Ding! Dong!! Dang!!! Toot! Toot!! Too-o-o-t!!! Swish! Look out little ones, she is liable to come side ways next time, or turn around while you are not looking, and run over you.

Saturday was some day in this burg, we want to tell you, and Brownfield did not celebrate by herself. They were here in masses from Gomez, Tokio, Harris and Meadow, in fact from the four quarters of old Terry, and even our sister to the west, old Yoakum, had her full quota of representatives, for this is now her nearest trading, or railroad point, as it is only 32 miles from here to Plains, as against 62 to Taboka, and 72 to Lubbock, where they have been trading several years.

The track laying crew, which had been so anxious to reach Brownfield left their machine in the Santa Fe addition Friday night, and were here bright and early Saturday morning and ran out of steel about 11 a. m. within 100 yards of where the high bridge will be over the Lost Draw. This was finished out in the afternoon, so that the bridge crew could get busy early Monday morning.

Hundreds of people watched the steel laying process, and even the Brownfield Band lent sweet music to the accomplishment of men and machinery, while Old Glory proudly fluttered from the mast head of the big crane on the track machine. Many children were the crowd who saw their first locomotive, not to say anything about the first track laying machine, which was the first that lots of grown pioneers had seen.

Mr. John Scott, of St. Louis, the man who has the entire contract to build this road, seemed

as happy as anyone in Brownfield, and was glad to be able to deliver something we had so long hoped and looked for. He kindly gave his consent to fete the boys at 11:30, and the business men had a big barrel of cold lemonade and several boxes of cigars ready for them, for which many Mexican's "muchu wana" was heard.

The bridge train came in Sunday, and the driver is sinking 60 foot pile for a temporary bridge which will soon be replaced with a concrete structure, embutments and all. This is another machine that is attracting the upturned gaze of our hearty western people, including a full quota of the fair sect.

Brownfield is now connected with the commercial world with bands of steel, and we can offer the prospective settlers one of the best towns, a fine country and the best people on earth to live among.

THE STATE OF TEXAS; To the Sheriff or any Constable of Terry County--Greeting: You are hereby commanded to summon Clarence Ullery to be and appear before the Honorable County Court of Terry County, Texas, at the next regular term thereof, to be holden at the Court House in Brownfield, Terry County, Texas 4th Monday in August A. D. 1917, same being the 27th day of August A. D. 1917, then and there to answer the Plaintiff's Petition, filed in a suit in said Court on the 31st day of October A. D. 1916, wherein American National Bank of Roswell is Plaintiff and Clarence Ullery is Defendant. File number of said suit being No. 54. The nature of the Plaintiff's demand is as follows, to wit: That plaintiff, American National Bank of Roswell is a corporation organized and existing under the National Banking laws of the United States of America with its principal office and place of business at Roswell in Chaves County, in the State of New Mexico. That the defendant, Clarence Ullery, resides in Oklahoma City, in Oklahoma County, State of Oklahoma, and owns real estate in Terry County, Texas.

That heretofore on, to-wit, the 14th day of June A. D. 1914, the defendant Clarence Ullery, for a valuable consideration made, executed and delivered to plaintiff his certain promissory note dated June 14th, 1914, for the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars payable to the order of the American National Bank of Roswell on the 4th day of September, A. D. 1914 with interest thereon at the rate of ten per cent per annum from maturity until paid and ten per cent additional on the sum of the principal and interest at date of payment as attorneys' fees, if after maturity said note is placed in the hands

of an attorneys for collection. That plaintiff is still the legal holder and owner of said note; that same is long passed due and unpaid and, although often requested the defendant has failed and refused, and still fails and refuses to pay the same or any part thereof, to plaintiff's damage in the sum of \$500.00.

METHOD FOR DOCKING LAMBS

Operation Should Be Performed When Youngsters Are About Ten Days Old—Short Tail Desired.

Docking should be done when the lambs are about ten days old. The easiest method is to place the lamb between the operator's legs, its rear end in front of him. The operator lifts the tail and with a heavy knife pushes the skin half way on the underside

of the third vertebra back to its juncture with the second. Then with a sharp cut he severs the tail at this point. Many shepherds leave the tail one vertebra longer, but a short tail is greatly to be desired since it cannot collect so much manure.

Very seldom, if the lamb is docked early, will there be sufficient bleeding to cause any material harm. If profuse bleeding does occur, a cord should be tied very tightly around the stump of the tail. Pincers heated to a high temperature, may also be used for this purpose, and by many are preferred. The tail is severed by closing them upon it. The stump is seared or burned, which completely prevents bleeding. However, a burn will not heal so quickly as a clean cut, and in the former condition suppuration or the formation of pus underneath the scab may occur.

Of course, there is a greater liability of dangerous infection where the knife, without cauterization, is used, since the seared surface tends to prevent the entrance of bacteria. Infection, however, can be avoided by the maintenance of cleanly and sanitary surroundings. The pincers can satisfactorily be adopted for docking lambs several weeks old, when the contingency of bleeding is more likely.

MAKE PROFITS WITH STEERS

Animals Must Have Good Beef Characteristics, a Wide, Strong Back and a Large Heart Girth.

How to select steers that will make good gains and return substantial profits should be well known by the man who plans to market his crops as feed this fall or winter.

John L. Torney of the University of Wisconsin Agricultural Experiment station, is urging cattle feeders to look for the following characteristics in animals which they intend to finish for the market:

"Steers, if they are to make profitable gains in the feed lot, must have beef characteristics, a wide, strong back, and a large heart girth.

