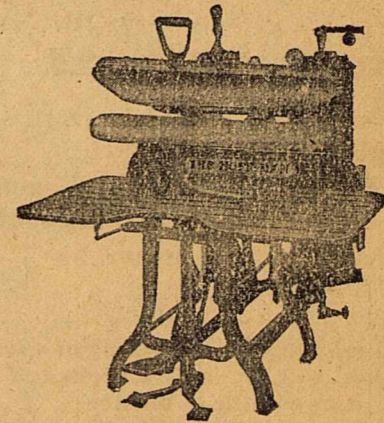
Good clean oats form the best of all grains for the weaning foal, but in order to build up bodily fat which the colt needs in cold weather, one-fourth of the grain ration in the fall and winter may consist of ground corn. Also, several small handfuls of oil-meal may be added with good results. Let the colt have plenty of good clean mixed hay, plenty of good water and a clean bed.

### KEEP SWINE IN CLEAN PENS

Cholera Germs and Vermin Flourish Most in Hot Weather—Avoid Trouble by Cleaning.

## Get The Tick

Washington, D. C. June 1st. Faced by the war demand for more meat, let us take advantage of opportunity which lies close to

hand. Let us recognize that it is our definite duty to turn our abundant grasses, our cheap and available concentrated feeds, and our mild climate to good account in the production of beef and milk and butter. And let us realize that to do this we must work together to remove the obstacle—the tick.

Not only will the elimination of the tick make possible the greater and more profitable development of native cattle. It will make possible also the bringing of better beef and milk producing stock which now cannot live under the attacks of ticks and the deadly germs of cattle fever they transmit. Extermination of the tick, therefore, will give us quick, direct returns in the form of increased growth of native stock, and will at the same time lay a firm foundation for the building up of a much more profitable cattle raising industry in a year or two while the war still may be in progress.

The South's business against the tick must not lag. It is not work which may be dropped during the course of war, the U. S. Department of Agriculture points out. Rather it must be pushed the more vigorously in order that territory may be rescued from the unsatisfactory and often unprofitable cattle raising which the tick imposes, and devoted to the more efficient and more profitable production of meat and milk which may be carried on in unquarantined territory.

The tick works for our enemies by keeping down the supply of three of our most important foods. Let us recognize this pest, therefore, as an enemy also. And let us wage against him, from today on, without in-

terruption, a war of extermination.

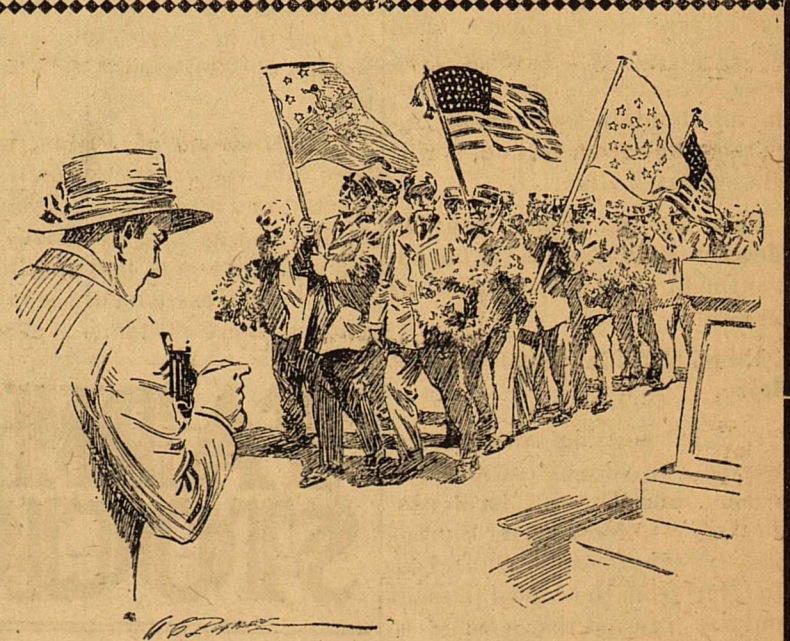

Fryar, sermon by Bro. Vinson who took for his text David's defiance of Goliath, and made a fine talk of it. A beautiful quartette was rendered by Clyde and Miss Eldora Lewis, Mr. Head and another gentleman, entitled "Will My Mother Know Me There." A reading "The Red White and Blue" by Miss Stella Treadaway. Solo "Will the Circle be unbroken" by Clyde Lewis. A reading "Our Flag" by Miss Emily Miller. She was followed by Mrs. McDowell, who made a fine talk in behalf of the mothers, and let them know how the mothers suffered during the Civil War, and what was expected of them in the way of sacrificing their own flesh in this war for the liberation of humanity and the freedom of the seas. A short talk by Rev. Bryant on the war and our duties. This was followed by the old song "I will Arise and go to Jesus." and the audience was dismissed by Bro. Williams.

The number registered in Terry county was 308.

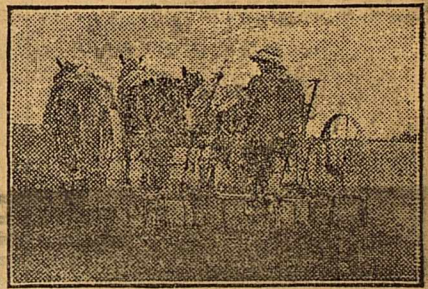

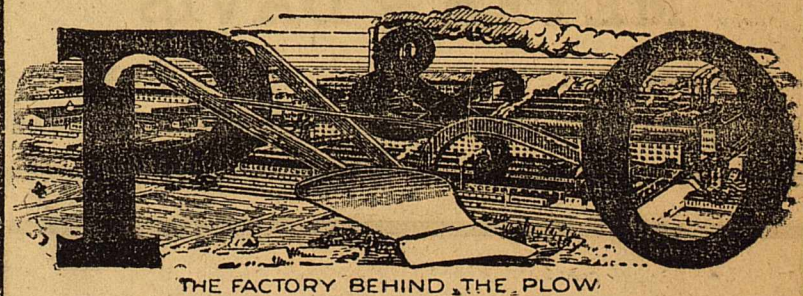

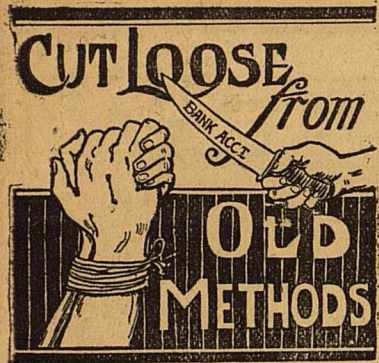