"They must have a strong frame and plenty of room for the vital organs, for an animal with a weak constitution can not hold up through the feeding season.

"A wide head and muzzle, which usually indicate good feeding qualities.

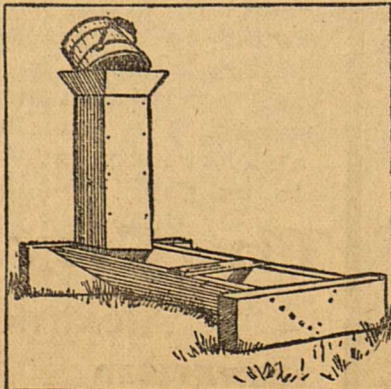
"Short legs, heavy hindquarters, and arched ribs are essential in the feeding animal.

"The skin should be reasonably thick, soft, and covered by a heavy coat of hair.

"The animal should have a straight back and low set appearance, due to the depth of body and short legs."

Handy Device Attached to Any Ordinary Trough Prevents Hogs From Interfering With Pouring.

Here is a handy device for feeding hogs. To any ordinary trough attach an upright box 2½ feet long and 8 by 4 inches in diameter, flaring at the top, writes Joseph Volden of Westby,

Wis., in Missouri Valley Farmer. The pigs can never interfere with the pouring of slop into the trough, and they will soon learn to wait for their drink at the bottom of the spout.

Selection of Breeding Sows.

Select the breeding sows from early spring litters when they are six months old. One can form an opinion which ones are most likely to prove long-bodied, good-formed, of quiet disposition, good feeders and with a tendency to grow frame and size rather than put on an excess of fat. Breed the gilt when about ten months old, and if she proves herself a good breeder, raising uniform litters of strong, healthy pigs, keep her for several years, or as long as she is profitable.

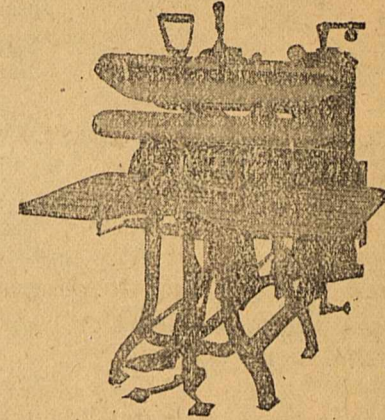

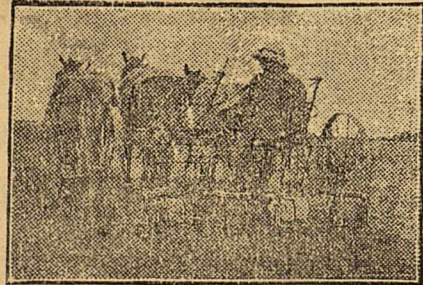

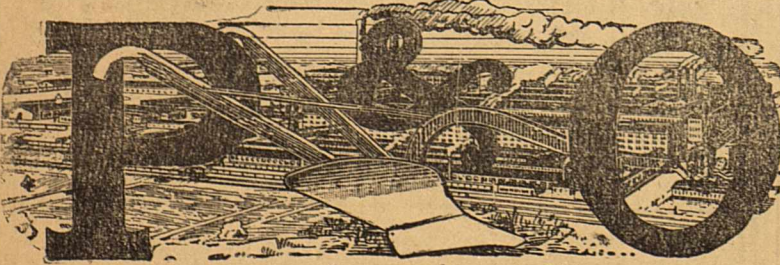

Use of High Denomination Stamps will Be Encouraged.

The Third Assistant Postmaster General has issued the following:

As a measure of economy post masters and post-office employees are directed to encourage the public to use stamps of the highest denominations suited to the amount of postage required on all mail. For example a 2 cent stamp instead of two 1-cent stamps should be affixed to letters needing 2 cents postage, and a 10 cent stamp instead of five two cent stamps should be attached to parcels requiring 10 cents postage. Cooperation between post-office employees and the public in the sale and use of stamps of the higher denominations will effect a large saving to the Government in the cost of producing, transporting, and canceling them, and will benefit the public in minimizing the number of stamps handled and affixed to mail. This benefit will be especially important to business concerns mailing large quantities of letters and parcels, and postmasters are directed to bring the suggestion particularly to their notice.

Postmasters will cause this suggestion to be published in the newspapers when it can be done without expense to the department.

Can Fruit Without Sugar.

The present price of sugar is no excuse for not canning a surplus. Fruit for use in pies or as stewed fruit can be put up without the use of sugar, according to the canning specialists of the department. Any fruit, they say may be successfully sterilized and retained in the pack by simply adding boiling water instead of the hot syrup.

Can the product the same day it is picked. Cull, stem, or seed and clean the fruit by placing it in a strainer and pouring water over it until it is clean. Pack the product thoroughly in glass jars or tin cans until they are full; use the handle of a table-spoon, wooden ladle, or table knife for packing purposes. Pour over the fruit boiling water from a kettle, place the rubbers and caps in position, partially seal if using glass jars, seal completely if using tin cans. Place the containers in a sterilized vat, such as a wash boiler with false bottom, or other receptacle improvised for the purpose. If using a hot water bath

outfit, process for 30 minutes; count time after the water has reached the boiling point; the water must cover the highest jar in container. After sterilizing remove packs, seal glass jars wrap in paper to prevent bleaching, and store in a dry, cool place.

If you are canning in tin cans it will improve the product to plunge the cans quickly into cold water immediately after sterilization. —W. C. Lasetter, acting Director Extension, Arkansas College of Agriculture.
